Requires an application to register to vote in person or by mail-in to include a request for permanent absentee ballot. Removes time limit on requesting an absentee or permanent absentee ballot but not later

than 4:30 p.m. on the seventh day prior to the election.

Status

Allows election day voter registration.

Status Est

Establishes conditions to inspect required records and receipts of cash business transaction and permits records to be prepared by hand or by cash register. Clarifies state of mind for violation of record and receipt requirements. Limits fine for violation if person is otherwise in

compliance with tax laws.

Status

Establishes a one-time amnesty program for delinquent income tax obligations, provides equitable relief in certain tax situations, and places the burden of proof on the department of taxation in certain

circumstances.

HB 1532 Status RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY TAX APPEALS.

Requires real property tax appellants to first obtain a decision from an administrative body established by county ordinance prior to appealing

to the Tax Appeal Court.

HB 823 RELATING TO TRAFFIC FINES AND FEES. TRN, JUD, FIN (HSCR13) Raises certain fines and fine ceilings for traffic offenses. Increases <u>Status</u> administrative fees for certain traffic offenses and allocates a portion of those moneys to the judiciary computer system special fund, judiciary facilities repair and maintenance special fund, and the general fund. HB 1004 RELATING TO CHAPTER 480, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES. JUD, FIN Status entities to bring an action for damages notwithstanding their status as indirect purchasers. HB 1009 RELATING TO FINGERPRINT RETENTION BY HAWAII JUD, FIN <u>Status</u> CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA CENTER. Allows the State to retain fingerprints of employment and licensing applicants for whom criminal history record checks are authorized statutorily so that the State can implement a statewide "Rapback" program. HB 1011 RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY JUD, FIN Status GENERAL. Amend sections 28-16 and 661-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to enable the Attorney General to retain and deposit thirty-three percent of any recovery from any civil action or settlement of a civil claim initiated or prosecuted by the Attorney General to be used for staffing, expenses, equipment and training. HB 297 RELATING TO THE PROBATION SERVICES FEE. JUD, FIN Status Imposes a probation services fee on any defendant granted a deferred acceptance of guilty or no contest plea. HB 1139 RELATING TO DISTRICT COURTS. JUD, FIN Status Clarifies the circumstances under which a district court may serve a summons or other writ outside of the State. HB 1005 RELATING TO CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT. HUS, JUD, FIN (HSCR48) Includes tribal IV-D agencies and foreign countries as defined under Status federal regulations as authorized agencies that services and information can be provided to and received from. HB 684, HD1 RELATING TO MINORS. HUS, JUD, FIN (HSCR36) Allows a minor to give informed consent for emergency shelter and related services. Effective July 1, 2050. (HB684 HD1) Status RELATING TO THE HAWAII UNIFORM COLLABORATIVE HB 626 JUD, FIN Status LAW ACT Enacts Uniform Collaborative Law Act, which authorizes disputants to enter into collaborative law participation agreements signifying interest to resolve the dispute without intervention of a tribunal (court or other

enter into collaborative law participation agreements signifying interest to resolve the dispute without intervention of a tribunal (court or other third party decision maker). Requires parties to a collaborative law process to disclose information fully, candidly, and informally without formal discovery. Subject to certain exceptions, disqualifies attorneys in the collaborative process (and their law firms) from appearing before a tribunal to represent a party in a proceeding related to the collaborative matter.
