SENATE RESOLUTION

STRONGLY URGING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR AND THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FEDERAL AID TO THE STATE OF HAWAII FOR THE PROVISION OF VARIOUS STATE SERVICES TO MIGRANTS FROM THE COMPACT OF FREE ASSOCIATION NATIONS; DEEM MIGRANTS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE FEDERALLY FUNDED FINANCIAL AND MEDICAL ASSISTANCE; AND PROVIDE DIALYSIS AND CHEMOTHERAPY CENTERS IN MICRONESIA AND ALL AREAS WITHIN THE COMPACT OF FREE ASSOCIATION NATIONS.

WHEREAS, migrants from the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau are allowed to enter the State of Hawaii under the Compact of Free Association; and

WHEREAS, the cost to the State to provide various state services to the Compact of Free Association migrants continues to increase each year; and

WHEREAS, for example, in 2006, the State spent \$91,443,066 to provide services for these migrants and in 2007, the State spent an estimated \$101,163,113 in state funds; and

WHEREAS, many state agencies provide a broad range of health and social services to Compact of Free Association migrants who have moved to Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, for example, in 2007, various state agencies spent a total of \$101,163,113 as follows to provide services to the Compact of Free Association migrants in Hawaii:

- (1) Department of Human Services -- \$37,116,012 to provide services including, among other things, financial assistance, medical assistance, and emergency housing and outreach for homeless persons;
- (2) Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Office of Community Services -- \$717,360 to provide social services, including employment readiness training and

1 cultural awareness education, to 503 Compact of Free 2 Association migrants; 3 Department of Health -- \$6,829,020 to provide a 4 (3) 5 variety of community-based and direct health care and health-related education, most notably related to 6 7 tuberculosis, Hansen's disease, and other communicable diseases, which are over-represented within the 8 9 populations making up the Compact of Free Association; 10 (4)11 Department of Defense -- \$21,130 to provide 12 educational and intervention services directed at 13 children and young adults who are considered at risk 14 for becoming juvenile offenders, who come from needy 15 families, or who receive services from the State's Department of Human Services; 16 **17** 18 (5) Department of Education -- \$53,586,418 to educate 19 students from the Compact of Free Association nations 20 who typically require specialized language services that utilize extra resources of the Department of 21 22 Education; 23 (6) The University of Hawaii -- \$1,958,627 in foregone 24 25 revenue due to the practice of allowing all students 26 from the Compact of Free Association nations to pay 27 the lower state resident tuition, regardless of the 28 date of their initial residence in Hawaii 29 (discontinued beginning with the 2008 fall semester **30** due to budget restrictions); 31 (7) 32 Department of Public Safety -- \$839,500 for costs of 33 1,425 arrests on 2,509 charges resulting in 613 convictions and 224 incarcerations of Compact of Free 34 35 Association migrants. Costs are exacerbated by a shortage of qualified and reliable interpreters that 36 37 can result in delayed hearings and additional costs; 38 Judiciary -- \$82,796 for interpreter services; and 39 (8) 40 41 (9) Office of the Public Defender -- \$12,250 for

interpretation services necessary to provide legal

defense; and

43 44 WHEREAS, migrants from the Compact of Free Association nations are proportionally over-represented in the population of persons who receive various state social services in Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 prevents needy persons from the Compact of Free Association nations from receiving federally funded financial and medical assistance; and

WHEREAS, when that law went into effect in 1997, Hawaii continued to provide equivalent services for the Compact of Free Association migrants using state funds; and

WHEREAS, if the Personal Responsibility and Work
Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 is amended to allow the
Compact of Free Association migrants to receive federally funded
financial and medical assistance, the State would not have to
expend state funds to provide the equivalent services, thus
allowing more of the State's general funds to be used for
services and programs for which federal funding is not
available; and

WHEREAS, there is a need for dialysis and chemotherapy centers in Micronesia and all areas within the Compact of Free Association nations; and

WHEREAS, the federal government must address the issue of additional federal support for the State to continue providing state services arising from the unique federally created relationship between the United States and Compact of Free Association nations; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, that the United States Department of the Interior and the Congress of the United States are strongly urged to provide additional federal aid to the State of Hawaii for the provision of various state services to migrants from the Compact of Free Association nations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of the Interior, Office of Insular Affairs, is strongly urged to review the funding of the Compact Impact Assistance grant and to make every effort to increase the amount of direct assistance available to Hawaii to offset costs incurred by the State; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Congress is strongly urged to support federal legislation to amend the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 to render Compact of Free Association migrants eligible to receive federally funded financial and medical assistance; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of the Interior is strongly urged to provide dialysis and chemotherapy centers in Micronesia and all areas within the Compact of Free Association nations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of the Interior is strongly urged to identify and secure other forms of direct assistance to the State and the Compact of Free Association population in the United States, including grants from other sources and federal programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, United States Secretary of the Interior, Director of the Office of Insular Affairs, Majority Leader of the United States Senate, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, members of Hawaii's Congressional Delegation, Chairperson of the Board of Education, Chairperson of the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii, Adjutant General, and Directors of Human Services, Labor and Industrial Relations, Health, and Public Safety, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, and Public Defender.
