**PURPOSE:** The purpose of H.B. 727 is to appropriate Temporary Assistance For Needy Families (TANF) funds, emphasizing direct payments to families, employment training, teenage pregnancy prevention, and keeping families intact.

**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION:** The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the intent of the bill but defers on the fiscal implications until Governor Abercrombie's Executive Biennium Budget is finalized.

The Department would like to point out that the annual TANF block grant amount available to the State is \$98.9 million, and there is no additional TANF federal funding available through the TANF reserve, or any other federal source, therefore there must be careful consideration to setting the priorities on the use of TANF funding.

DHS would like to recommend that the Legislature consider appropriating TANF funds in a lump sum through the State Budget Bill, H.B. 200. Such a provision will allow

the Department flexibility in addressing the areas of need given the finite amount of TANF block grant funds available annually.

The Department would also advise that other priorities that must be considered for the use of TANF funds include administrative and system support for carrying out the implementation of the TANF program, as well as supplementing the funding for child care subsidies and child welfare services. The supplementing of funds for these two programs are through direct transfers to the Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) and the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG), these are the only two direct transfers of TANF funds allowed by federal law.

# TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 727 RELATING TO TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES

Hawaii Youth Services Network (HYSN), a statewide coalition of more than 50 youth-serving organizations, supports SB 922 Related to Health. While HYSN supports the entire bill, our testimony will focus on funding for teen pregnancy prevention.

Communities benefit when young people have the resources to acquire the knowledge and skills to make healthy lifestyle choices. Hawaii has wisely invested TANF funds in teen pregnancy prevention with the result that unplanned pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection (STI) rates are declining.

TANF funds support positive youth development and pregnancy prevention education programs. After school programs prevent pregnancy and STIs by engaging youth in positive activities such as community service, sports, and cultural programming. Pregnancy prevention education programs support abstinence as the most effective way to prevent unplanned pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections while teaching the skills needed for sexually active youth to protect themselves are effective. Both are needed to protect our youth and help them to become contributing members of our society.

Over the past five years, HYSN and partner organizations have provided pregnancy prevention education to more than 4,000 Hawaii youth using effective, evidence-based programs that encourage young people to consider how unplanned pregnancy and STIs would prevent them from achieving their goals and dreams, while teaching them decision-making, negotiation, and refusal skills. Evaluation demonstrates that after completing the program, students are more likely to delay sexual initiation and have the skills and intention to practice safer sex when they become sexually active.

In September 2010, Hawaii Youth Services Network was awarded 5 million dollars in federal funding for pregnancy prevention education. HYSN is prepared to provide training and technical assistance to TANF-funded programs to increase their capacity to provide high quality pregnancy prevention programs at no cost to the State of Hawaii.



Unplanned adolescent pregnancy costs Hawaii taxpayers 22 million dollars a year, two-thirds in state and local costs. Prevention programs can reduce this burden on taxpayers and result in more positive outcomes for youth, such as increased high school graduation rates and fewer young adults living in poverty.

We urge you to invest wisely in the future of Hawaii's youth by continuing to fund effective, evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs.

**Testimony in Support of HB 727** Re:

Planned Parenthood of Hawaii (PPHI) supports HB 727, which appropriates Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funds to community organizations providing teen pregnancy prevention services. At PPHI we work on a daily basis to help teens prevent unintended pregnancy and make healthy decisions about their reproductive and sexual lives. PPHI serves the sexual and reproductive health needs of the people of Hawaii through our clinical services, education programs, and by advocating for reproductive justice. We educate youth on how to make responsible choices about sex. we assist parents to talk more openly and effectively with their children about their sexual and reproductive health decisions, and we provide teens with access to health care and contraception.

Like many local organizations, we had a contract with the Department of Human Services to do teen pregnancy prevention work. Under that contract, PPHI provided evidenced based, comprehensive and medically accurate sexual health education to adolescents in Hawaii. We use an evidenced based curriculum, Making Proud Choices (MPC). Based on national studies, MPC has been successful in changing young people's behavior- more students who receive MPC chose to delay first sexual intercourse, more students who have had sex chose to become abstinent, and those who chose to be sexually active were more likely to practice safer sex, using condoms and other forms of contraception. Our contract for \$75,000 began on October 1, 2010. Last week were informed that the funds were no longer available and our contract was reduced by 50% to \$37,500. We understand that we are just one of approximately 40 organizations whose contracts have been reduced or terminated.

