1 Department's Position: The Department of Health strongly supports this bill.

- 2 Fiscal Implications: Maintain solid waste program funding
- 3 Purpose and Justification: The purpose of this bill is to clarify that the solid waste management
- 4 surcharge shall also apply to waste-to-energy facilities and facilities that prepare waste for final
- 5 disposition outside the state of Hawaii.

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- The department supports the changes proposed by this bill because they will help us address the
 - changing waste management field. The solid waste management surcharge is the main funding source
- for the department's solid waste regulatory program. The current surcharge is 35 cents per ton and is
- 9 applied to landfills and incinerators, including H-Power.
- The department is aware of waste-to-energy facilities that are proposing to use new technologies
- that the current solid waste management surcharge will not apply to. The past year has also seen
- attempts to operate a facility to prepare waste for out of the state disposal. Waste currently being
- handled by facilities subject to the surcharge would be diverted to the newer facilities. Both of the
- activities mentioned would avoid the solid waste management surcharge as it is currently structured,
- thus reducing solid waste program revenue while actually increasing the program's workload.

1	Solid waste program funding is already below sustainable levels. Allowing the changes
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2	proposed in this bill would help the solid waste program to maintain current funding levels.
