## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENCOURAGING FURTHER IMPLEMENTATION OF HOUSING FIRST PROGRAMS AND SERVICES TO COMBAT CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS.

1 WHEREAS, people experiencing chronic homelessness are Hawaii's most vulnerable community members, and are the least 2 3 likely of the homeless population to reach independent living; 4 and 5 6 WHEREAS, persons experiencing chronic homelessness comprise 7 over 26 percent of the homeless population in Hawaii, but require more than 50 percent of the resources allocated to 8 9 combat homelessness; and 10 WHEREAS, hospital and emergency room visits, police 11 interventions, and periods of incarceration for the chronically 12 13 homeless who suffer from physical and mental disabilities may 14 cost Hawaii between \$35,000 and \$150,000 per person each year; 15 and 16 17 WHEREAS, research has shown that providing permanent supportive housing can result in significant cost savings for 18 Hawaii; and 19 20 WHEREAS, research studies across the country indicate that 21 85 percent of people experiencing chronic homelessness who move 22 into permanent supportive housing stabilize and maintain that 23 housing; and 24 25 WHEREAS, a number of communities implementing housing first 26 27 programs are seeing reductions in the chronic homeless population; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the importance of permanent supportive housing and housing first programs; and 31

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1 WHEREAS, the Legislature enacted Act 212, Session Laws of 2 Hawaii 2010, which created a housing first special fund and 3 created a process for implementing housing first programs and 4 services; now, therefore, 5

6 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth 7 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, the 8 House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislature 9 support and encourage further implementation of housing first 10 programs and services as soon as possible, as a key strategy in 11 ending chronic homelessness of the most vulnerable individuals 12 in Hawaii; and

14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Secretary of the 15 16 United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, Secretary of the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, 17 Executive Director of the United States Interagency Council on 18 19 Homelessness, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, President of the 20 Senate, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chair of the Senate Committee on Human Services, Governor's Coordinator on 21 22 Homelessness, Director of Human Services, and Executive Director 23 of the Waikiki Health Center; and
