A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the
- 2 overrepresentation of native Hawaiians in the criminal justice
- 3 system is an issue that has not been adequately addressed.
- 4 The discussion of native Hawaiian social well-being has
- 5 highlighted some of that community's greatest strengths: the
- 6 inclusive nature of 'ohana, the cohesive power of communities,
- 7 and the growing sense of cultural identity. However, the
- 8 multiple stressors and social imbalances within the native
- 9 Hawaiian community have led to troubling outcomes, including
- 10 antisocial, self-destructive, and criminal behavior, that are
- 11 amplified by an enforcement and justice system in which
- 12 inequality is an ongoing reality.
- 13 The rates of arrest and incarceration for native Hawaiians
- 14 are among the highest of all major ethnic groups in the state.
- 15 The disproportionately high number of young native Hawaiian men
- 16 and women in the state's correctional system has profound
- 17 implications for native Hawaiian education. Educational and
- 18 other opportunities are severely limited for incarcerated



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- 1 adults. Native Hawaiian children of inmates are also at
- 2 increased risk of growing up without a parent to support them
- 3 through critical stages of growth and development. Moreover,
- 4 deviant activities which lead to arrests and incarceration, such
- 5 as crime and drug use, directly influence the safety and
- 6 stability of communities, which may further hinder the
- 7 educational prospects for native Hawaiian children and adults.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to require a correctional impact
- 9 statement to accompany any bill that is filed in a regular
- 10 session that passes second reading in the originating body and
- 11 that creates a new criminal offense, significantly changes an
- 12 existing public offense or the penalty for an existing offense,
- 13 or changes existing sentencing, parole, or probation procedures.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 15 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
- 16 read as follows:
- 17 "§21- Correctional impact statement. (a) A
- 18 correctional impact statement shall accompany any bill that is
- 19 filed in a regular session that passes second reading in the
- 20 originating body and that proposes to create a new offense,
- 21 amend an existing offense or the penalty thereto, or change
- 22 existing sentencing, parole, or probation procedures.



1	(b)	The correctional impact statement shall address the
2	following	issues concerning the bill:
3	(1)	Estimated number of new criminal cases per year;
4	(2)	Fiscal impact of additional persons confined,
5		including a reasonable estimate of the immediate
6		effect and the long-range impact upon correctional
7		facility capacity;
8	<u>(3)</u>	Projected impact on the social and economic conditions
9		of native Hawaiians;
10	(4)	Projected impact on at-risk communities;
11	<u>(5)</u>	Impact upon existing correctional institutions,
12		community-based correctional facilities and services,
13		and jails, including the probability that the
14		legislation may create a need for additional facility
15		capacity;
16	<u>(6)</u>	Projected impact of sentencing provisions on future
17		criminal justice and corrections populations and
18		resources; and
19	(7)	Other relevant factors as indicated by the
20		legislation.
21	The correc	ctional impact statement shall rely on available
22	factual da	ata. For purposes of paragraph (6), upon request of



1	the introducer of the bill, the corrections population		
2	management commission under section 353F- shall assist the		
3	introducer."		
4	SECTION 3. Chapter 353F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
5	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
6	and to read as follows:		
7	"§353F- Correctional impact statement; assistance in		
8,	preparation. The corrections population management commission		
9	shall assist in the preparation of a correctional impact		
10	statement of a bill as provided in section 21- , by applying		
11	the sentencing simulation model created under Act 267, Session		
12	Laws of Hawaii 2000, to assess the correctional impact of the		
13	bill on the corrections population."		
14	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored		
15	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2113.
