Chair Espero and Committee Members:

I am Major General Darryll Wong, Director of Civil Defense, State Department of Defense. I am providing written testimony on House Bill 121 H.D. 1.

House Bill 121 H.D. 1 will appropriate funds out of the general revenues for fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 for the operational expenses of the Hawaii Civil Air Patrol. This proposed bill will enable the Hawaii Civil Air Patrol to continue its operations in support of the Hawaii Civil Defense system. These operations are especially crucial to the Civil Defense warning system for tsunami alerts, as demonstrated in the tsunami warning on March 10-11, 2011. Additionally, the Hawaii Civil Air Patrol performs other important missions for Civil Defense such as air reconnaissance, aerial damage assessments, inland search and rescue, and small cargo delivery when inter-island transportation is not available.

We support the intent of House Bill 121 H.D. 1 as long as it does not replace or adversely impact priorities as established in the Executive Biennium Budget Request.



NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS - The Hawaii Wing launched statewide tsunami warnings late Thursday following an 8.9 magnitude earthquake off Japan's northeastern coast.

Eight Civil Air Patrol Cessnas with full crews flew pre-assigned warning routes around Hawaii's islands to look for anybody on or near the shoreline. The planes began sounding the tsunami warning at 10:18 p.m. Thursday Hawaii time, nearly five hours before the forecast tsunami arrival time at 3 a.m. today (8 a.m.

"It is a bit unusual for us," said Capt. Anthony M. Ferrara, incident commander for the CAP mission and alterting officer for the wing. "We don't usually do nighttime ops, but because the tsunami was due to hit early this morning, our pilots made sure Hawaii's citizens were notified so they could safely move out of

In addition to Hawaii, tsunami warnings or alerts were issued for dozens of places, including the West Coast of the U.S. and Alaska. The Pacific Tsunami Warning Center said the tsunami struck Hawaii's easternmost island of Kauai about 3 a.m. and was headed to other Hawaiian islands.

CAP's three Kauai aircraft were first off the ground, meeting the wing standard of being ready to launch within one hour of an alert from the warning center. The wing's other five planes launched soon afterward.

Aircrews flew predetermined routes around the remote shoreline areas of the islands, sounding the tsunami warning siren and broadcasting a voice warning via a speaker system attached to the outside lower portion of each plane's fuselage.

Several of the aircrews launched multiple flights. All aircraft were on the ground at 5 a.m. (10 a.m. EST) today, standing by for possible damage assessment flights after daybreak.

On the West Coast, the California Wing was placed on tsunami alert late Thursday. Working in conjunction with the National Operations Center at CAP National Headquarters, the wing's director of operations and assistant director of emergency services, Lt. Col. Mitch Richman, authorized a mission to move seven aircraft from coastal airports starting about midnight.

After a request from the state's Office of Emergency Services, the wing was activated for possible disaster relief flights this morning. Crews are on standby in preparation for coastal assessment flights.

"The response by the flight crews and base staff has been fantastic," said Lt. Col. Steve Asche, incident commander and wing director of emergency services. "We have more than enough crews for the tasking at this time. We are ready to provide emergency services throughout the state if required."

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TSUNAMI ALERT FINDS HAWAII MEMBERS READY TO RESPOND

HAWAII – Hawaii Wing members stood ready to respond Tuesday after the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center issued its first tsunami bulletin at 8:06 a.m.

local time, notifying the public of a 7.9 magnitude earthquake in the Pacific's Samoa Island region and the resulting potential for a tsunami to be generated.

Simultaneously, Hawaii Civil Defense sent out automated cell phone voice and text messages to select alert team personnel -- Including the wing's director of operations, Capt. Anthony Ferrara, and its squadron commanders.

At 8:59 a.m. a second bulletin was Issued declaring a tsunami warning and watch in effect, with an estimated time of arrival of 1:11 p.m. for Hawaii if an actual tsunami had been generated. In the meantime, the magnitude of the earthquake had been upgraded to an 8.3.

Civil Air Patrol members were notified by Civil Defense to stand by for possible deployment to fly their designated tsunami routes around the islands to look for anybody on or near the shoreline and broadcast a warning about the impending danger through a speaker sound system attached to the outside lower portion of their plane's fuselage.

