- 1 EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA) supports the intent of this measure and

the agencies neglects to mention the current service providers in Maui, Hav	vaii, and	l Kauai

EOA recommends that references to these programs be deleted from the Section 1. In addition to the list being incomplete, Kupuna Care services are competitively procured, and therefore, listing the names of the agencies that provides the service has the potential to create confusion because the legislature cannot appropriate funding to a private non-profit, but rather, can make a grant under Chapter 42F, HRS, to such an entity. Kupuna Care is allocated by EOA according to a Kupuna Care funding formula recently re-negotiated with the four county-based Area Agencies on Aging (AAA). EOA contracts with the AAAs to administer Kupuna Care, and in turn, the AAAs procure through open competition for Kupuna Care services. As a result of the competitive procurement, one or more of the named agencies may or may not be awarded.

Additionally, the naming of specific agencies also runs contrary to EOA's efforts, in line with nationwide best practices and our system's change federal grants, to use person-centered planning. Support plans are to be designed based on the needs and values specific to each participant. Person-centered planning is not supported when the proportion of funds allotted to each service, or agency, is predetermined. Services need to be allocated as each individual's support plan is designed.

EOA also recommends that page three, lines 16-17, be corrected as follows: "...3,277 elders received meals [were] delivered to their homes..."

Chair Oshiro and Members of the Committee:

The City and County of Honolulu's Elderly Affairs Division strongly supports this bill.

The Elderly Affairs Division is Honolulu's designated Area Agency on Aging and operates in accordance with the Older Americans Act of 1965 to coordinate, advocate, and improve services to assist older persons in leading independent, meaningful, and dignified lives in their own homes and communities for as long as possible.

This bill provides additional funding for the Kupuna Care program, which provides essential services that support the needs of the increasing population of frail elderly residents in Hawaii. The funding included in this bill is essential to maintaining the health and welfare of our most vulnerable seniors. We respectfully urge the Committee to pass this bill.

While we strongly support the additional appropriation in this bill, we also strongly support including appropriations for the Kupuna Care program in the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) base budget in the future. POSITION:

As a member of The Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs, I strongly support HB 160 HD1 which would provide additional funds for the Kupuna Care program through the fiscal year 2013.

RATIONALE:

The Policy Board for Elder Affairs has a statutory obligation to advocate on behalf of the senior citizens of Hawaii. While we advise the Executive Office on Aging, we do not speak on behalf of the Executive Office of

Aging.

\$ We understand the current fiscal crisis facing the state of Hawaii. However, the care of frail elders is an immediate need and should be an important priority for public support.

- the Kupuna Care services, which persons not eligible for Medicaid services, enable families to care for their elders at home and also keep persons from having to go on Medicaid. Not to fund basic home and community services would result in many case of persons having to use higher cost residential care, usually at public expense.
- the current Kupuna Care services fall short of meeting the critical need, and the demand for these services will continue to grow. There are wait lists for most services, although they are urgently needed. The state is falling far short of providing for its most vulnerable citizens who are in critical need.
- \$ These critical services have major impacts on the quality of life of frail elders and their caregivers and the cost of the services is relatively low compared to other expenditures of the state. Thus, I strongly

recommend support for additional funding in order to meet our moral obligations to those in greatest need.

Chair Oshiro and Committee Members:

My name is Barbara Kim Stanton, State Director of AARP Hawaii. AARP is a membership organization of people 50 and older with nearly 150,000 members in Hawaii. We are committed to championing access to affordable, quality health care for all generations, providing the tools needed to save for retirement, and serving as a reliable information source on issues critical to Americans age 50+.

AARP strongly supports HB 160, HD1. The purpose of the bill is to appropriate out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$3.5 million for the fiscal year 2011-2012, and the same sum for the fiscal year 2012-2013 for the Kupuna Care program. This funding shall be in addition to the \$4,854,350 executive office on aging base budget.

