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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 388, Session
 Laws of Hawaii 1989, which established the Hawaii historic
 preservation special fund, set forth a set of guiding principles
 that are even more compelling and relevant today than they were
 in 1989:

6 "The legislature . . . finds that as we begin to compete
7 economically in the Pacific Basin, we are beginning to realize
8 that much of our strength lies in our own uniqueness - those
9 factors that provide us with a distinct advantage over our
10 competitors. . .

11 The legislature further finds that another distinct 12 advantage that has not been fully tapped is our unique historic 13 heritage. The preservation and enhancement of this valuable 14 resource can provide an additional attraction to our visitors in 15 addition to our beautiful climate, environment, and people. But 16 more important, the preservation of special elements of our past 17 can instill a distinct pride in our people and serve as a

18 reminder, through our historic buildings, documents,

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1 photographs, and sites, that we are indeed a unique people and 2 that we have a deep appreciation and sense of our place. 3 The purpose of this Act is to establish a Hawaii historic 4 preservation special fund to enhance and preserve elements of 5 our past that should be integrated into our daily living." 6 In the current economic climate, the legislature finds that 7 it is difficult to pursue new financial resources, including 8 private and philanthropic grants, to ensure the preservation of 9 Hawaii's heritage assets without a corresponding commitment on 10 the part of the State to provide an underlying baseline of state 11 funding support. 12 The purpose of this Act is to expand the uses of the Hawaii 13 historic preservation special fund and to capitalize on 14 accelerated construction programming proposed by the new 15 administration to assist in the restoration and preservation of

16 such heritage assets as the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani17 Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala.

18 SECTION 2. Section 6E-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is19 amended to read as follows:

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20 "§6E-16 Hawaii historic preservation special fund. (a)
21 There is established a Hawaii historic preservation special fund
22 into which shall be deposited the following moneys:

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1 (1)Appropriations by the legislature to the special fund; 2 Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and (2)3 private persons; 4 All proceeds collected by the department derived from (3) 5 historic preserve user fees, historic preserve leases or concession fees, fees charged to carry out the 6 purposes of this chapter, or the sale of goods; [and] 7 8 (4)Civil, criminal, and administrative penalties, fines, 9 and other charges collected under this chapter or any 10 rule adopted pursuant to this chapter [-]; and One per cent of all state fund appropriations for 11 (5) 12 capital improvements designated for the construction 13 or renovation of state buildings. All interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited [in] into the 14 15 fund shall become part of the fund. The fund shall be administered by the department; provided that the department may 16 17 contract with a public or private agency to provide the day-to-18 day management of the fund.

19 (b) Subject to legislative authorization, the [department 20 may expend moneys from the fund:] moneys in the fund shall be

21 expended solely for the following purposes:

22 (1) For permanent and temporary staff positions;

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1	(2)	To replenish goods;
2	(3)	To produce public information materials;
3	(4)	To provide financial assistance to public agencies and
4		private agencies in accordance with chapter 42F
5		involved in historic preservation activities other
6		than those covered by section 6E-9; [and]
7	(5)	To cover administrative and operational costs of the
8		historic preservation program[-]; and
9	(6)	For costs related to site modifications, display, and
10		interpretive work necessary to enhance the visitor
11		experience for the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum,
12		Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala,
13		including specific preventive maintenance and repairs
14		to restore these facilities to a condition reflecting
15		their status in Hawaii's history and the unique
16		heritage of its arts and culture; provided that the
17		ordinary maintenance or repair of any feature does not
18		involve a change in design, material, or outer
19		appearance or a change in the characteristics that
20		qualified the historic property for entry in the
21		Hawaii register of historic places.

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1	(c) The [department shall adopt rules in accordance with				
2	chapter 91 for the purposes of this section.] one per cent				
3	amount under subsection (a)(5), which is included in all capital				
4	improvement appropriations, shall be calculated at the time the				
5	appropriation bills become law. The moneys shall be transferred				
6	into the Hawaii historic preservation special fund upon				
7	availability of moneys from the appropriations for expenditure				
8	by the department in consultation with the comptroller; provided				
9	that from July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2015, when the				
10	transferred moneys exceed \$ annually, any moneys in				
11	excess of \$, but not more than \$, shall be				
12	expended by the comptroller for the purposes of subsection				
13	(b)(6), pursuant to subsection (e). Each agency receiving				
14	capital improvement appropriations shall calculate the one per				
15	cent amount and transfer the moneys into the Hawaii historic				
16	preservation special fund.				
17	(d) The comptroller shall work with the Bernice Pauahi				
18	Bishop Museum, Friends of Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and				
19	state parks division of the department to decide on the specific				
20	site modifications, display, interpretive work, and preventive				
21	maintenance and repair projects to be undertaken at the				
22	respective facilities for the purposes of subsection (b)(6).				
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1	<u>(e)</u>	Expenditures from the Hawaii historic preservation	
2	special f	und shall be made by the comptroller.	
3	<u>(f)</u>	The comptroller shall:	
4	(1)	Provide each agency receiving capital improvement	
5		appropriations with information regarding items that	
6		shall be included and excluded from the one per cent	
7		amount for historic preservation;	
8	(2)	Ensure that each agency calculates its one per cent	
9		amount correctly; and	
10	(3)	Ensure that each agency transfers the correct amount	
11		to the Hawaii historic preservation special fund in a	
12		timely manner.	
13	<u>(g)</u>	The comptroller and the department shall track amounts	
14	due from each agency under the one per cent requirement provided		
15	in this section."		
16	SECTION 3. The comptroller shall submit to the governor		
17	and the legislature:		
18	(1)	No later than twenty days prior to the convening of	
19		the regular sessions of 2012, 2013, and 2014, a	
20		complete and detailed report on any site	
21		modifications, display, interpretive work, and	
22		specific preventive maintenance and repairs for the	
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1 Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace, 2 Washington Place, and Mauna Ala; and (2) No later than twenty days prior to the convening of 3 the regular session of 2015, a final report on the 4 5 projects and expenditures for the Bernice Pauahi 6 Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and 7 Mauna Ala, and recommendations for a long-term plan to 8 restore and protect state-owned historic heritage 9 properties and facilities to ensure that all Hawaii 10 residents and visitors are able to access and benefit 11 from the arts, culture, and heritage experiences that 12 these properties and facilities provide. 13 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 15 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.

Hawaii Historic Preservation Special Fund; Uses

Description:

Requires one per cent of all state fund appropriations designated for the construction and renovation of state buildings to be deposited into the Hawaii Historic Preservation Special Fund. Adds the costs related to site modifications, display, and interpretive work necessary to enhance the visitor experience for the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, Iolani Palace, Washington Place, and Mauna Ala to the uses of the Fund. Requires reports to the Governor and Legislature. Effective July 1, 2030. (SB333 HD2)