The loss of teen pregnancy prevention programs comes at a bad time for Hawaii's young people. The most recent Guttmacher Institute report on teen pregnancy was released in January 2010. It states that in 2006, the United States saw an increase in teen pregnancy for the first time in over a decade. In Hawaii, the teen pregnancy rate was 71 per 1000 teens ages 15-19 – giving Hawaii the 17<sup>th</sup> highest teen pregnancy rate in the country. Also in 2010, the Hawaii Youth Risk Behavior Survey revealed more disturbing data. It found that the rate of teens participating in sexual intercourse increased in 2009.<sup>2</sup> Less than half- only 47%- of all teens are using condoms. That's the lowest rate of condom use in the United States. Even fewer teens are using contraceptives. 82% reported having sexual intercourse without using birth control pills or other contraceptives.<sup>4</sup> At Planned Parenthood, we see this data as alarming indicators that our youth need help when it comes to protecting their sexual and reproductive health.

The social and economic costs of teen pregnancy are immense. Teens who become pregnant are significantly less likely to graduate from high school, with only 32% of teen mothers obtaining a diploma by the age of 30.<sup>5</sup> They are more likely to need welfare assistance, more likely to be single parents, and often have more children earlier than their peers. Their children also face obstacles as they are more likely to have physical and mental health problems, such as low birth weight and mental disabilities, are more likely to be abused or neglected, and are more likely to be placed into foster care.<sup>6</sup> As a consequence, the United States spends over \$6.9 a year providing services and care related to teen child birth.<sup>7</sup> Hawaii spends as much as \$22 million each year.<sup>8</sup> With the loss of prevention services that cost will undoubtedly increase in future years.

We recognize that our state continues to struggle with an economic crisis. Like many organizations we are doing more with less, but our commitment to the health and wellbeing of Hawaii's keiki will continue. We ask the Committee to consider the wellbeing of our young people and the certain costs our state will face without crucial teen pregnancy prevention services. Please pass HB 727 so that community organizations can continue their important work. Thank you.

Dear Maam or Sir,

I am Lehua Ka'auwai-Krueger, General Manager of Paxen Huli Ke Alo and the director of Hawaii's About Facel Family of Programs. And I humbly ask for your help.

Our programs, which each year educate nearly 2,000 at-risk Hawaiian youth in key areas of academic, life, and career skills and drive a direct economic benefit to our state of \$208 million annually and an additional, indirect benefit of \$2 billion annually, are themselves at-risk—of closing.

As you know, Gov. Abercrombie's proposed budget would eliminate a host of social-service offerings, including ours. Our programs, which have served 11,000 learners continuously since 2003, receive annual funding through the Department of Defense, which in turn obtains TANF funding through the Department of Human Services. The proposed cuts would eliminate TANF funding—and, with it, our programs effective April 1—leaving hundreds of Hawaiian youths at greater risk than ever. These learners in 20 communities across our state no longer would have access to core academic, life, and career skills programming and all the benefits—academic gains, independent living, and job placement and retention—that they provide. Among the vast benefits to Hawaiian students, their families, and communities:

- More than 800 learners graduate each year from the About Facel Family of Programs, producing an annual economic impact of \$208 million; diverting 800 at-risk youth from lives of crime results in a <u>further economic impact of \$2.1</u> billion.
- Of learners who complete the About Face! Family of Programs, 94 percent realize at least a single-grade gain in the
  core tested areas of Reading and Mathematics.
- Nearly 60 percent of learners in the About Face! Family of Programs land meaningful employment, almost double the national figure.
- In 2010, nearly 4,000 Hawaiian teens participated in the Summer Youth Employment Program, <u>landing jobs</u> in high-interest industries <u>at a time when teen unemployment exceeded 30 percent.</u>

I am requesting a brief meeting with you this week to review the potential impact of this situation on our communities and youths. If closure were to occur, hundreds of youths and adults no longer would receive key services. In addition, more than 60 deeply talented educators would lose their jobs.

**PURPOSE:** The purpose of H.B. 728 is to establish a three-year pilot project within the Department of Human Services to conduct and expand asset building classes statewide to serve individuals with disabilities and the parents of children with a disability. This bill would appropriate Temporary Assistance For Needy Families (TANF) funding for the pilot program.

**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION:** The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports the intent of this bill but does not have the TANF funding required to establish the pilot program proposed in this bill.

The Department would like to advise that the use of TANF funds is limited to TANF-eligible families with children not individuals.

The Department already provides employment case management services for our disabled eligible TANF families through our statewide First to Work (FTW)

Vocational Rehabilitation Services contracts. These contracted services provide case management services that monitor the FTW participant's progress with their medically prescribed treatment, perform functional and employability assessments, develop individual service plans, and assist with the placement in job readiness training, vocational training, community work experience placements, and in some cases, employment. These FTW participants are able to access work support services such as transportation, child care, and assistive technology, in order for them to eventually obtain employment.