AARP is requesting that to be consistent with the Kupuna Care appropriation in Act 191, Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, Sections 5 and 15, this bill break out the Kupuna Care allocation as follows:

- 1. \$3,000,000 for Kupuna Care
- 2. \$500,000 for meals for the elderly for Kupuna Care

The passage of this bill is vital as:

- This bill will provide an ongoing, sustainable source of revenue for Kupuna Care, that can be counted upon each year by seniors and their caregivers who depend and rely upon Kupuna Care to provide occasional, yet important respite services.
- Hawaii's population over age 65 is increasing rapidly and projected to increase by 86% between 2007 and 2030.
- More than one out of every five (22%) Hawaii residents will be age 65 or older in 2030.
- The population ages 85 and over will increase by 64% between 2007 and 2030.
- Approximately 169,000 family caregivers are the backbone of Hawaii's long term care system and currently provide \$1.4 billion a year of unpaid care. But they need help – in the form of respite and some services.
- The number of family caregivers is declining. The primary family caregiver group is 50-64 years old. This group will decline by 10% by 2030, and cause further strain on seniors and remaining caregivers.

We urge you to support seniors by passing HB 160, HD1 with the suggested amendment, as it funds safety net programs that support our most vulnerable population — the elderly, caregivers, and seniors.

Lanakila Pacific strongly supports measure HB 160, HD 1, to provide much needed additional funding for the Kupuna Care program. As a nonprofit organization that serves thousands of seniors each year with meals, we understand that this group is an especially vulnerable population in our community.

As a Kupuna Care service provider, Lanakila Meals on Wheels, a program of Lanakila Pacific, serves more than 250,000 meals for seniors each year. Our staff and volunteers deliver more than a nutritious meal, as they may be the only person that the senior will spend time with each day. Our average meal recipient is a woman of Asian or Pacific Island decent, 83 years old with an income of less than \$1,000 per month.

As a Kupuna Care program, we also provide nutritional education and counseling, monitor health and welfare, and serve as an important bridge to support services, helping seniors remain in their homes rather than more costly premature institutionalization.

The passage of this bill is vital as it will provide an ongoing, sustainable source of revenue for Kupuna Care that can be counted upon each year by seniors and their caregivers who depend upon Kupuna Care. Aging network providers cannot meet the growing demand for services when faced by years of flat or reduced State and Federal funding and the growing cost of service delivery due to increased cost of food, gas and utilities, etc.

We urge you to support seniors by voting yes on HB 106, HD 1, as it funds safety net programs that support the most isolated and vulnerable seniors in Hawaii.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH), is a tax exempt, non-profit agency that has been providing supportive home and community based services to elders since 1973 and currently serves approximately 5,000 older persons each year. We support HB160, HD1 to provide additional funding through general revenues for the Kupuna Care program, which funds essential services for seniors.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i would like to offer the following comments:

- 1. Assisted Transportation and Kupuna Care Transportation are essentially the same service the bill references both. Service is normally called Kupuna Care Transportation, not Assisted Transportation.
 - Recommendation: Delete "Assisted Transportation" due to duplication w/ "Kupuna Care Transportation".
- 2. Provider agencies identified in bill please note that the provider agencies identified in the bill are only Oahu providers.
- 3. "Meals for the Elderly" this service has been added as a new service under Kupuna Care. If the intent of adding this new service is to allow for funding of congregate meal sites (which is currently funded through Federal Older Americans Act funds), it may add more clarity to identify the service as "congregate meal sites".

Catholic Charities Hawai'i has provided Kupuna Care Transportation Services on the island of Oahu for a number of years. In addition, we have been partners with other Oahu aging network providers who also provide essential State-funded Kupuna Care Services such as home-delivered meals, case management, chore & housekeeping, bathing service and more.

State-funded Kupuna Care currently funds a set of basic, essential services that help frail elders remain independent and avoid institutionalization or homelessness. In addition, these services support family caregivers who are providing support to frail elderly relatives who still want to maintain their independence but require supportive services, from family and the community, in order to do so.

Aging network providers cannot meet the growing demand for services when faced by years of flat or reduced State and Federal funding and the growing cost of service delivery due to

aging vehicles, increased cost of gas and utilities, increased cost of providing health insurance for employees, etc.

At over \$100,000 a year.², nursing home care is unaffordable for most elders and results in more cost to taxpayers and government Additional funding for community-based Kupuna Care services will allow our kupuna to remain in the community (which they prefer) and avoid costly institutionalization.
