HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR TO EXAMINE FEDERAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS TO ALLOW STATES TO MORE READILY ENACT UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION-RELATED LAWS THAT ALLOW FEAR OF DOMESTIC OR SEXUAL VIOLENCE TO BE A VALID REASON FOR NOT ACCEPTING SUITABLE WORK.

WHEREAS, domestic violence and sex assault is an 1 international issue that permeates all levels of society, 2 affecting people regardless of age, income, education, religion, 3 or culture; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, a February 2008 report from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention indicated that 23.6 percent of 7 women and 11.5 percent of men reported at least one lifetime 8 9 episode of intimate-partner violence; and 10 WHEREAS, the cost of domestic violence to the U.S. economy 11 is more than \$8.3 billion annually, including medical care, 12 13 mental health services, and lost productivity; and 14 WHEREAS, in addition to the physical and psychological 15 16 effects of domestic violence on the victim and the victim's family, there are job-related consequences; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, such violence results in nearly 8,000,000 lost days of paid work per year, or the equivalent of 32,000 full-20 21 time jobs; and 22 23 WHEREAS, October 2006 U.S. Bureau of Labor and Statistics data indicates that domestic violence coming to the workplace 24 25 accounts for 24 percent of workplace violence incidents; and 26 27 WHEREAS, a study of three large companies in 39 states indicated that ten percent of its workers that responded to the 28 29 survey were currently going through some form of domestic abuse,



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and an additional 19 percent of men and 30 percent of women said 1 they had been victims at some point in their lives; and 2 3 WHEREAS, in some cases, victims of domestic abuse are 4 5 victimized in the workplace, thereby creating a dangerous situation not only for the victim, but also for persons at the 6 7 workplace; and 8 9 WHEREAS, safety all persons in the workplace should be a 10 top priority; and 11 WHEREAS, domestic violence can impede job search efforts 12 for victims of domestic violence who must look for a safe place 13 to live and care for their children, or are healing from 14 15 injuries; and 16 WHEREAS, however, unemployment insurance laws usually 17 require claimants be "ready and available" for work, as well as 18 actively seeking work, which can be challenging for victims who 19 are searching for work or leave work because of domestic 20 21 violence; now, therefore, 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 23 24 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, that the U.S. Department of Labor is requested to 25 26 examine federal laws and regulations to allow states to more readily enact unemployment compensation-related laws that will 27 28 allow fear of domestic or sexual violence to be a valid reason 29 for not accepting suitable work; and 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 31 Resolution be transmitted to the U.S. Secretary of Labor, each 32 member of Hawaii's congressional delegation, the Governor, and 33 the Director of Labor and Industrial Relations. 34 35 36 37 ing groups and the OFFERED BY: (HR HMS 2011-2016

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
