## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the excessive use of
2	non-reusable checkout bags presents an unnecessary hazard to the
3	natural environment. Non-reusable checkout bags:
4	(1) Require crude oil, a polluting fossil fuel, for their
5	manufacture;
6	(2) Pose serious health risks to legally protected sea
7	turtles and marine mammals;
8	(3) Contribute to unsightly litter;
9	(4) Burden overcrowded landfills;
10	(5) Are recycled minimally;
11	(6) Contribute to deforestation; and
12	(7) Are manufactured with non-renewable energy.
13	An environmentally friendly alternative to the non-reusable
14	checkout bag is the reusable bag that consumers can easily
15	acquire, use, clean, and store. The legislature finds that
16	Hawaii should strongly discourage the use of non-reusable
17	checkout bags.

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1 The legislature finds that the State has a compelling 2 interest in protecting its precious natural environment. 3 Several countries and both international and domestic cities 4 have successfully implemented laws that have resulted in a 5 significant reduction in non-reusable checkout bag usage. 6 Because the people of Hawaii depend on the preservation of the 7 natural environment for economic, social, and cultural reasons, 8 the public's health and welfare will benefit immensely from a significant reduction of non-reusable checkout bag waste and 9 litter. 10 The purpose of this Act is to reduce the adverse impact of 11

12 non-reusable checkout bag waste on Hawaii's precious and unique 13 natural environment by establishing an offset fee for the 14 distribution of non-reusable checkout bags.

15 SECTION 2. Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
17 to read as follows:

#### "PART . NON-REUSABLE CHECKOUT BAG OFFSET FEE

19 §342H- Definitions. As used in this part:

20 "Business" means any commercial enterprise or establishment

21 that distributes non-reusable checkout bags in any county,

22 including:

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1	(1)	Sole proprietorships, joint ventures, partnerships,
2		and corporations, or any other legal entity, whether
3		for profit or not for profit; and
4	(2)	All employees, principals, owners, partners, or
5		directors of a business doing business with the
6		entities under paragraph (1), including independent
7		contractors.
8	"Non	-reusable checkout bag" means a paper or plastic
9	carryout	bag that is provided by a business to a customer at the
10	point of	sale for the transport of purchased items. A non-
11	reusable	checkout bag does not meet the standards for a reusable
12	bag, rega	rdless of the potential frequency of reuse of the same
13	non-reusa	ble checkout bag. The term "non-reusable checkout bag"
14	does not	include bags distributed by businesses for the
15	transport	of:
16	(1)	Raw meat, poultry, fish, frozen food, flowers, or
17		other items that contain dampness;
18	(2)	Bulk food products sold without packaging;
19	(3)	Fresh produce;
20	(4)	Baked goods sold over-the-counter without packaging;
21	(5)	Prepared food for take-out or transport from
22	. · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · ·	restaurants;

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1	(6) Live animals;
2	(7) Newspapers for home delivery; and
3	(8) Laundry or dry-cleaning.
4	"Reusable bag" means a bag that is specifically designed
5	and manufactured for multiple reuse that is made of:
6	(1) Cloth or other machine washable fabric; or
7	(2) Other durable material suitable for reuse, including a
8	plastic that is at least 2.25 millimeters thick.
9	"Undue hardship" means a financial burden that is extremely
10	unique and unavoidable.
11	<b>§342H-</b> Distribution of checkout bags; offset fee. (a)
12	Beginning July 1, 2012, any business having a gross annual
13	income of \$ or more shall charge and collect an offset
14	fee of cents for each non-reusable checkout bag provided
15	to a customer. Each business shall add the amount of the offset
16	fee to the total price of the customer's purchase. The offset
17	fee shall be stated separately and prominently on any sales
18	receipt, invoice, or other record of the sale or other transfer
19	of the non-reusable checkout bag.
20	(b) A business may retain per cent of the
21	offset fees collected as revenue that shall be subject to income

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I	taxes; provided that the offset fee shall not be subject to		
2	chapter 237.		
3	(c) A business shall keep a record on a quarterly basis of		
4	the following:		
5	(1) The number of non-reusable checkout bags the business		
6	has purchased, been provided with, or otherwise		
7	acquired; and		
8	(2) The amount of offset fee collected from the		
9	distribution of non-reusable checkout bags that are		
10	provided to or sold to consumers.		
11	The record shall be submitted to the department on a quarterly		
12	basis or as directed by the department. The department may		
13	inspect the record for enforcement purposes.		
14	(d) No later than the last day of each month, each		
15	business shall remit to the department an amount equal to		
16	per cent of the offset fees collected during the		
17	previous month. The department shall provide forms to document		
18	the remittance. Of the amount collected by the department under		
19	this subsection:		
<b>20</b> °	(1) per cent shall be deposited into the general		
21	fund; and		



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1	(2)	per cent shall be deposited into a special
2		account in the state general fund for expenditure by
3		the department for expenses related to the
4		administration and enforcement of this part; provided
5		, that any funds in excess of those expenses shall be
6		expended by the department to:
7		(A) Perform community outreach and education relating
8		to the impact of non-reusable checkout bags on
9		the environment; and
10		(B) Fund litter cleanups.
11	§ <b>342</b> 1	H- Penalties. Any business that violates this part
12	shall be	subject to a fine of:
13	(1)	<pre>\$ for a first violation;</pre>
14	(2)	\$ for a second violation occurring within one
15		year of the first violation; and
16	(3)	\$ for any subsequent violation after the second
17		violation.
18	§3421	H- Injunctive and other relief. The director may
19	institute	a civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction
20	for injund	ctive and other relief to correct or abate violation of
21	this part	or any rule adopted pursuant to this part, to collect
22	administra	ative penalties, or to obtain other relief.
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1	<b>§342H-</b> Rules. The director shall adopt rules under
2	chapter 91 necessary for the purposes of this part.
3	<b>§342H- Exemptions.</b> The director may exempt from the
4	requirements of this part any business that sufficiently
5	demonstrates that the offset fee will cause an undue hardship;
6	provided that:
7	(1) No exemption shall exceed one year; and
8	(2) No business shall receive more than one exemption.
9	<b>§342H-</b> County ordinances. (a) Nothing in this part
10	shall be construed to supersede or in any manner affect a county
11	plastic or non-reusable checkout bag ordinance.
12	(b) Nothing in this part shall prohibit a county from
13	enacting ordinances that are more stringent in the control or
14	prohibition of non-reusable checkout bags than this part."
15	SECTION 3. No later than twenty days prior to the
16	convening of the regular session of 2013, the department of
17	health shall report to the legislature:
18	(1) An assessment of the effectiveness of this Act in
19	reducing the use of non-reusable checkout bags; and
20	(2) Recommendations for proposed legislation to further
21	reduce the use of non-reusable checkout bags.



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SECTION 4. Nothing in this Act shall be interpreted or
 applied so as to create any requirement, power, or duty in
 conflict with any federal or state law.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Environmental Protection; Plastic Checkout Bags

#### Description:

Requires businesses to collect an unspecified offset fee for distribution of every non-reusable checkout bag. Provides for DOH to collect a percentage of the offset fee for administration and enforcement. Allows businesses to retain a percentage of the offset fee as taxable income. Exempts the offset fee from general excise tax. Effective 07/01/2050. (SD2)
