## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LUPUS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. (a) The legislature finds the following: 2 (1)Lupus is an urgent national health issue. Lupus 3 results from an unbalanced immune system and can 4 become destructive to any organ in the body. Lupus is 5 unpredictable and potentially fatal, yet no 6 satisfactory treatment exists. Its health 7 consequences include disfiguring rashes, scarring, 8 disabling arthritis, heart attacks, strokes, seizures, 9 and organ failure; 10 (2) Misdiagnosis of lupus commonly occurs, resulting in 11 needless suffering, denial of health or life 12 insurance, and higher premiums for health insurance; 13 (3)National data indicate that more than 1,500,000 14 Americans suffer from lupus. According to Lupus 15 Hawaii, over ten thousand people in Hawaii are

16 affected by lupus;

17 (4) Lupus disproportionately affects Native Hawaiian,
 18 Pacific Island, Asian, African American, Hispanic,
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1		Latina, and Native American women, a health disparity	
2		that remains unexplained. Recent data show that	
3		ninety per cent of people with lupus are women, yet	
4		eighty per cent of women know little or nothing about	
5		lupus;	
6	(5)	Although recommendations have been made, no new drugs	
7		have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration	
8		in the last fifty years specifically to treat lupus.	
9	•	While current treatments for the disease may be -	
10		effective, they have side effects that often prove	
11		worse than the disease itself; and	
12	(6)	Annually, lupus treatment costs the nation in excess	
13		of \$31,400,000.	
14	(b)	The purpose of this Act is to create a statewide	
15	program to promote public and health professional education and		
16	awareness of lupus among public health and human services		
17	officials, physicians, nurses, and other health care providers		
18	and increase knowledge concerning the causes and consequences of		
19	lupus, the importance of early diagnosis and appropriate		
20	management, and effective treatment and management strategies.		
21	SECTION 2. (a) The director of health shall establish a		
22	working group within the department of health to develop a		
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comprehensive plan to improve lupus education and awareness in
 the State.

3 (b) The plan shall focus on minority populations and at-4 risk communities to raise public awareness, educate consumers, 5 and educate and train health professionals, human service 6 providers, and other audiences. The director of health shall 7 consider including the following activities in the plan: 8 (1)Distribution of medically-sound health information 9 produced by national organizations and government 10 agencies that deal with lupus, such as the National 11 Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control 12 and Prevention, the Arthritis Foundation, the American College of Rheumatology, the Lupus Foundation, and the 13 14 Social Security Administration, through county health 15 departments, physicians and other health 16 professionals, hospitals, health insurers and health 17 maintenance organizations, women's health programs, 18 and nonprofit and community-based organizations; 19 (2) Development of educational materials for health 20 professionals that identify the latest scientific and medical information and clinical applications; 21



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1	(3)	Working to increase knowledge among physicians,
2		nurses, and health and human services professionals
3		about the importance of lupus diagnosis, treatment,
4		and rehabilitation;
5	(4)	Supporting continuing medical education programs in
6		the State by provision of up-to-date information about
7		lupus and lupus research;
8	(5)	Providing the latest information on clinical advances
9		through statewide workshops and seminars to promote
10		in-depth professional development among health care
11		providers regarding the care and management of lupus
12		patients; and
13	(6)	Developing, maintaining, and disseminating a directory
14		of lupus-related services and lupus health care
15		specialist providers who diagnose and treat lupus.
16	(c)	The working group shall be composed of seven members
17	to be cho	sen by the director of health. The members shall have
18	lupus-rela	ated experience and shall include representatives from
19	relevant	state agencies; scientists with experience in lupus
20	research;	health and medical professionals with experience
21	treating	lupus patients; representatives from non-profit women's
22	and healt	h organizations, including Lupus Hawaii; and
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individuals with lupus. The members of the working group shall
 designate a chair from among its members and serve without
 compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses
 necessary to carry out their duties.

(d) The director of health shall submit the working
group's comprehensive plan to the legislature no later than
twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of
2012. The working group shall terminate on June 30, 2012.
SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect July 1, 2050.
