SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING ALL HAWAII HIGH SCHOOLS TO PROVIDE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE CLASSES.

1	WHEREAS, article XV, section 4, of the Hawaii State
2	Constitution establishes the Hawaiian language ('olelo Hawai'i)
3	as one of the two official languages of the State; and
4	
5	WHEREAS, 'olelo Hawai'i is the only language in the United
6	States that is officially recognized at the state level; and
7	
8	WHEREAS, the designation of Hawaiian as an official
9	language of the State paved the way for the creation of Hawaiian
10	language revitalization programs, such as 'Aha Punana Leo and Ke
11	Kula Kaiapuni Hawaiʻi; and
12	
13	WHEREAS, the success of the 'Aha Punana Leo and Ke Kula
14	Kaiapuni Hawaiʻi programs have created a new generation of
15	speakers of 'olelo Hawai'i and increased the use and visibility
16	of 'olelo Hawai'i throughout the State; and
17	
18	WHEREAS, 'olelo Hawai'i is a defining feature of the
19	Hawaiian culture and a major part of what makes Hawaiʻi unique;
20	and
21	
22	WHEREAS, knowledge of 'olelo Hawai'i fosters a sense of
23	community and helps one to identify more closely with traditions
24	and values of Hawaiʻi; and
25	
26	WHEREAS, access to 'olelo Hawai'i classes through the public
27	school system would allow this knowledge to reach a broader
28	section of the population in a cost-effective manner; now,
