A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. In 2010, the board of education considered a
2	proposal	to increase the rigor of the existing optional board of
3	education	recognition diploma. The revised diploma requirements
4	would hel	p ensure that a student has established a strong
5	academic	foundation for success in college and in the workplace.
6	According	to the board of education's proposal, conditions that
7	led to th	e proposal include:
8	(1)	The department of education's ten-year strategic plan
9	N. Comments	goal that all students complete certain requirements
10		to obtain a college and career readiness diploma and
11 .		be prepared for life after high school;
12	(2)	A memorandum of agreement among the governor, the
13		department of education, and the University of Hawaii
14		in 2009 to significantly improve student achievement
15		in Hawaii by using American Recovery and Reinvestment
16		Act resources to advance education reform; and
17	(3)	An indication by the department of education in its
18		Race to the Top proposal to the federal government in

1	June 2010 that the board of education is scheduled to		
2	adopt a college and career readiness high school		
3	diploma for students entering high school in 2014.		
4	Additionally, the legislature finds that the skills and		
5	abilities required of students for gainful employment and		
6	college entrance are increasing. According to the Georgetown		
7	University Center on Education and the Workforce, by 2018		
8	sixty-five per cent of Hawaii's jobs will require postsecondary		
9	education and training beyond high school. Despite these		
10	trends, Hawaii ranks forty-first in the nation in the percentage		
11	of recent high school graduates who attend college. Even among		
12	Hawaii's students who do go on to attend college, many are		
13	academically unprepared and require remediation.		
14	Despite these compelling reasons, the board of education		
15	has yet to pass the proposal to offer the college and career		
16	readiness diploma. The legislature finds that Hawaii's public		
17	schools should encourage students and provide them with the		
18	opportunity to be better prepared for college and gainful		
19	employment.		
20	The purpose of this Act is to require the department of		
21	education to establish high school diploma requirements that air		
22	to establish college and career readiness.		

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1	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
3	and to read as follows:		
4	"§302A- College and career readiness diploma. The		
5	department shall establish high school diploma requirements for		
6	each public school student for the completion of a rigorous high		
7	school academic program that aims to establish a strong academic		
8	foundation with the requisite knowledge and skills to prepare		
9	the student to:		
10	(1) Enter postsecondary education or training programs,		
11	including degree or certification programs or an		
12	apprenticeship, without the need for remediation; and		
13	(2) Obtain, retain, and succeed in a career that offers a		
14	living wage and opportunities for advancement."		
15	SECTION 3. The department of education shall report to the		
16	legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of		
17	the regular session of 2012 on the effectiveness of the high		
18	school diploma requirements established pursuant to section		
19	302A- , Hawaii Revised Statutes, and any recommendations for		
20	amendments.		
21	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.		

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1 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
