

Thank you for considering me for a position on the Hawai'i Historic Places Review Board.

Answers to questions listed under point (2) in your correspondence of March 22 are as follows:

(a) My wish to serve as a member of the Hawai`i Historic Places Review Board emanates from my interest in nurturing the preservation of Hawai`i's historic and cultural heritage. This endeavor will contribute to the understanding and enjoyment of history and culture by residents, as well as, build a stronger tourist industry. I recently completed a Masters thesis on Singapore that explained how historic preservation legislation helped re-energize the economy and bond the citizenry to the state. I wish to influence Hawai`i in that direction.

My interest in historic preservation was piqued at an early age. I was raised in a suburb founded as a farming community in1695. As an elementary school student on my way to school, I walked each day past a home built in 1700 that had three sub-basements. The downtown of our community retained the feel of an nineteenth century farm village. This interest thrust me into a career in historic preservation.

Upon moving back to Hawai'i in 1998, I volunteered to work as a docent at Bishop Museum. A cultural awareness course given for docents increased my interest in the history and culture of Hawai'i. This led me to enroll in the Graduate Certificate Program in Historic Preservation at the University of Hawai'i.

(b) The roles and responsibilities of the Hawai'i Historic Places Review Board are clearly delineated in Chapter 6E, §6E-5.5, of Hawaii Revised Statutes. These duties include (1) assessing the integrity and historic significance of properties considered for listing on the Hawai'i Register according to established Register criteria, (2) recommending said properties for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places, if appropriate, (3) reviewing the State survey of historic properties, (4) reviewing the content of the State historic preservation plan, (5) electing a chairperson and vice-chairperson for the Board, (6) maintaining the Hawai'i Register of Historic Places inclusive of all Hawai'i properties listed on the National Register, and (7) instituting a program to notify and publish information regarding properties listed. I would also be available to consult with State Historic Preservation Division staff concerning specific resources, should the need arise.

(c) My qualifications for a seat on the Board are my experience and training in this field. I hold a Graduate Certificate in Historic Preservation from the University of Hawai`i. The focus of my Master of Urban and Regional Planning degree from the University of Hawai`i was Historic Preservation Planning. I also hold a Master's degree in Secondary Education / History from Long Island University. During the completion of a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from the State University of New York at Stony Brook, I completed numerous courses in architectural history.

I prepared numerous Determinations of Eligibility for the National Register of Historic Places during the 17 years I worked as an architectural historian. I also reviewed the architectural history reports of private consultants, as well as the work of staff archaeologists, in my role as Heritage Resource Coordinator for two regional districts of the California Department of Transportation. I prepared architectural history surveys for an architectural firm in Honolulu.

(d) I hope to be able to promote the recognition of additional landscapes and trails for their cultural and historic value, as well as expand the number of recognized built properties. I would also like to develop a program to encourage public agencies and private parties to create revolving funds to restore historic properties for adaptive reuse. I would like to see Hawai'i replicate Singapore's success in achieving the goal of "creating a tourist hub, a dream destination of memorable experiences."

(e) I am innovative. I was at the cutting edge of an effort to broaden the National Register to be more inclusive of historic landscapes. I did research at the Library of Congress in 1982 to satisfy the concerns of the Keeper of the National Register about a Determination of Eligibility that I helped prepare for Beverly Gardens Park in Beverly Hills, California.

I am not easily discouraged by initial failure. I was able to discover the location of the only existing copies of a rare architectural journal printed in the 1890s that had been lost by UCLA for 20 years. The contents of this journal were then copied and distributed to architectural libraries throughout California.

I have unusual and unorthodox research skills. While researching the history of El Sereno, California, formerly known as Bairdstown, I was able to locate the great-granddaughter of the developer, who had inexplicably disappeared close to a century before. She possessed materials concerning the initial development of the community that were previously unknown to exist.

