#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PSYCHOLOGISTS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that there is limited SECTION 1. access to mental health care treatment services for citizens 2 3 across the State of Hawaii. The delivery of comprehensive, accessible, and affordable mental health medical care is 4 5 enhanced by collaborative practice between licensed clinical psychologists and medical doctors. Providing trained medical 6 psychologists, licensed in Hawaii, with limited supervised 7 prescriptive authority would be beneficial to residents of the 8 State of Hawaii who live in medically underserved communities. 9 10 The purpose of this Act is to create a multiphase, 11 five-year pilot program to authorize appropriately trained and supervised psychologists to prescribe psychotropic medications 12 for the treatment of mental illness. 13

14 SECTION 2. Section 465-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows:

16 "§465-3 Exemptions. (a) This chapter shall not apply to: 17 (1) Any person teaching, lecturing, consulting, or 18 engaging in research in psychology insofar as the 2011-0789 SB SMA.doc



1 activities are performed as part of or are dependent 2 upon employment in a college or university; provided 3 that the person shall not engage in the practice of 4 psychology outside the responsibilities of the 5 person's employment; (2)Any person who performs any, or any combination of the 6 7 professional services defined as the practice of 8 psychology under the direction of a licensed 9 psychologist in accordance with rules adopted by the 10 board; provided that the person may use the term 11 "psychological assistant", but shall not identify the 12 person's self as a psychologist or imply that the person is licensed to practice psychology; 13 14 (3) Any person employed by a local, state, or federal 15 government agency in a school psychologist or 16 psychological examiner position, or a position that 17 does not involve diagnostic or treatment services, but 18 only at those times when that person is carrying out 19 the functions of such government employment; 20 Any person who is a student of psychology, a (4)psychological intern, or a resident in psychology 21 22 preparing for the profession of psychology under



1 supervision in a training institution or facility and 2 who is designated by a title as "psychology trainee", 3 "psychology student", "psychology intern", or "psychology resident", that indicates the person's 4 5 training status; provided that the person shall not 6 identify the person's self as a psychologist or imply 7 that the person is licensed to practice psychology; 8 (5) Any person who is a member of another profession licensed under the laws of this jurisdiction to render 9 or advertise services, including psychotherapy, within 10 11 the scope of practice as defined in the statutes or 12 rules regulating the person's professional practice; provided that, notwithstanding section 465-1, the 13 14 person does not represent the person's self to be a 15 psychologist or does not represent that the person is 16 licensed to practice psychology; 17 (6) Any person who is a member of a mental health 18 profession not requiring licensure; provided that the

19 person functions only within the person's professional 20 capacities; and provided further that the person does 21 not represent the person to be a psychologist, or the 22 person's services as psychological; or



1 (7) Any person who is a duly recognized member of the 2 clergy; provided that the person functions only within 3 the person's capacities as a member of the clergy; and 4 provided further that the person does not represent 5 the person to be a psychologist, or the person's 6 services as psychological. 7 Nothing in this chapter shall in any way restrict any (b) 8 person from carrying on any of the psychological activities as 9 defined in section 465-1; provided that such person does not 10 offer psychological services as defined in this chapter except 11 as such activities are incidental to the person's lawful 12 occupational purpose. 13 (c) A person may use the title of 14 industrial/organizational psychologist, provided that the person 15 registers with the board, and: 16 (1)Is professionally competent in the practice of 17 industrial/organizational psychology; [and] 18 (2)Holds a doctoral degree from an accredited institution 19 of higher education with training and education in 20 industrial/organizational psychology, satisfactory to 21 the board; and



Provides psychological service or consultation to 1 (3) 2 organizations [which] that does not involve the 3 delivery or supervision of direct psychological 4 services to individuals or groups of individuals, 5 without regard to the source or extent of payment for 6 services rendered. 7 Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the provision of (d) 8 expert testimony by a psychologist who is otherwise exempted by 9 this chapter. 10 [(e) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as 11 permitting the administration or prescription of drugs, or in 12 any way engaging in the practice of medicine as defined in the 13 laws of the State.]" 14 SECTION 3. There is established a five-year pilot program 15 to authorize appropriately trained and supervised psychologists 16 to prescribe psychotropic medications for the treatment of 17 mental illness in a Hawaii qualified health center, a designated 18 medically underserved area, or a mental health professional 19 shortage area.