A third bulletin Issued at 10:34 a.m. said sea level readings indicated a tsunaml had indeed been generated. Water buoys in Pago Pago showed an increased water height of 5.1 ft.

The Hawaii Department of Emergency Management sent out warnings to the public to stay out of the water and away from shorelines. Lifeguards, firefighters and police were dispatched to local beaches to explain notify beachgoers that the advisory was in effect.

At that point, seven of the nine Hawaii Wing aircraft stood ready for deployment.

At 11:38 a.m., however, a fourth and final bulletin was issued canceling the tsunami warning and watch.

"If we had been notified to deploy, I feel we would have been very successful in our endeavor," said Ferrara, who served as incident commander.

"The time of day was good, the weather was good and we had available CAP personnel and aircraft ready to go.

"We were lucky to have the time needed to prepare for whatever might hit, unlike those living in American Samoa, who were devastated by an immediate inundation from the tsunami waves," he said.

"We do our best to live up to the CAP motto, 'Semper Vigilans' – Always Vigilant ... to be always ready whenever needed – as it is only a matter of time before the next earthquake and tsunami will hit!"

I am testifying <u>IN SUPPORT OF HB 121 HD 1</u>, Making an Appropriation to the Civil Air Patrol, Hawaii Wing for Tsunami Operations.

On Friday, March 11, 2011, the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center notified The Hawaii State Civil Defense of a pending tsunami which was generated by an earthquake off the Island of Honshu, Japan. It measured magnitude 8.9 on the Richter Scale, Also on Saturday, morning, 27 February 2010, the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center notified the Hawaii State Civil Defense of a pending tsunami which was generated by the Chilean earthquake, which measured magnitude 8.8 on the Richter scale. Both were classified as a "major earthquakes". The Hawaii State Civil Defense immediately alerted the Civil Air Patrol to fly and provide aerial warning to low lying inundated areas where there would be a danger to swimmers, surfers, campers, and to residents living in areas where there was no state Public Address Systems or Siren warning system. Nine Civil Air Patrol single engine aircraft were airborne and provided warning for all islands in the state of Hawaii. We had two airplanes in Kauai, two on the Big Island, two on Maui, two for the island of Oahu and one spare, which was later used due to one of our assigned aircraft had to return due to maintenance problem. CAP aircrews reported campers shining their flashlights and responding to the warning by breaking down their camp sites. Hawaii was very fortunate that it was spared a major tsunami. Previous years, Hawaii was not very lucky. Recall the Hilo incident where the citizens of the Big Island suffered many deaths and destruction of the town. On another tsunami, CAP members on the island of Kauai was responsible for saving many lives during a tsunami. During Hurricane

Iniki, Civil Air Patrol provided communications from the battered island of Kauai to Hawaii State Civil Defense which helped the rapid recovery for the citizens of Kauai. Civil Air Patrol Hawaii was organized back in 1951 to assist the Air Force and the US Coast Guard for search and rescue. Up to 1996, Civil Air Patrol was funded to accomplish its tsunami mission in the amount of \$196,000. In 1996, due to the state of the Hawaii economy, this funding was stopped. The Air Force provides funds for training for search and rescue. Money for state tsunami and disaster training are not Air Force funded. In 2003, the Hawaii State Legislature funded CAP \$50,000 with

matching funds from the Hawaii State Civil Defense, CAP has not received legislative funding since 2003. Minimal Tsunami training has continued through support from the Federal Homeland Security from the Hawaii State Civil Defense. However, CAP has been briefed that this funding will be reduced or the status of this federal funding is unknown. Remember, Civil Air Patrol members are all "non paid volunteers." These members fly aerial missions, man the Incident Command Center, maintain and operate the radio communications net, maintain the airplanes through their sense of community and love for their fellow brothers and sisters of their community, city, state and nation. Civil Air Patrol is requesting funding for training of our CAP personnel so that they can maintain constant readiness when and ever the time another tsunami hits Hawaii. It is not a matter of "if" but "when.!" CAP also assists the Hawaii Air National Guard in its air defense mission by flying as single engine penetrators to the Hawaii air defense system. CAP fly escort missions interisland whenever the Guard needs to ferry their helicopters interisland. CAP does whatever it can to assist the Hawaii State Civil Defense in natural disasters. Because of the value of Civil Air Patrol, I urge your support for passage of HB 121, Making an Appropriation to Civil Air Patrol.
