



My name is Bahman Sadeghi, and I am the president of Island Dairy Inc. I am writing to you today, to ask for your **support** of Livestock Revitalization Bill 1570. As you may know, Island Dairy is one of two remaining dairies left in the State.

Island Dairy was one of the many beneficiaries of the Livestock Revitalization bill passed in 2007. It provided us the opportunity to not only survive a difficult market, but also allowed us time to reinvent ourselves.

In the past 3 years, Island Dairy has been trying to become self sufficient by growing as much locally grown feed as possible. As with any new venture, there was a learning curve in trying to obtain the knowhow and at the same time, investin equipment and land development. A task made more difficult as our operation was scrambling in survival mode.

We very much need to keep our livestock industry alive. Once we lose an operation, it will be exponentially more difficult to start a new one, considering the required capital and regulatory demands as well as land use.

The passage of Bill 1570 will provide for us an opportunity to sustain the operations we have been committed to and develop it further with additional investments. All necessary to compete with mainland imports.

We all know that cost of transportation will continue to escalate over the next couple of decades. We need to think long term and recognize if we continually innovate and invest in our operations, the trend is in our favor. This coupled with food safety and security, makes this a vital interest for the State.

Livestock industry should be looked upon as an agricultural infrastructure of the State. We need to ride through these uncertain times and keep our focus on the long-term.

### Greetings,

I am Valerie Kaneshiro, herd manager for our family farm on Kauai. Mamo Kaneshiro's family has been farming hogs in this area over 90 years. And I myself have been caring for these fine individuals, over 30 years. But in the winter of '07-'08, I cried. Feed prices had skyrocketed due to the use of corn for ethanol. We're efficient producers who work long hours to provide a fresh protein product that's in high demand. But even I began to doubt that we could make ends meet, so my husband Derwin and I began to reduce the herd for what would be our phase-out. And then the Livestock Revitalization Program saved us. A lot of really exciting things have happened since then!

The money was directly invested in new feed-saving feeders. We fixed the pens. And, it allowed us to set up a real office where others can come and help with accounting. Mamo and Haruko were still running the large successful business out of a porch off the back of their bedroom.

In addition, things have been looking up on other fronts. We're seeing more people supporting our local economy, and specifically, a local food scource. They're eating fresh and patronizing local farmer's markets, grocery stores, and restaurants featuring locally grown food. We are proud members of the new Farm Bureau sponsored, Kauai Grown program. More and more restaurants and individuals around the state are calling, asking to buy our pork. You see, pork is not like beef that is better aged. With pork, fresher tastes better.

Pigs are incredibly useful creatures. There are so many ways they play a vital role in sustainability and recycling. For years, farmers and nurserymen have been wanting the manure in an easy to transport form, for its fertilizer and soil amendment value. In the last couple years, revolutionary new ideas in pen design are being implemented using green waste in the pens, making it easier for farmers to gather their manure byproducts for use in composting and even alternate energy generation. We're moving forward with bold plans, in conjunction with Pacific Light & Power, to incorporate our hog's manure with green waste to fuel a biodigester that will generate electricity and revitalize large segments of Kauai. Byproducts from electrical generation will be a high value soil amendment and refrigeration for a modern, efficient, mobile slaughter and processing plant. Kauai is in dire need of a processing facility in order for the livestock industry to persevere, and the pigs will play a pivotal role in making that become a reality.

There is so much opportunity for growth and employment, not just for us, but for others too. We've been able to help a neighboring free-range layer chicken business grow. Because we have feed containers coming from the mainland, it helps them get feed and supplies to their birds too. Without Kauai Farm's Garden Island Eggs, we have no other egg farm on Kauai.

And our local community college is looking to intensify an agricultural initiative. At a recent planning session, having mentors and internships on farms was identified as a key to its success. We're looking forward to partnering with KCC, and others, to train the next generation of agriculturists.

Lots of organizations in our community have benefited from this farm. We continue to donate fresh pork to countless school groups, church groups, sports teams, hula halaus, cancer society, clubs, and families. We're happy when we can give!

Meanwhile, we hear farmers on the mainland are planting record acreages of corn and soy beans, trying to keep up with world demands. Also, there are groups pushing for an end to the ethanol subsidies, and a repeal of the approval for 15% ethanol. We're hoping that corn and soybean prices will stabilize.

In the near future, alternative energy production, like biodigestion, will be something pigs will play a vital role in, while we work at developing other energy sources that do not require food (corn) to make fuel (ethanol).

We sincerely appreciate any help saving our last herds in Hawaii. The bloodlines, acclimated and selected for generations to thrive in our climate, are irreplacable. When they're gone-- they're gone.