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The schedule of the program shall be as follows:



1	(1)	Training and supervision during year one of the pilot
2		program shall occur at the Waianae coast comprehensive
3		health center;
4	(2)	The remaining four years of the pilot program shall
5		include training and supervision by a supervising
6		physician; and
7	(3)	Additional Hawaii qualified health centers, clinics
8		located in medically underserved areas, or clinics in
9		areas with a mental health professional shortage shall
10		be added to the pilot program at a rate of one or two
11		clinics per year.
12	SECTION 4. Definitions. As used in this Act, unless the	
13	context otherwise requires:	
14	"Board" means the board of psychology established under	
15	chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes.	
16	"Clinical experience" means a period of supervised clinica	
17	training and practice in which clinical diagnoses and	
18	interventions are learned, conducted, and supervised as part of	
19	the training program.	
20	"Ima	ging and electroencephalogram" means a cranial computed
21	tomography scan, magnetic resonance imaging, or	
22	electroencephalogram for diagnostic differential.	
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1	"Laboratory test" means any laboratory blood or urine drug	
2	screening test necessary to monitor the general health of a	
3	patient receiving psychotropic medication.	
4	"Medical psychologist certified to prescribe" means a	
5	licensed, doctoral-level clinical psychologist who has undergone	
6	specialized education and training in preparation for	
7	prescriptive practice and has passed the psychopharmacological	
8	examination for psychologists, and who has a current active	
9	certificate granting prescriptive authority.	
10	"Narcotics" means natural and synthetic opioid analgesics	
11	and their derivatives used to relieve pain.	
12	"Prescription" means an order for a drug or any medicine,	
13	device, or treatment, including a controlled substance, as	
14	defined by state law.	
15	"Prescriptive authority" means the authority to prescribe,	
16	administer, discontinue, or distribute, without charge, drugs or	
17	controlled substances used in the diagnosis, treatment, and	
18	management of individuals with psychiatric, mental, cognitive,	
19	nervous, emotional, or behavioral disorders or other procedures	
20	within the scope of practice of psychology.	
21	"Psychiatrist" means a doctor of medicine or a doctor of	

21 "Psychiatrist" means a doctor of medicine or a doctor of22 osteopathy licensed to practice medicine by the State of Hawaii



who has successfully passed a specialized four-year residency 1 2 program in the practice of psychiatry. 3 "Psychotropic medication" refers to those agents related to 4 the diagnosis and treatment of mental and emotional disorders, 5 including controlled substances except narcotics. 6 "Supervising physician" means a doctor of medicine or a doctor of osteopathy licensed to practice medicine by the State 7 8 of Hawaii or a psychiatrist who accepts professional responsibility for the provision of psychopharmacotherapy. 9 10 SECTION 5. Prescription certificate; application. (a) Α 11 licensed clinical psychologist who applies for a prescription certificate shall be designated as a "medical psychologist 12 certified to prescribe" if the psychologist: 13 Holds a current clinical license in good standing to 14 (1) 15 practice psychology in Hawaii; Has completed a master's degree in psychopharmacology 16 (2) or an equivalent certificate in psychopharmacology 17 issued prior to 2008; 18 Has completed relevant supervised clinical experiences 19 (3) 20 sufficient to attain competency in the psychopharmacological treatment of a diverse patient 21 22 population;



1	(4)	Has passed the American Psychological Association
2		Practice Organization's College of Professional
3		Psychology psychopharmacology exam;
4	(5)	Has obtained a United States Drug Enforcement
5		Administration registration number for limited use, as
6		restricted by state law;
7	(6)	Has obtained malpractice insurance that covers the
8		psychologist during the period the prescription
9		certificate is in effect;
10	(7)	Has satisfied all other requirements, as determined by
11		rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91,
12		Hawaii Revised Statutes, for obtaining a prescription
13	. •	certificate; and
14	(8)	Is presently working or has contracted to work at:
15		(A) A Hawaii qualified health center established
16		under section 346-41.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
17		(B) A licensed health clinic located in a federally
18		designated medically underserved area; or
19		(C) A licensed health clinic located in a mental
20		health professional shortage area;



1	(b) The board shall issue a prescription certificate if i	
2	finds that the applicant has met all of the requirements of	
3	subsection (a).	
4	(c)	If a medical psychologist fails to meet the
5	requireme	nts of subsection (a) at any time, the medical
6	psychologist shall immediately relinquish the prescription	
7	certificate to the board.	
8	SECT	ION 6. Prescription certificate; powers, duties, and
9	responsib	ilities. (a) A licensed medical psychologist holding
10	a prescri	ption certificate shall:
11	(1)	Maintain a current license to practice psychology in
12		Hawaii;
13	(2)	Maintain malpractice insurance;
14	(3)	Complete one year of supervised practice under the
15	2	direction of a supervising psychiatrist for the first
16		year of the pilot program; and
17	(4)	After the completion of the first year of the pilot
18		program, complete four years of supervised practice
19		under the direction of a supervising physician;
20		provided that:



