Testimony in Opposition of H.B. No. 407 Relating to the Hawaii Prepaid Health Care Act

I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposal amends Section 393-7(d) by allowing representatives from health care provider organizations to serve on the Prepaid Health Care Advisory Council, and by increasing the number of members on the Council from seven to nine.

II. CURRENT LAW

The current statute provides for a Prepaid Health Care Advisory Council to advise the Director of Labor and Industrial Relations on a health care plan's compliance with statutory benefit standards. The Council is appointed by the Director and presently consists of seven members representing the medical and public health professions, consumer interests, and prepaid health care protection. The law disallows representation by health maintenance organizations, mutual benefit societies, and other health care organizations.

III. HOUSE BILL


The department opposes this proposal for the following reasons.

The change is unnecessary as a physician is currently sitting on the council as a medical and public health profession representative and can represent the health care provider interests. This physician brings with him the experience of having previously served on the council

for several years while a member of a health care provider organization.

The department is concerned that increasing Council membership from seven to nine members will require more members to constitute a meeting quorum. The Council has had difficulty attaining the current quorum of four, as Council members are occasionally unavailable for meetings.

Dear Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Morikawa and Members of the Committee:

My name is Howard Lee and I am President of the Hawaii Association of Health Plans ("HAHP"). HAHP is a non-profit organization consisting of eight (8) member organizations:

AlohaCare Hawaii Medical Assurance Association HMSA Hawaii-Western Management Group, Inc. Kaiser Permanente MDX Hawai'i University Health Alliance UnitedHealthcare

Our mission is to promote initiatives aimed at improving the overall health of Hawaii. We are also active participants in the legislative process. Before providing any testimony at a Legislative hearing, all HAHP member organizations must be in unanimous agreement of the statement or position.

HAHP appreciates the opportunity to testify in opposition to HB 407 which would expand the membership of the Prepaid Health Care Council (Council) by two to include representation from health care provider organizations.

Under Hawaii's Prepaid Health Care Act (PHCA), the Council has much power over the structure of health care plans which can be offered under the law. All major benefit changes must go before the Council including those proposed by existing plans, employers or plans just entering the state. The Council provides the Director of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations with a recommendation on whether proposed changes meet the minimum PHCA requirements.

The current makeup of the Council mostly consists of individuals involved with the provision of employee benefits, with someone from the legal profession and a physician. We believe that the current Council represents all community stakeholders effectively and do not feel that the scope of those on the Council needs to be expanded. In short, there

does not seem to be a problem with the Council and its ability to function which would require expansion of the membership to include additional constituencies.

In light of this, we would respectfully request the Committee see fit to hold this measure. Thank you for the opportunity to offer comments today.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 407 RELATING TO HEALTH CARE

The ILWU Local 142 opposes H.B. 407, which allows representatives of health care provider organizations to serve on the Prepaid Health Advisory Council and increases the number of members on the Advisory Council from seven to nine.

The Advisory Council currently includes representatives of the medical and public health profession, which we understand to be health care providers who are familiar with health care needs. We do not know what additional benefit adding health care provider organizations would be if doctors and hospitals are now already represented on the Advisory Council.

Furthermore, there does not appear to be any compelling reason to increase the number of members on the Advisory Council. We, therefore, see no reason to amend the law for that purpose.
