> In consideration of **HOUSE BILL 288** RELATING TO PLANTS

House Bill 288 requires the Board of Agriculture to perform a risk assessment on plants that pose a danger to and are imported into the State. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments on the proposed bill.

The Department recognizes this as a needed step to protect Hawaii from further harm from invasive species, but also recognizes that it is not possible to implement a major expansion of duties and responsibilities to perform these risk assessments at this time with the limited and reduced staff available in the Department of Agriculture's inspection program. The implementation of an expanded program of risk assessment will require the restoration and increase in Department of Agriculture staff capacity to manage the program.