1	(A) Supervised practice shall include conducting
2	diagnostic laboratory tests and imaging and
3	electroencephalograms; and
4	(B) The supervising psychiatrist and supervising
5	physician shall not be employed by the person
6	being directed or supervised.
7	(b) A medical psychologist holding a prescription
8	certificate shall be authorized to prescribe, administer,
9	discontinue, or distribute drugs or controlled substances that
10	are recognized or customarily used in the diagnosis, treatment,
11	and management of individuals with psychiatric, mental,
12	cognitive, nervous, emotional, or behavioral disorders and that
13	are relevant to the practice of psychology or other procedures
14	directly within the scope of practice of psychology. The
15	authorization shall be limited to services provided only to
16	patients under the care of the medical psychologist at the
17	eligible health care centers identified in section 5 of this
18	Act.
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(c) After completing five years of the pilot program, a
medical psychologist holding a prescription certificate shall
maintain an ongoing collaborative relationship with the medical



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1	doctor who oversees the general medical care of the medical		
2	psychologist's patients to ensure that:		
3	(1)	Necessary medical examinations are conducted for the	
4		medical psychologist's patients;	
5	(2)	Any psychotropic medication prescribed for a	
6		particular patient is appropriate for that patient's	
7		medical condition; and	
8	(3)	Significant changes in a patient's medical or	
9	•	psychological condition are discussed with the medical	
10		psychologist.	
11	(d)	A prescription written by a medical psychologist	
12	holding a	prescription certificate shall:	
13	(1)	Comply with applicable state and federal laws;	
14	(2)	Be identified as issued by a "medical psychologist	
15		certified to prescribe"; and	
16	(3)	Include the medical psychologist's board number or	
17		identification number assigned by the department of	
18		commerce and consumer affairs.	
19	(e)	A medical psychologist holding a prescription	
20	certifica	te shall not delegate prescriptive authority to any	
21	person.	Records of all prescriptions shall be maintained in the	
22	prescribi	ng psychologist's patient records.	
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When authorized to prescribe controlled substances, a 1 .(f) 2 medical psychologist holding a prescription certificate shall 3 file with the board, in a timely manner, all individual United 4 States Drug Enforcement Administration registration numbers. 5 SECTION 7. Administration. (a) The board shall adopt 6 rules pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 7 establishing the procedures to be followed to obtain and renew a 8 prescription certificate. The board may set reasonable 9 application and renewal fees.

10 The board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 (b) 11 establishing the grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation 12 of prescription certificates and including provisions for 13 suspension or revocation of a license to practice medical 14 psychology upon suspension or revocation of a prescription 15 certificate. Actions of denial, suspension, or revocation of a 16 prescription certificate shall be in accordance with this 17 chapter.

18 (c) The board shall maintain current records on every
19 prescribing medical psychologist, including federal
20 registrations and numbers.

(d) The board shall provide to the board of pharmacy
established under section 461-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, an



annual list of medical psychologists holding a prescription 1 2 certificate that contains the information agreed upon between 3 the board and the board of pharmacy. The board shall promptly 4 provide the board of pharmacy with the names of any medical 5 psychologists who are added or deleted from the list. 6 SECTION 8. Narcotics; prohibited. This Act shall not be 7 construed to permit a psychologist holding a prescription 8 certificate to administer or prescribe a narcotic. 9 SECTION 9. The legislative reference bureau shall compile 10 a report at the end of each year of the pilot program and submit 11 the report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to 12 the convening of the each regular session for all five years of 13 the pilot program. The report shall include: 14 (1)The number and types of patients served; 15 (2) The outcome of any treatment given; 16 (3) Any improvements in access to care; and 17 Patient satisfaction. (4)18 The reports shall be completed with the assistance of a 19 psychiatrist employed at the Waianae coast comprehensive health 20 center. 21 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed

22 and stricken. New statutory.material is underscored.



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SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011, 1 and shall be repealed on June 30, 2016; provided that section 2 465-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is reenacted in the form in 3 which it read on June 30, 2011. 4
