terms of imprisonment run concurrently unless directed to run

consecutively by law or court order.

RELATING TO REPEAT OFFENDERS.

Status

Excludes non-violent offenders from repeat offenders statute requiring

mandatory minimum prison terms.

HB 56, HD1

RELATING TO CHILD VISITATION.

HUS, JUD

(HSCR475) Status

Permits family court to award reasonable visitation to grandparents if denial of visitation would cause significant harm to the child.

Establishes a rebuttable presumption that visitation decisions by a parent are in the best interests of the child. Presumption may be rebutted by a preponderance of clear and convincing evidence. Identifies factors court may consider in awarding visitation. Effective

July 1, 2050. (HB56 HD1)

HB 616, HD1 (HSCR476) **Status**

RELATING TO CHILD CUSTODY.

HUS, JUD

Clarifies that awards of visitation rights may include visitation by electronic communication. Establishes factors that shall be considered and authorizes courts to set guidelines for visitation by electronic

communication. Effective July 1, 2050. (HB616 HD1)

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HB 909, HD1 RELATING TO FAMILY COURT. HUS, JUD (HSCR394) Provides that the date of valuation of marital assets is the date of the Status filing of the divorce complaint. Defines duties owed by parties to a divorce. Defines various terms. Effective date July 1, 2050. (HB909 HD1) RELATING TO EVIDENCE. HB 1376 JUD Status Makes permanent the limited news media privilege against the compelled disclosure of sources and unpublished information. HB 194 RELATING TO EVIDENCE. JUD <u>Status</u> Makes permanent the limited news media privilege against the compelled disclosure of sources and unpublished information. <u>H</u>B 354 RELATING TO TAX APPEALS. JUD Status Prohibits discovery and limits the award of costs in controversies involving small claim tax appeals. HB 618 RELATING TO OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC ORDER. JUD Makes the use of another person's name or persona to create a web Status page on or to post one or more messages on a commercial social networking site, without the permission of the other person, and with the intent to harm, defraud, intimidate, or threaten any person, a misdemeanor. Makes the repeated commission of this offense a class C felony. Provides that harassment by impersonation, if committed with the intent to solicit a response by emergency services personnel, is a class C felony. HB 1007 RELATING TO PORNOGRAPHY OFFENSES AGAINST JUD Status CHILDREN. Amends the offense of promoting pornography to minors to extend the prohibition against disseminating pornographic material to minors to include disseminating pornographic material to another person who represents that person to be a minor; and adds the offense of promoting child abuse in the third degree to the information charging law. HB 1010 RELATING TO THE DISCLOSURE OF VITAL STATISTICS JUD Status RECORDS TO LAW Authorizes the Department of Health to provide certain public health records to law enforcement officers to facilitate criminal investigations. RELATING TO CIVIL RIGHTS. HB 546 LAB, JUD (HSCR5) Prohibits discrimination on the basis of gender identity and expression Status as a public policy matter and specifically with regard to employment. SB 1309, SD1 RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE LIEUTENANT JUD, LMG, FIN (SSCR157) GOVERNOR SPECIAL FUND. Status Establishes fees for services provided by the office of the lieutenant

governor. Specifies the authority of the lieutenant governor to issue apostilles. Requires the auditor to analyze the establishment of a

lieutenant governor special fund. (SD1)

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HB 238, HDI (HSCR393) Status	RELATING TO TEMPORARY RESTRAINING ORDERS. Adds a mandatory prison term of fifteen days and a fine of not less than \$150 nor more than \$600 for a person with certain prior convictions who is convicted for the first time for violation of a temporary restraining order. Effective July 1, 2050. (HB238 HD1)	HUS, JUD
HB 44 Status	RELATING TO PROSTITUTION. Makes it a misdemeanor to offer or agree to pay a fee to engage in sexual conduct within 750 feet of a school or public park. Effective 7/1/11.	JUD
HB 240 Status	RELATING TO PROMOTING PROSTITUTION. Amends section 28-101, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to give the "greatest priority" to cases involving promoting prostitution, when the attorney general is determining whether to fund or provide for witness security and protection.	JUD
HB 241 Status	RELATING TO PROMOTING PROSTITUTION. Increases the grade of offense for promoting prostitution in the first, second, and third degree to a class A, B, and C felony, respectively.	JUD
HB 242 Status	RELATING TO PROMOTING PROSTITUTION. Amends Act 192, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, to make the offense of habitual solicitation of prostitution a class C felony.	JUD
