SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR TO BEGIN DISCUSSIONS AND PLANS TO ESTABLISH PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS TO BUILD PRISONS AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES IN THE STATE.

1 WHEREAS, for over ten years the State has sent inmates to 2 the mainland for incarceration due to overcrowding in our 3 prisons; and 4 WHEREAS, over \$50,000,000 of Hawaii funds are spent 5 6 annually to incarcerate these inmates on the mainland; and 7 8 WHEREAS, these funds are not circulating in our economy, 9 but in the economies of other states, providing jobs and opportunities for mainland residents and companies; and 10 11 WHEREAS, inmates on the mainland are not able to have close 12 13 support from family and friends for their rehabilitation and re-14 entry efforts; and 15 WHEREAS, there have been documented problems at some of the 16 mainland facilities with our female prisoners and with our 17 incarcerated men; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the majority of our female prisoners were recently 20 returned from Kentucky due to sexual assaults and other issues; 21 22 and 23 WHEREAS, new prisons and correctional facilities in the 24 State would create local construction jobs, public safety jobs, 25 and allow inmates to be close to their supportive families; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, there are private companies that are willing to establish public-private partnerships with the State to build 29 new prison facilities in Hawaii using their financial resources; 30 and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, the State would not have to provide funds up front to begin these projects, but would pay monthly payments for a 34 35 set period when the projects are completed; and



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2	WHEREAS, ownership of the facilities would revert back to
_	the State after all payments have been completed; and

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5	WHEREAS, some private companies would be willing to operate
6	the facilities using union workers and paying union wages; and
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8	WHEREAS, public-private partnerships would allow for
9	efficient construction, financing, and leasing in a reasonable
10	timeframe; and

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12	WHEREAS, public-private partnerships would also allow the
13	State to take advantage of a favorable bidding and
14	subcontracting environment in terms of pricing and relatively
15	low bond interest rates; now, therefore,
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17	BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth
18	Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011,
19	that the Legislature supports the concept of public-private
20	partnerships to build prisons and correctional facilities in the
21	State and urges the Governor to begin discussions and plans to
22	establish public-private partnerships as soon as possible to
23	deal with the State's prison overcrowding and to return the
24	majority of our prisoners who are incarcerated on the mainland;