Knowledge of potential sources of information is critical when assessing the significance or integrity of historic properties. At times Board members may require additional research before making a final decision. My individual qualities will help during discussions of the Board. Relating my experiences to other board members and/or and those submitting nominations will help resolve issues of inadequate research on properties.

(f) A dilemma was faced in the tourist dollar-dependent historic community of San Juan Capistrano, California. A major highway had to be widened to accommodate commuter traffic and commercial vehicles. Adjacent to the roadway on the south was the National Register listed mansion of the nephew of the last Mexican Governor of California. At the top of the slope on the north side of the roadway was a National Register eligible cemetery. Engineers proposed a 60-foot high retaining wall to replace the slope adjacent to the cemetery. This would have disturbed the historic setting of both historic properties. The grandson of the historically significant nephew, whose parents were buried in the historic cemetery, threatened to sue the State of California if it proceeded with the project. He was a wealthy landowner with deep pockets. He also lobbied City staff and local NGOs against the project. I was able to bring all the parties to a mutually acceptable solution. There was a 40-foot wide parcel of land at the top of slope, adjacent to the cemetery, not suitable for any zoned use. The City agreed to purchase the parcel from the owner and quit claim it to the state DOT. The slope was then replicated 40-feet to the north, leaving space below for two additional lanes. This preserved the historic ambiance of the City.

The Hawai'i Historic Places Review Board does not operate in a vacuum. There are times when controversial issues are brought before the Board and the State Historic Preservation Division. My ability to discover innovative solutions to difficult problems will benefit the discussions of the Board.

(g) I do not currently own any real property in Hawai'i, nor do I have an interest in any commercial establishment. Should I purchase real property during my term on the Board or find future employment in a private firm or public agency, I would recuse myself from discussion and voting for any property presented where I would have a potential conflict of interest.

In consideration of GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE 540 AS AMENDED BY GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE 575 -SUBMITTING FOR CONSIDERATION AND CONFIMATION TO THE HAWAII HISTORIC PLACES REVIEW BOARD GUBERNATORIAL NOMINEE GEORGE CASEN FOR A TERM TO EXPIRE 6-30-2014

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports the gubernatorial appointment of George Casen to the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board for a term to expire 6-30-2014.

The Hawaii Historic Places Review Board was established under Section 6E-5.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to: (1) Order and enter historic properties into the Hawaii Register of Historic Places on the basis of their value to Hawaii's heritage; (2) Evaluate and, when appropriate, recommend the nomination of historic properties to the National Register of Historic Places; (3) Review the state survey of historic properties; (4) Review the content of the State Historic Preservation Plan; and (5) Maintain the Hawaii Register of Historic Places (including all those listed on the National Register of Historic Places).

Section 6E-5.5, HRS, also requires that the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board include at least one professionally qualified member of each of the following disciplines: Archaeology, Architecture, History, and Sociology. In addition, there shall be on person knowledgeable in traditional Hawaiian society and culture.

George Casen was born in Queens County, New York. He has lived in New York, France, California, and Hawaii. His education includes a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science, from the State University of New York at Stony Brook; a Master of Science in Secondary Education/History from Long Island State University; a Certificate in French Studies from the University of Paris, Sorbonne; a Master of Urban and Regional Planning from the University of

Hawaii at Manoa; and a Graduate Certificate in Historic Preservation also from the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

Positions held by Mr. Casen include Lead Environmental Planner at Parsons Brinkerhoff in Organ County, California; Associate Environmental Planner in Architectural History for California Department of Transportation, Santa Ana, California; Architectural Historian at Mason Architects, Honolulu, Hawaii; Programs and Operations Manager for Historic Hawaii Foundation, Honolulu; Planner at the Office of Environmental Quality Control, Honolulu; and Planner at the Hawaii State Department of Transportation, Honolulu.

During his tenure in these positions Mr. Casen has worked with communities and other government agencies to reach consensus on challenging issues. He is particularly proud of a highway project that succeeded in improving transportation capacity while protecting the environment and architecture of the San Juan Capistrano Mission in Southern California.

