A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CARGO INSPECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that over ninety per cent 2 of the more than two hundred thousand shipping cargo containers 3 that arrive in Hawaii each year are from the continental United Only a small fraction of these containers, however, are 4 States. 5 inspected by government agencies. Shipping companies conduct 6 random checks of less than five per cent of incoming cargo **7** containers, and these inspections are mainly conducted to ensure 8 that senders of cargo have been properly charged. This lack of 9 sufficient cargo inspections means that there is ample 10 opportunity for illegal fireworks and explosives to be smuggled 11 into the State.

12 The legislature further finds that increased inspections 13 need to be carefully crafted to avoid delays and inefficiencies 14 in harbor operations that could impede commerce. One approach 15 is to use dogs to inspect cargo after they have been collected 16 by businesses, transported from the harbors, and unloaded off-17 site.

1	The purpose of this Act is to increase random inspections
2	of incoming cargo for illegal fireworks and explosives by
3	establishing a pilot program using dogs to inspect cargo
4	shipments after they have been transported from the harbors.
5	SECTION 2. (a) The departments of defense and
6	transportation, in consultation with federal and state agencies
7	and private organizations involved with shipping cargo into the
8	State, shall develop and implement a three-year pilot program to
9	use dogs to inspect incoming cargo for illegal fireworks and
10	explosives smuggled into the State. The program shall begin no
11	later than January 31, 2012.
12	(b) The pilot program shall include the use of dogs to
13	inspect incoming cargo that, after arrival into the State, has
14	been transported from any shipping port to off-site facilities
15	that include:
16	(1) Freight forwarder warehouses and other facilities
17	where consolidated cargo transported from any shipping
18	port is segregated and prepared for delivery; and
19	(2) Other commercial facilities where cargo containers
20	transported from any shipping port are unloaded.
21	SECTION 3. No later than twenty days prior to the

1	transportation shall submit to the legislature a report on the
2	implementation of the pilot program established pursuant to this
3	Act. The report shall include findings and recommendations,
4	including costs expended to date, the estimated cost of
5	operating the program on a permanent basis, and any proposed
6	legislation.
7	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the federal funds
8 .	received under the homeland security grant program the sum of
9	\$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
10	2011-2012 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
11	necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish and administer
12	the pilot program established by this Act.
13	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
14	of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
15	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011, and
16	shall be repealed on June 30, 2014.
