A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FARM TO SCHOOL MONTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawai'i is facing
many uphill battles, from the health of our keiki to the tough
economic times. Over the years Hawai'i has become dependent on
mainland food sources, which have led to food insecurity. The
tough economic times have led to farmers earning less.

6 The legislature also finds that since its inception in 7 1996, Farm to School programs nationwide have been making 8 healthy eating a priority in our schools and building strong 9 community connections. The Farm to School program provides 10 agriculture, health, and nutrition education opportunities while 11 supporting Hawai'i's farmers, and brings together schools and 12 local farms with the objective of serving healthy meals in school cafeterias and improving student nutrition. 13 The Farm to 14 School approach helps children understand where their food comes 15 from and how their food choices impact their bodies, the 16 environment and their communities at large.

1 The legislature also finds that the Hawai'i Department of 2 Health enacted the Healthy Hawai'i Initiative in 2000, in order 3 to promote healthier lifestyles through community-based targeted intervention. 4 Throughout the state, the Hawai'i School Garden 5 Hui is dedicated to addressing educational needs in agricultural sustainability by supporting existing school gardens, 6 7 implementing new school gardens and integrating locally grown 8 and made foods into cafeterias, snack programs and after school 9 programs with community involvement. 10 The legislature also finds that the Hawai'i Department of 11 Health supports other related programs like The Kokua 12 Foundation's Actively Integrate Nutrition and Agriculture In 13 Schools program (AINA IS). The AINA IS program is working to 14 address childhood health issues like obesity and being 15 overweight by fostering healthy eating habits and encouraging 16 environmental stewardship by connecting children to the land 17 that sustains them in addition to creating an institutional 18 market for Hawai'i's farmers and their produce. The AINA IS 19 program integrates Nutrition Education, Garden-based Learning, 20 Agricultural Literacy, Healthy School Lunch, Family & Community 21 Outreach and Waste Reduction and Management, which reduces, 22 reuses and recycles waste in gardens, cafeterias and classrooms. 1	The legislature also finds that these innovative programs
2	are helping Hawaiʻi through improving the health of Hawaiʻi's
3	keiki, establishing food security, growing the economy through
4	agriculture, and establishing Hawai'i's food security needs.
5	The legislature further finds that that United States House
6	of Representatives recently approved House Resolution 1655,
7	which designates October as National Farm to School month. The
8	resolution seeks to encourage direct farm to school programs
9	nationally, which should in turn bolster local agricultural
10	economies and improve school nutrition, and would be an outcome
11	that would be welcome in Hawai`i.
12	The purpose of this act is to designate October as Farm to
13	School Month in Hawaiʻi.
14	SECTION 2. Chapter 8, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, is amended
15	by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
16	read as follows:
17	"§8- Farm to School Month. The month of October
18	shall be known and designated "Farm to School Month in Hawaiʻi".
19	This month is not and shall not be construed as a state
20	holiday."
21	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
22	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
