## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TO ASSESS THE IMPACT OF DIVERTING DRUG POSSESSION OFFENDERS FROM THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM TO DRUG TREATMENT PROGRAMS.

WHEREAS, the cost to enforce criminal drug possession 1 statutes through the criminal justice system is substantial; and 2 3 WHEREAS, according to a report entitled The Budgetary 4 Implications of Marijuana Decriminalization and Legalization for 5 Hawai'i, dated March 2007, by Lawrence W. Boyd, Ph.D, an 6 economist from the University of Hawaii West Oahu, state and 7 8 county law enforcement agencies spend \$4,100,000 per year to enforce marijuana possession laws, and an additional \$2,100,000 9 is spent by the courts each year to process marijuana possession 10 cases; and 11 12 WHEREAS, incarcerating one person costs taxpayers about 13 \$139 per day, or \$50,735 each year, whereas drug treatment 14 programs such as drug court cost taxpayers as little as \$8.77 15 per day, or \$3,201 a year; and 16 17 WHEREAS, drug treatment programs such as drug court produce 18 a recidivism rate of less than ten per cent for those who 19 complete the program, which results in many benefits to the 20 State including improved public safety; and 21 22 WHEREAS, other jurisdictions have established successful 23 programs by which drug possession offenders are placed into drug 24 treatment in lieu of charging the offender, or allowing the 25 offender to plead to a lesser offense and placing the offender 26 in treatment in lieu of imprisonment; now, therefore, 27 28 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, the 30 House of Representatives concurring, that the Attorney General 31

is requested to assess the impact of diverting drug possession 1 offenders from the criminal justice system to drug treatment 2 3 programs on the following: 4 5 (1)The criminal justice system; 6 (2)Drug treatment program resources; and 7 8 Public safety; and 9 (3) 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Attorney General is 11 requested to conduct the assessment in consultation with and 12 using the problem-solving abilities of a broad range of public 13 14 and private stakeholders including: 15 (1)Police; 16 17 Prosecutors and public defenders; 18 (2)19 (3)Judges and other court officials; 20 21 (4) Corrections administrators; 22 23 (5) Public health experts; 24 25 Drug treatment providers; and (6) 26 27 (7) Legal service providers; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Attorney General is 30 requested to submit a report to the Legislature of findings and 31 recommendations, including proposed legislation, not later than 32 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 33 34 2012; and 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Attorney General is 36 requested to address the following issues in the Attorney 37 General's report: 38 39 (1)The number of offenders that could be diverted from 40 the criminal justice system if the diversion occurred 41 before charging and the number that could be deferred 42 43 post-charging; 44 SCR LRB 11-2640.doc

(2) The effect of diversion on law enforcement, prosecution, judicial, and correctional resources;

- (3) The type, cost, and availability of treatment services that would be needed under a diversion program; and
- (4) The impact on public safety of diverting drug possession offenders and whether the impact could be reduced by, for example, excluding offenders with a history of violent offenses; and

12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Public 13 Safety, the Director of Health, the Attorney General, the Chief 14 Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, the chief of police of each 15 county, the prosecuting attorney of each county, the public 16 17 defender, and the Director of Legal Aid Services of Hawaii, who in turn, are requested to transmit copies to appropriate public 18 and private stakeholders. 19
