SENATE RESOLUTION

DECLARING THE SOVEREIGN RIGHTS OF STATES UNDER THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

1 WHEREAS, article I, section 1 of the state constitution 2 declares that "[a]ll political power of this State is inherent 3 in the people and the responsibility for the exercise thereof 4 rests with the people"; and

6 WHEREAS, the State has the right to be governed by the 7 people of Hawaii, free from the constraints of a centralized 8 federal government; and

10 WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States delegated 11 powers to Congress authorizing only the punishment of treason, 12 counterfeiting, piracies, and felonies committed on the high 13 seas, and offenses against the law of nations, slavery, and also 14 responsibility over the securities and current coin of the 15 United States; and

WHEREAS, the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States declares that "the powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people," thereby making all acts of Congress that assume to create, define, or punish crimes other than those so enumerated in the Constitution void and unenforceable; and

25 WHEREAS, the power to create, define, and punish other 26 crimes is reserved solely and exclusively to the respective 27 states, each within its own territory; and

WHEREAS, the other states that are considering similar
state sovereignty measures are Arizona, Massachusetts, Michigan,
Missouri, Montana, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina,
Oklahoma, Rhode Island, Virginia, and Washington; now,
therefore,

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BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth 1 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, 2 3 that this body declares that the states composing the United States of America are not united on the principle of unlimited 4 submission to the federal government, rather the United States 5 6 Constitution envisioned a federal government for special purposes -- delegating to that government certain definite 7 8 powers while reserving to each state the right to their own 9 self-government; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any act by the Congress of the United States, executive order of the President of the United 12 States of America, or judicial order by the United States 13 14 Supreme Court that assumes a power not delegated to the federal government by the United States Constitution and serves to 15 16 diminish the liberty of any state or their citizens should be 17 nullified, including but not limited to: 18 19 (1)Establishing martial law or a state of emergency within a state without the consent of the state 20 legislature; 21 22 (2) Requiring involuntary servitude or governmental 23 service other than a draft during a declared war, or 24 25 pursuant to, or as an alternative to incarceration after due process of law; 26 27 (3) Requiring involuntary servitude or governmental 28 service of persons under the age of eighteen other 29 than pursuant to, or as an alternative to, 30 incarceration after due process of law; 31 32 Surrendering any power, either delegated or reserved, (4)33 for any corporation or foreign government; 34 35 Any act regarding religion, further limitations on (5) 36 freedom of political speech, or further limitations on 37 freedom of the press; and 38 39 Further infringements on the right to keep and bear 40 (6) 41 arms including prohibitions of type or quantity of 42 arms or ammunition; and 43



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if any act of Congress that 1 becomes law or any executive or judicial order put into force 2 that is inconsistent with the powers authorized by the United 3 States Constitution for the federal government, then all powers 4 previously delegated to the federal government by the United 5 States Constitution should revert to the states individually and 6 any future government of the United States of America must 7 require ratification of three quarters of the states seeking to 8 form a government of the United States of America and will not 9 be binding upon any state not seeking to form a government; and 10 11

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 12 Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, 13 Majority Leader of the United States Senate, Speaker of the 14 United States House of Representatives, members of Hawaii's 15 congressional delegation, and the Governor. 16
