SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A STUDY ON PROHIBITING THE COLLECTION OF HAWAII'S ENDEMIC MARINE ORNAMENTAL FISH FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, ornamental fish are fish that are kept in 1 aquariums and prized for their beauty and rarity; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, recent studies have shown that Hawaii's coral 5 reefs and ornamental fisheries are under severe stress from 6 ocean acidification, non-point source pollution, unsustainable 7 fishing practices, and the ornamental fish aquarium trade; and 8 9 WHEREAS, there are one hundred three species of fish that are collected in Hawaii, and forty-five per cent of the top 10 twenty collected species are endemic to Hawaii; and 11 12 WHEREAS, ornamental fish collectors capture large amounts 13 14 of targeted fish species, which results in their exploitation; 15 and 16 17 WHEREAS, more than fifty per cent of ornamental fish species die within a week of being in captivity; and 18 19 WHEREAS, according to a recent study of the aquarium trade, 20 there has been a significant decline in ornamental fish biomass 21 in areas where the aquarium collection trade is not regulated as 22 compared to areas where it is regulated; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, for instance, in unregulated areas there has been 26 a fifty-eight per cent decline in the achilles' tang, a fiftyfour per cent decline in the longnose butterflyfish, a forty-27 seven per cent decline in the yellow tang, and a forty-six per 28 cent decline in the moorish idol; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, fish-collecting practices associated with the aquarium collection trade have damaged coral reefs in the 32 33 following ways: 34

(1)Nets entangle the reef and branching corals are 1 2 damaged when aquarium collectors set and retrieve 3 their nets; 4 5 (2) Coral is broken as collectors grab fish or pound the coral with sticks to flush fish out of hiding; and 6 7 8 (3) Kneeling on the coral causes the coral to become prone 9 to disease; and 10 11 WHEREAS, studies show that eighty per cent of collected fish are herbivores, such as the yellow tang, that feed on 12 13 algae, and over collecting such fish decimates their 14 populations, which directly increases algae overgrowth, a main 15 contributor of coral degradation; and 16 WHEREAS, the decrease of fish biomass threatens the 17 survival of marine species and coral reefs because high 18 19 biodiversity is necessary for coral reef health and other 20 species stability; and 21 22 WHEREAS, news reports indicate that the number of reef fish 23 in Hawaii has declined by sixty per cent in the past twenty 24 years; and 25 WHEREAS, Hawaii's tourism industry is dependent on the 26 health of Hawaii's aquatic ecosystem, with roughly thirty-five 27 per cent of Hawaii's jobs related to the visitor industry and 28 reef tourism generating \$1,000,000,000 annually for the State's 29 30 economy; and 31 32 WHEREAS, in contrast, aquarium collectors contribute \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 annually to Hawaii's economy; and 33 34 35 WHEREAS, the commercial aquarium fish trade violates the traditional Hawaiian value, "Malama aina," which discourages 36 destructive fishing practices such as overfishing and waste, and 37 instead supports sustainability and the protection of fish 38 species so that the species thrive and the ecosystem is 39 balanced; and 40 41 42 WHEREAS, the loss of Hawaii's beautiful coral reefs and endemic fish species poses a significant threat to the public 43

welfare and without intervention could deprive future

generations of Hawaii residents of having the opportunity to learn about and enjoy Hawaii's ocean environment; now, therefore,

5 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth 6 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, 7 that the Department of Land and Natural Resources is requested 8 to study the efficacy of prohibiting the collection of Hawaii's 9 endemic marine ornamental fish for commercial purposes, with the 10 exception of permits sought for propagation or educational, 11 medical, or scientific purposes; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and Natural Resources is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2012 Regular Session; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this
Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board of
Land and Natural Resources.
