A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. During the 2005 special session, the 2 legislature adopted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005 3 (Act 8), to create the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the Hawaii state plan and the State's planning process. 4 The office 5 of the auditor was required to prepare and submit to the 6 legislature the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan. In enacting 7 Act 8, the legislature expressed its belief that government is 8 responsible for resolving daily and immediate issues and public 9 needs, while providing guidance to assure a sustainable future 10 and outlook.

11 The creation of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan comes 12 as the State faces a growing number of pressing issues, 13 including the steady deterioration of public infrastructure, the 14 lack of affordable housing, a continued reliance on a service-15 based economy, the vulnerability of Hawaii in a volatile global 16 energy market, possible interruptions in travel and to critical 17 food supplies, threats to fragile island ecosystems, ever-

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visitors over the long term. These issues all raise questions 1 2 about the long-term limits of growth in the State and motivate the need to begin planning and acting to assure Hawaii's future. 3 Clearly, a policy framework to establish sustainability as 4 5 a state priority and ensure a coordinated and coherent approach 6 to fulfilling the long-range vision for a sustainable Hawaii is The mission of the Hawaii 2050 task force and the 7 needed. objectives of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan focus on the 8 9 revitalization of the State's long-term planning process to better guide the future development of Hawaii. Addressing and 10 solving issues critical to Hawaii's way of life and natural 11 resources require coordinated community efforts to produce 12 comprehensive, long-range planning policies and actions. 13 In 2008, the legislature adopted Act 225, Session Laws of 14

14 In 2008, the legislature adopted Act 225, session Laws of 15 Hawaii 2008 (Act 225), directing the University of Hawaii at 16 Manoa college of social sciences public policy center to review 17 the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan and provide a definitive 18 framework for policy makers including defined data, data 19 sources, and benchmarks for each of the major goals.

20 The purpose of this Act is to establish sustainability as a
21 state priority by implementing the recommendation of the social
22 sciences public policy center to incorporate the Hawaii 2050



1 sustainability plan definitions, guiding principles, and goals, 2 into chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 3 SECTION 2. Chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 5 to read as follows: 6 "PART . 2050 SUSTAINABILITY POLICY 7 §226-Findings and purpose. In 2005, the legislature 8 enacted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005, to create 9 the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the Hawaii state plan and 10 develop sustainability policies to address the vital needs of 11 the State through the year 2050. The office of the auditor was required to prepare and submit to the legislature the Hawaii 12 13 2050 sustainability plan. 14 The task force developed a comprehensive sustainability plan that included guiding principles and five major goals for 15 16 Hawaii 2050. 17 The purpose of this part is to implement the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan, which shall serve as a guide for the future 18 19 long-range sustainability planning of the State. 20 §226-**Definitions.** As used in this part, the following 21 words and terms shall have the following meanings unless the 22 context indicates another meaning or intent:

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1	"Ahupuaa" means a traditional native Hawaiian resource and				
2	behavioral management system that ensures respect for the air,				
3	land, water, and other scarce natural resources that make life				
4	sustainable from the mountains to the sea.				
5	"Kanaka maoli" means native Hawaiians.				
6	"Sustainability" means achieving the following:				
7	(1) Respect of the culture, character, beauty, and history				
8	of the State's island communities;				
9	(2) Striking a balance between economic, social,				
10	community, and environmental priorities; and				
11	(3) Meeting the needs of the present without compromising				
12	the ability of future generations to meet their own				
13	needs.				
14	§226- Sustainability; guiding principles. (a) Hawaii				
15	residents desire a balance between economic, cultural, and				
16	environmental concerns and priorities. Thus, sustainability in				
17	Hawaii shall be established as the overall theme, and the				
18	guiding principles of Hawaii's sustainability policy shall be
