## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
2	amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and				
3	to read as follows:				
4	"PART . SINGLE-USE CHECKOUT BAG FEE				
5	§342H-A Definitions. As used in this part, unless the				
6	context otherwise requires:				
7	"Business" means any commercial enterprise or				
8	establishment, including sole proprietorships, joint ventures,				
9	partnerships, and corporations, or any other legally cognizable				
10	entity, and includes all employees of the business or any				
11	independent contractors associated with the business.				
12	"Reusable bag" means a bag with handles that is				
13	specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and				
14	is:				
15	(1) Made of cloth or other machine washable fabric; or				
16	(2) Made of other durable material suitable for re-use,				
17	including plastic that is at least 2.25 mils thick.				

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1 "Single-use checkout bag":

2	(1)	Mean	s a bag made of plastic that is less than 2.25
3		mils	thick, or a paper package or sack, whether
4		recy	clable or non-recyclable, that is provided by a
5		busi	ness to a customer, and is designed for one-time
6		use	to contain and transport merchandise; and
7	(2)	Does	not include:
8		(A)	Bags used by customers inside a business to
9			package loose items, such as fruits, vegetables,
10			nuts, grains, or candies, or small hardware
11			items;
12		(B)	Bags used to contain or wrap frozen foods, meat
13			or fish, flowers or potted plants, or other items
14			to contain dampness;
15		(C)	Bags used to protect or transport prepared foods
16			or bakery goods;
17		(D)	Bags provided by pharmacists to contain
18			prescription medications;

- 19 (E) Newspaper bags;
- 20 (F) Door-hanger bags;



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1	(G)	Laundry, dry cleaning, or garment bags, including			
2		bags provided by hotels to guests to contain wet			
3		or dirty clothing;			
4	(H)	Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags			
5		intended for use as garbage, pet waste, or yard			
6		waste bags; or			
7	(I)	Bags used to contain live animals, such as fish			
8		or insects sold in pet stores.			
9	"Small business" means a business that has grossed \$250,000				
10	or less in revenues in the previous year.				
11	§342H-B Distribution of single-use checkout bags; fee.				
12	(a) Beginning January 1, 2012, all businesses in the State				
13	shall charge and collect a fee of 10 cents for each single-use				
14	checkout bag that is provided to customers; provided that a				
15	business may provide single-use checkout bags to any customer				
16	participating in federally-approved nutrition assistance				
17	programs, including the supplemental nutrition assistance				
18	program and the special supplemental nutrition program for				
19	women, infants, and children.

20 (b) Businesses subject to the requirements of this part21 shall indicate on each customer transaction receipt the number



of single-use checkout bags provided and the amount of the fee
 charged.

3 (c) Nothing in this part shall preclude businesses from4 making reusable bags available for sale to customers.

5 (d) A business may retain 20 per cent of the fees6 collected that shall be subject to chapters 235 and 237.

7 §342H-C Remittance of fees. (a) Not later than the last 8 day of each month, each business subject to the requirements of 9 this part shall remit to the department the fees collected 10 pursuant to section 342H-B during the immediately preceding 11 month; provided that a small business may remit the fees on a 12 quarterly basis on the last day of the month following the end 13 of a quarter.

(b) Payments and receipts of fees shall be reported on
forms prescribed by the director. Any proprietary information
obtained by the department shall be kept confidential and shall
not be disclosed to any other person.

18 (c) Businesses shall be subject to penalties and interest19 for late or underpaid fees.

20 (d) All fees collected by the department pursuant to this21 part shall be deposited as follows:

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1 The first \$ (1)into a special account in the state 2 general fund to be expended by the department for 3 expenses related to the administration and enforcement of this part; and 4 5 (2)Any remaining funds into the general fund. 6 §342H-D Violations. (a) It shall be a violation of this 7 part for any business that is subject to the requirements of 8 this part to pay or otherwise reimburse a customer for any 9 portion of the fee required to be charged and collected pursuant 10 to section 342H-B.

(b) Violations of this part or any rule adopted pursuant
to this part shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1,000
for each violation.

§342H-E Preemption. Except for any county ordinance 14 regulating single-use checkout bags in effect prior to the 15 16 effective date of this part, this part shall preempt the powers of any county to regulate the use of single-use checkout bags; 17 18 provided that in counties where an ordinance regulating single-19 use checkout bags is in effect, the fee established under 20 section 342H-B shall be applicable only to single-use checkout 21 bags made of paper.

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1 §342H-F Rules. The director shall adopt rules, pursuant to chapter 91, as may be necessary for the purposes of this 2 3 part." 4 SECTION 2. In codifying the new sections added by section 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 5 6 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating 7 the new sections in this Act. 8 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030; 9 provided that section 342H-B(d) of section 1 of this Act shall be repealed on June 30, 2012. 10





Report Title: Environmental Protection; Plastic Checkout Bags; Fee

#### Description:

Requires businesses in the State to collect a 10-cent fee for each single-use checkout bag provided to a customer. Allows for exemptions. Allows businesses to keep twenty per cent of the fees, subject to income and general excises taxes, for the first year. Requires fees to be collected on paper bags in counties that currently have ordinances banning plastic bags. Effective July 1, 2030. (SB1363 HD2)
