HB-1456 Status	RELATING TO THE PETROLEUM INDUSTRY. Makes unfair trade practices by the petroleum industry subject to administrative rather than criminal penalties. Decreases the amount of fines imposed for each violation. Imposes fines for each day of violation.	CPC, JUD
HB 1455 Status	RELATING TO PETROLEUM PRODUCTS. Allows gasoline dealers to enter into cooperative purchasing agreements to acquire discounts on gasoline purchases.	CPC, FIN
HB 1257 Status	RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES. Requires the PUC to consider technology, carbon emissions, and cost to consumers when considering an electric utility's application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity.	CPC, JUD
HB 1271 Status	RELATING TO THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY TAX. Requires 50 per cent of public utility taxes collected to be deposited into the general fund. Repealed on 7/1/16.	CPC, FIN
HB 880 Status	RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION. Allows public utilities to make electronic filings with the public utilities commission.	CPC, FIN
HB 832 Status	RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION. Requires cable television operators and public utilities to issue refunds to subscribers in the event of service interruptions.	CPC, FIN
HB 1272 Status	RELATING TO CABLE TELEVISION. Directs the director of DCCA to reduce the moneys paid to support public, educational, and governmental access facilities by an unspecified percentage in FY 2011-2012, and to transfer the retained moneys to the general fund.	CPC, FIN
HB 1043 Status	RELATING TO THE HAWAII HURRICANE RELIEF FUND. Appropriates funds from the Hawaii Hurricane Relief Fund into the State general fund to balance the State budget.	CPC, FIN

Provides greater flexibility in determining the types of related entities that may be affiliated with and insured by a pure captive insurance company.