The Department welcomes the knowledge and experience Mr. Casen will bring to the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board, and as such, supports his appointment.

I am writing in support of Mr. George Casen's nomination to the Hawai`i Historic Places Review Board. He would be an excellent addition to the Board.

Mr. Casen and I worked together when he was an architectural historian at the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). In that position he evaluated many buildings and a variety of property types within our project areas to determine their eligibility to the National Register of Historic Places (National Register), as well as to determine whether project effects would have the potential adverse effects to historic properties. This work was done in order to comply with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as well as state environmental laws. Caltrans policy is to use the National Register eligibility criteria and its accompanying bulletins and guidance for these evaluations. One specific project was very controversial, involved hundreds of potential historical resources, and required working under difficult time lines. he was tactful, professional and thorough in his evaluations.

Mr. Casen's knowledge of the National Register program and its criteria is comprehensive and he is very experienced in synthesizing information and concluding whether a property meets these criteria. His expertise in cultural resources evaluation and management enables him make expert decisions on properties that are complex, controversial or borderline in their ability to meet National Register criteria.

I am writing in support of the nomination of George Casen for the Hawai'i Historic Places Review Board. worked with George for many years during the time he was an architectural historian for the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). In my capacity as the Caltrans "Section 106" Cultural Resources Coordinator for half the state at that time. I both reviewed his reports and advised him on cultural resource issues under both state and federal law. George's work was exceptionally well-thought-out and well-written. I was contacted by George Casen, who related to me that he has been nominated to the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board by the Office of the Governor. George asked me to provide a letter to this email address stating my recommendations concerning his suitability for this position.

I worked with George for about 2 years (2003-2005) while he was employed at Mason Architects here in Honolulu where we were both architectural historians. During that time I found him to have an excellent understanding of National Register requirements and the historic preservation process, both at Hawaii State and National levels. We worked on a couple projects that required evaluating many different types and sizes of properties along roadways for their eligibility, Nimitz Highway corridor on Oahu and Kapaa bypass route on Kauai. During these projects George displayed valuable insight and accurate preservation analysis during the initial examination and subsequent research of eligible properties. He showed a good ability to quickly determine eligibility potential and selecting property types to focus on in further research. George also revealed his expertise in federal preservation compliance and its applications to transportation projects.

I feel that his familiarity with the National Register requirements and his eye for preservation would make him an effective member of the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board, and I recommend him for a place on that Board.

I would like to submit testimony in favor of George Casen's nomination for the Hawaii Historic Places Review Board. I worked with George for about four years beginning in late 2003 at Mason Architects, Inc, where he was employed as an architectural historian. Our desks were adjacent to one another and I got to know him fairly well. He was completing his Graduate Certificate in Historic Preservation at that time, and I and another employee attended his practicum presentation on initiatives to preserve historic buildings and neighborhoods in Singapore, I observed that he was a diligent researcher, particularly good at uncovering information about people and families connected with historic buildings in Hawaii, and he had stories to tell about his many years experience as an architectural historian in California, where he worked on the preservation of historic buildings potentially impacted by the actions of CalTran. Once I assisted him in conducting a "windshield survey" to identify and evaluate historic buildings along Nimitz Highway that were potentially eligible for the National and Hawaii Registers. This survey was done as a preliminary part of planning for the Nimitz Flyover. Although a windshield survey may often be no more than a drive by and superficial perusal, George asked me (I drove his car) to stop at every site on our list, where he got out of the car and examined the property from as close a vantage point as was possible. He identified four properties along Nimitz Highway that were potentially eligible and subsequently made the case for preserving them. I remember that he spotted the Kapalama Gates, which had not been on our list of properties to evaluate, recognized them as historic, and then returned to the office to research their origins. The gates were subsequently added to the list of eligible properties.

George is also interested in local politics and frequently contributes letters to local newspapers, particularly on issues relating to historic preservation.

He appears to me to be perceptive, committed, and humane, and I believe he would contribute valuable insights to the Board.
