A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO UNIVERSAL CHILDREN'S SAVINGS ACCOUNTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that figures from the 2 United States Census Bureau indicate that the State of Hawaii is 3 facing its third consecutive year with an increase in 4 impoverished residents. The poverty rate in Hawaii rose to over 5 twelve per cent in 2009, with more than 156,000 people living 6 below the poverty line. The poverty rate in 2009 was the 7 highest in Hawaii since 1997, when the poverty rate stood at 8 9 nearly fourteen per cent.

10 The legislature finds that nearly thirty per cent of 11 households headed by a single woman are in poverty. Poverty is 12 a cyclical problem, passing from generation to generation. It 13 is more likely that children being raised in poverty by single 14 mothers will remain in poverty throughout their lives.

15 The legislature also finds that the rate of family savings 16 is the lowest that it has been since the Great Depression. 17 Research indicates that over twenty-five per cent of households

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in Hawaii are "asset poor", meaning those households do not have 1 enough wealth to meet basic needs for a limited period of time. 2 The legislature also finds that a study conducted by the 3 Center for Social Development at Washington University in St. 4 Louis found that students with savings are significantly more 5 likely to pursue a higher education. Additionally, when savings 6 were taken into account, academic achievement was no longer a 7 significant predictor of college attendance. 8 The legislature finds that healthy children and adults are 9 less likely to live in poverty. Poor health practices in a 10 child's developmental stages can lead to an unhealthy lifestyle 11

12 as an adult, including conditions or habits such as obesity, 13 smoking, alcoholism, and substance abuse. Children with 14 unhealthy practices are less likely to pursue higher education. 15 It is imperative to infuse healthy behavior into the lives of 16 Hawaii's youth to increase the chances of having a healthier 17 Hawaii.

18 The legislature finds that the early periodic screening, 19 diagnosis, and treatment program is a federally mandated set of 20 services and benefits for all individuals under age twenty-one 21 who are enrolled in medicaid. of medicaid medical assistance must be covered, regardless of
 whether those services are otherwise covered under a state
 medicaid plan.

4 The legislature also finds that health service initiatives 5 under the children's health insurance program are activities 6 that promote public health, promote individual health, improve 7 or promote a state's capacity to deliver public health services, 8 or strengthen the human and material resources necessary to 9 accomplish public health goals. Health service initiatives must 10 be related to improving the health of children, including targeted and other low-income children. Health service 11 12 initiatives under the children's health insurance program are a 13 mechanism for states to get creative and utilize more federal 14 funding. However, no more than ten per cent of a state's 15 administrative costs may fund the children's health insurance 16 program.

17 The purpose of this Act is to establish a universal
18 children's savings account pilot project for medicaid-eligible
19 children who are enrolled in Hawaii's QUEST program.

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PART II



1 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a universal 2 children's savings account pilot project within the department 3 of human services for administrative purposes. 4 (b) The department shall apply with the United States 5 Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to launch a health services initiative under the children's health insurance 6 7 program. Under this program the department shall: 8 (1)Establish a children's savings account for every 9 medicaid-eligible child born from July 1, 2011, 10 through June 30, 2012, up to age five, who is enrolled 11 in the State of Hawaii's QUEST program; 12 (2)Add a contribution amount to an eligible child's 13 savings account, following the child's early periodic 14 screening, diagnosis, and treatment program visits; 15 (3) Develop and foster public-private partnerships in the 16 community to increase the contribution amount for each 17 eligible child's savings account; 18 (4)Promote and educate eligible children and their families on the importance of annual health visits to 19 20 encourage healthier lifestyles and practices; and

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1 (5) Promote and educate eligible children and their families on the importance of developing a savings 2 3 account. 4 (C) Eligible children shall not have access to the funds 5 in the universal children's savings accounts until they reach 6 eighteen years of age. Funds in universal children's savings accounts shall 7 (d) 8 be used only for health-related purposes; provided that, should 9 additional sources of funds become available and be deposited into the accounts in compliance with applicable laws, 10 regulations, and rules regarding the use of federal health 11 services moneys, then the additional deposited funds may be used 12 13 for purposes other than health-related purposes only to the extent that the additional deposits are in excess of the 14 deposits previously made for health-related purposes. 15 (e) The department may hire staff or contract with an 16 17 outside third party to administer this program. SECTION 3. The department shall submit a report to the 18 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 19 the 2012 regular session, which shall include: 20

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1	(1)	The status of the universal children's savings account
2		pilot project request with the United States Centers
3		for Medicare and Medicaid Services;
4	(2)	The number of savings accounts opened for eligible
5		children;
6	(3)	The total dollar amount necessary to open a savings
7		account for each eligible child;
8	(4)	The budgeted dollar amount for each matching
9		contribution in the year immediately following an
10		early periodic screening, diagnosis, and treatment
11		program visit for every eligible child;
12	(5)	The number of staff hired;
13	(6)	The name of any third party administrator contracted
14		to administer the pilot project, and the total dollar
15		amount of the contract;
16	(7)	The number and names of any private sector or
17		nonprofit partnerships established to support the
18		<pre>pilot project;</pre>
19	(8)	Any obstacles or challenges that were encountered; and
20	(9)	Any other relevant information pertinent to the
21		implementation and execution of the pilot project.

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SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
 provided that this Act shall be repealed on December 31, 2030.
