SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIVISION OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO INSTALL ADDITIONAL CIVIL DEFENSE WARNING SIRENS IN AREAS STILL WITHOUT SIRENS AND ENSURE THAT ALL SIRENS ARE IN WORKING ORDER AT ALL TIMES IN CASE OF DISASTER EMERGENCIES.

WHEREAS, at 7:46 p.m., Hawaii Standard Time, on March 11,
 2011, an earthquake with a magnitude of approximately 9.0 was
 felt in the city of Sendai on the island of Honshu in Japan; and

5 WHEREAS,, within forty minutes a tsunami with wave heights 6 of over twenty feet struck the city of Sendai with a brutal 7 force, killing thousands of residents; and

9 WHEREAS, the State of Hawaii shares a similar landscape,
 10 oceanography, and population with Japan; and

12 WHEREAS, a similar type of earthquake may happen within the 13 Hawaiian island chain to cause a tsunami to strike any island 14 within 30 minutes or less of an earthquake occurring beneath or 15 around the Pacific Ocean; and

WHEREAS, section 128-6(8)(D), Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to civil defense powers, authorizes the Governor to act through the Civil Defense Division of the state Department of Defense to provide warnings and signals for drills, alerts, or attacks and the mechanical devices to be used in conjunction therewith; and

24 WHEREAS, news reports of the March 11, 2011, tsunami in 25 Hawaii indicated that some civil defense warning sirens were 26 inoperable or that there were still pockets of communities 27 without warning sirens; and

29 WHEREAS, additional civil defense warning sirens and public
 30 safety communications equipment throughout the State of Hawaii

1 will improve the timeliness of the Emergency Alert System in 2 transmitting evacuation and other information to the public 3 through radio and television; and 4

5 WHEREAS, Act 5, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005,
6 relating to civil defense, states the legislative findings in
7 pertinent part:

"The legislature finds that the State's growing population and a general lack of awareness on the part of the public with respect to natural disaster preparedness, dictates appropriate government action. This Act addresses the need for disaster preparedness by appropriating funds for natural disaster preparedness, including tsunami and hurricane preparedness efforts"

WHEREAS, Act 5 appropriated out of the hurricane reserve trust fund the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2005-2006, and the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2006-2007, for tsunami and hurricane preparedness efforts, including installing and maintaining new siren systems, among other things; now, therefore,

25 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, the 26 House of Representatives concurring, that the Civil Defense 27 28 Division of the state Department of Defense is requested to install, as a matter of immediate urgency, additional civil 29 defense warning sirens in areas still without sirens and ensure 30 that all sirens are in working order at all times in case of 31 disaster emergencies; and 32

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Civil Defense Division report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2012 on the status and progress of the installation of additional civil defense warning sirens in areas still without sirens and efforts to ensure that all sirens are in working order at all times in case of disaster emergencies; and
