SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ENCOURAGING FURTHER IMPLEMENTATION OF HOUSING FIRST PROGRAMS AND SERVICES TO COMBAT CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS.

WHEREAS, people experiencing chronic homelessness are 1 2 Hawaii's most vulnerable community members, and are the least likely of the homeless population to reach independent living; 3 4 and 5 6 WHEREAS, persons experiencing chronic homelessness comprise 7 over twenty-six percent of the homeless population in Hawaii, but require more than fifty percent of the resources allocated 8 to combat homelessness; and 9 10 WHEREAS, hospital and emergency room visits, police 11 interventions, and periods of incarceration for the chronically 12 13 homeless who suffer from physical and mental disabilities may cost Hawaii between \$35,000 and \$150,000 per person each year; 14 and 15 16 WHEREAS, research has shown that providing permanent 17 supportive housing can result in significant cost savings for 18 19 Hawaii; and 20 21 WHEREAS, research studies across the country indicate that eighty-five percent of people experiencing chronic homelessness 22 who move into permanent supportive housing stabilize and 23 maintain that housing; and 24 25 WHEREAS, a number of communities implementing housing first 26 programs are seeing reductions in the chronic homeless 27 population; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the importance of 30 permanent supportive housing and housing first programs; and 31 32



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WHEREAS, the Legislature enacted Act 212, Session Laws of
Hawaii 2010, which created a housing first special fund and
created a process for implementing housing first programs and
services; now, therefore,

6 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth 7 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, the 8 House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislature 9 support and encourage further implementation of housing first 10 programs and services as a key strategy in ending the chronic 11 homelessness of the most vulnerable individuals in Hawaii; and 12
