A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CARGO INSPECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that over ninety per cent
- 2 of the more than two hundred thousand shipping cargo containers
- 3 that arrive in Hawaii each year are from the continental United
- 4 States. Only a small fraction of these containers, however, are
- 5 inspected by government agencies. Shipping companies conduct
- 6 random checks of less than five per cent of incoming cargo
- 7 containers, and these inspections are mainly conducted to ensure
- 8 that senders of cargo have been properly charged. The lack of
- 9 sufficient cargo inspections means that there is ample
- 10 opportunity for illegal fireworks and explosives to be smuggled
- 11 into the State.
- 12 The legislature further finds that increased inspections
- 13 need to be carefully crafted to avoid delays and inefficiencies
- 14 in harbor operations that could impede commerce. One approach
- 15 is to use dogs to inspect cargo after arrival at the harbors but
- 16 prior to pick-up.
- 17 The purpose of this Act is to increase random inspections
- of incoming cargo for illegal fireworks and explosives by 2011-1034 SB169 SD1 SMA.doc



- 1 establishing a pilot program using dogs to inspect cargo
- 2 shipments after arrival at the harbors.
- 3 SECTION 2. (a) The departments of defense and
- 4 transportation, in consultation with federal and state agencies
- 5 and private organizations involved with shipping cargo into the
- 6 State, may develop and implement a three-year pilot program to
- 7 use dogs to inspect incoming cargo for illegal fireworks and
- 8 explosives smuggled into the State. The program, if
- 9 implemented, shall begin no later than January 31, 2012.
- 10 (b) Any pilot program under subsection (a) shall include
- 11 the use of dogs to inspect incoming cargo that, after arrival
- 12 into the State, is to be transported from any harbor to off-site
- 13 facilities that include:
- 14 (1) Freight forwarder warehouses and other facilities
- where consolidated cargo transported from any state
- 16 harbor to the final destination is segregated and
- 17 prepared for delivery; and
- 18 (2) Other commercial facilities where cargo containers
- 19 transported from any state harbor are unloaded.
- 20 SECTION 3. If a pilot program is implemented pursuant to
- 21 this Act, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 22 the 2013 regular session, the department of transportation shall

- 1 to the legislature a report on the implementation of the pilot
- 2 program established pursuant to this Act. The report shall
- 3 include findings and recommendations, including costs expended
- 4 to date, the estimated cost of operating the program on a
- 5 permanent basis, and any proposed legislation.
- 6 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the federal funds
- 7 received under the homeland security grant program the sum of
- 8 \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 9 year 2011-2012 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
- 10 necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 to establish and administer
- 11 a pilot program authorized by this Act.
- 12 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 13 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050, and
- 15 shall be repealed on June 30,
