The Honolulu Police Department urges you to support House Bill No. 1010, Relating to the Disclosure of Vital Statistics Records to Law Enforcement Officers.



RE: H.B. 1010:

Relating to the Disclosure of Vital Statistics Records to Law

**Enforcement Officers** 

Chair Keith-Agaran and Members of the Committee:

This measure would allow law enforcement officers access to our public health statistics records in order to gather evidence in a criminal investigation.

The Office of the Public Defender opposes H.B. 1010.

The Hawaii Constitution guarantees its citizens the right to privacy. Our public health records are confidential, and individuals and agencies are allowed access to those records on an extremely limited basis. We believe that allowing access to law enforcement officers as part of their criminal investigation is an invasion of privacy. All a law enforcement officer would need to show is that the vital statistics are needed as evidence in a criminal investigation.

The argument that death certificates will assist law enforcement with their criminal investigations is unfounded. They receive coroners' reports from the Medical Examiner's Office as part of the normal course of their investigations. These records are detailed reports that list the cause of death, and provide much more information than a death certificate.

Law enforcement officers can apply for search warrants and/or subpoena records they believe are relevant to their investigation. We believe that the judicial approval required for the issuance of search warrants and subpoenas provide an added layer of protection of our privacy rights.
