A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BURIAL SITES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 6E-43, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended as follows:

3 1. By amending subsection (b) to read:

All burial sites are significant and shall be 4 "(b) 5 preserved in place until compliance with this section is $met[_{T}$ except as provided in section 6E-43.6]. The appropriate island 6 burial council shall determine whether preservation in place or 7 8 relocation of previously identified or inadvertently discovered native Hawaiian burial sites is warranted, following criteria 9 [which] that shall include recognition that burial sites of high 10 preservation value, such as areas with a concentration of 11 12 skeletal remains, or prehistoric or historic burials associated with important individuals and events, or areas that are within 13 a context of historic properties, or have known lineal 14 15 descendants, shall receive greater consideration for preservation in place. The criteria shall be developed by the 16 17 department in consultation with the councils, office of Hawaiian affairs, representatives of development and large property owner 18 SB LRB 11-0641.doc

8	fifteen days of referral by the department. These deadlines may		
9	be extended by agreement between the landowner and the

11	If a council's determination of a previously identified or		
12	inadvertently discovered burial site proves to be other than a		
13	Hawaiian burial site, the department shall determine the		
14	treatment of the non-Hawaiian burial site under subsection (e)."		
15	2. By amending subsection (d) to read:		
16	"(d) Within ninety days following the final		
17	determination $[-7]$ for previously identified native Hawaiian		
18	burial sites and within thirty days following the final		
19	determination for inadvertently discovered native Hawaiian		
20	burial sites, a preservation or mitigation plan shall be		
21	approved by the department in consultation with any lineal		



1 descendants, the respective council, other appropriate Hawaiian 2 organizations, and any affected property owner." 3 SECTION 2. Section 6E-43.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended as follows: 5 1. By amending subsections (b) to (d) to read: 6 "(b) Appointment of members to the councils shall be made 7 by the governor, in accordance with section 26-34, from a list 8 provided by the department, provided that a minimum of twenty 9 per cent of the regional representatives shall be appointed from 10 a list of at least nine candidates provided by the office of 11 Hawaiian affairs. The department shall develop the list in 12 consultation with appropriate Hawaiian organizations [, such as 13 Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawai'i Nei]. The membership of each 14 council shall include at least one representative from each 15 geographic region of the island as well as representatives of 16 development and large property owner interests. Regional 17 representatives shall be selected from the Hawaiian community on 18 the basis of their understanding of the culture, history, burial 19 beliefs, customs, and practices of native Hawaiians. The 20 councils shall have a minimum of nine and a maximum of fifteen 21 members, and have a ratio of not more than three to one and no 22 less than two to one in favor of regional representatives.



(c) The department, in consultation with the councils, 1 office of Hawaiian affairs, representatives of development and 2 3 large property owner interests, and appropriate Hawaiian organizations[, such as Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawai`i Nei,] 4 5 shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 necessary to carry out the purposes of this section. The council members shall serve 6 7 without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred during the performance of their duties. The 8 9 councils shall be a part of the department for administrative 10 purposes.

11 The councils shall hold meetings and acquire (d) information as they deem necessary and shall communicate their 12 13 determinations, findings, and recommendations to the department. Notwithstanding section 92-3, whenever the location and 14 15 description of burial sites are under consideration, the councils may hold closed meetings. Concurrence of a majority of 16 the members present at a meeting shall be necessary to make any 17 action of a council valid." 18 2. By amending subsection (f) to read: 19

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"(f) The councils shall:

A representative of the medical examiner or coroner's 1 (1)2 office and a qualified archaeologist shall examine the 3 remains to determine jurisdiction. If the remains are the responsibility of the medical examiner or coroner, 4 the department's involvement shall end. If the 5 6 remains are historic or prehistoric burials, then the 7 remainder of this section shall apply; The department shall gather sufficient information, 8 (2)9 including oral tradition, to document the nature of the burial context and [determine] assist in the 10 determination of appropriate treatment of the 11 remains [-] as set forth in section 6E-43. Members of 12 13 the appropriate council shall be allowed to oversee the on-site examination and, if warranted, removal; 14 15 and If removal of the remains is warranted, based on 16 (3) criteria developed by the department, in consultation 17 with the councils, office of Hawaiian affairs, 18 representatives of development and large property 19 20 owner interests, and appropriate Hawaiian organizations [, such as Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O 21 22 Hawai'i Nei,] through rules adopted pursuant to



chapter 91, the removal of the remains shall be 1 2 overseen by a qualified archaeologist and a mitigation plan shall be prepared by the department or with the 3 concurrence of the department. 4 In cases involving the discovery of a single skeleton, 5 (d) the requirements of subsection (c) shall be fulfilled in [one] 6 7 two working [day] days if on Oahu, and [two] three working days, 8 if in other council jurisdictions." 9 2. By amending subsection (f) to read: In cases where remains are archaeologically removed, 10 "(f) the department shall determine the place of relocation, after 11 consultation with the appropriate council, affected property 12 owners, representatives of the relevant ethnic group, and any 13 identified lineal descendants [, as appropriate]. Relocation 14 shall conform with requirements imposed by the department of 15 health, and may be accompanied by traditional ceremonies, as 16 17 determined by the lineal descendants, or, if no lineal descendants are identified, the appropriate council or 18 representatives of the relevant ethnic group that the department 19 deems appropriate. Specific or special reinterment requests 20 from lineal or cultural descendants may be accommodated provided 21



1 that the additional expenses incurred are paid by the affected

2 descendants."

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3 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

5 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
