1. Why did I decide to apply to serve on the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board?

As a teacher, parent, child advocate and community member, I believe that it is essential to provide students with well qualified teachers. To meet this need, it is necessary to have an organization to promote standards to move our education system forward. I believe that my years in education have provided me with experiences and insights have prepared me to help promote the profession of education by promoting quality and excellence. As a teacher, I have experience in both elementary and high school, as well as general education and special education. As a parent, I have had to advocate for my own children when they were not receiving the best possible education. Together, these experiences have helped me to form my particular views on what it takes to provide quality education for all of Hawaii's children.

- 2. Given my understanding of the role and responsibilities of a member of the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board, why do I believe that I am qualified for the position? Having taught for over twenty-five years, worked in the federal and state governments, and lead a negotiations team during some of our state's most contentious times, I have had the opportunity to work with many different people in many different situations. My tenure on the Committee for Citizens with Disabilities helped me to deepen my understanding of the needs of the community. As a certified and licensed teacher and a former independent business person, I understand and appreciate the need for increased professionalism. As a classroom teacher, I also understand the need for and appreciate having guidelines to improve the profession. My years as a faculty representative at my school and a chairperson on the HSTA Negotiations Committee have also helped me to see not only the needs of the teachers, but also to appreciate the needs and concerns of administration. Together, these experiences have helped to prepare me to be a contributing member of the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board.
- 3. What do I perceive the role and responsibility of the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board as it relates to teacher quality and student achievement?

Having high standards leads to improved teacher quality, which ultimately leads to increased student achievement. Teacher quality is not just having graduated from an accredited institution. It goes far beyond that. Teachers need to be able to focus on providing quality instruction. To do this, they need support from the various parties involved in education. They need clear and consistent goals. (The days of revolving programs must end.) Incoming teachers from out of state must be better prepared to teach in Hawaii. The culture of our state is so different, that without proper support, success may be extremely difficult. Research indicates that schools with consistent staffing are more successful, so it would be in our best interest to better prepare and support teachers so that they may provide that desired quality education.

Additionally, to provide quality teachers, we must encourage and support the achievement of higher education. More opportunities must be made available if we are to have teachers remain current in best educational practices. Given that so many teachers have second jobs and/or families, more programs must be found and approved so that our classroom teachers can achieve advanced degrees. Only thus, can we truly support teachers to continue to improve themselves educationally and provide a greater quality education.

Finally, the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board needs to have an increased reciprocal relationship with teachers and the other involved parties. Teachers receive different

directions, mandates and suggestions from their employer, union, licensing board and governance authority, making success and quality teaching difficult to achieve. All four parties must use greater common sense and increased communication in providing direction and structure for our teachers. Also the HTSB needs to make greater effort to reach out to teachers to keep them informed about the licensing process, share new educational opportunities, and to be aware of current challenges so that they can be addressed as we continue to strive for greater quality education.

4. Identify one short- and one long-term goal as a Hawaii Teacher Standards Board member and how I would accomplish these during my term of service.

I actually have four goals that I would like to pursue as a member of the board.

My short-term goal is to give a "face" to the HTSB. Too many teachers have no knowledge of the HTSB, what it does or how it exists to help them to be better teachers and to provide Hawaii's students with a quality education. While HTSB has gone "paperless" in order to make information more accessible, the website is still cumbersome and lacks the ability to personally reach out to teachers. The HTSB needs to be more teacher friendly. To do this, HTSB members should reach out to teachers by visiting schools, attending HSTA Representative meetings and taking the time to talk with teachers and administrators. This will help the HTSB to take temperature checks about what is really happening in the schools, as well as to help promote the need to maintain and increase licensure. With this, HTSB videos (as found on the web site) can be shown at schools on the administrative days to promote teacher awareness to ensure that they are maintaining their licensing status and encouraging them to work towards acquiring new skills (education).

One long-term goal is to improve the recruitment and retention of highly qualified teachers. This would require a four-pronged approach involving the BOE, DOE, HSTA and the HTSB. It will require greater communication and cooperation among the four parties. This is essential if we are to minimize the yearly need for "Emergency Hires," "Code Ws" (those not yet having passed Praxis) and "Code 5s" (those having no education degree). In starting each school year with qualified teachers, we can begin to move in a direction that would provide all of Hawaii's children with highly qualified teachers, thereby making them more ready to become productive members of society.

A second long-term goal specifically addresses Special Education. To avoid possible litigation and to provide the best possible educational experience for our students with varying degrees of disabilities, Special Education teachers must be adequately trained.

Emergency hires or reassigned teachers (out of their area of certification) need immediate training. When students with intense needs enter the school, the teacher needs to be provided with immediate training to support the safety needs, as well as educational needs, of that new student.

My third long-term goal is to expand options for continued higher education. Many of the approved advanced degrees offer Master's of Education degrees in the same disciplines. More areas of study need to be offered, and more on-line only programs need to be approved. In this way, we can support more teachers attaining higher levels of education and being more highly qualified.

5. Can I foresee any possible conflict of interests that could arise during my service on the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board? How would I overcome any possible conflicts of interest?

The possibility of a conflict of interest is ever present. As of this moment, however, I see no particular issue that might pose problematic. If one arises, though, I believe that I would notify the chair immediately and seek their input on how I should respond. While I have always considered myself to be fair and able to see both sides of an issue, I also am willing to excuse myself if the chair feels that an issue may not receive fair treatment because of my being too close to the issue.
