Committee on Finance Testimony in Opposition To H.B. 774 Relating to State Funds

Chair Oshiro and Members of the Committee:

I am Louis Erteschik, Staff Attorney at the Hawaii Disability Rights Center, and am testifying in opposition to this bill.

The purpose of the bill is to suspend the current system of depositing into the neurotrauma special fund, surcharges from certain motor vehicle accidents, and to divert that money to the emergency medical services fund for a period of two years.

We strongly oppose this bill. When the current law (Act 160 SLH 2002) was passed, it was hailed as a landmark piece of legislation. The legislature recognized the nexus between automobile accidents and neurotrauma injuries, and established the neurotrauma special fund derived from these surcharges on court cases.

The legislature also recognized that there was a dearth of available services for individuals with the physical, cognitive and behavioral consequences of neurotrauma injuries. HDRC has represented a number of individuals with neurotrauma injuries and have seen firsthand their dire need for services. Many of these individuals fall into a gap group for which no programs are provided. This is particularly so for those individuals with acquired or traumatic brain injuries. In most cases they do not qualify for services from the Developmental Disabilities Division nor from the Adult Mental Health Division





of the Department of Health. They are truly the "gap group." While the Quest Expanded Access program has encompassed some of these individuals, there are still a great many unmet needs.

Pursuant to law, the Department of Health has established a Neurotrauma Advisory Board which provides input to the Department on expenditures from the fund. Many worthwhile projects are funded in accordance therewith. While we take no position in the need for funding emergency medical services, it is completely inappropriate to defund the Neurotrauma Special Fund for two years as a source of revenue. Funding for the those programs should be allocated by the legislature from either the general fund or some other source that may be appropriate This fund needs to be utilized for its intended purpose.

#### In Strong Opposition to HB 774, Relating to Special Funds


Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee and Members of the Committee.

My name is Dr. Cherylee Chang, Neurointensivist, and Medical Director of the Neuroscience Institute at The Queen's Medical Center. I am testifying for The Queen's Medical Center in strong opposition to HB 774 which diverts monies away from the Neurotrauma Special Fund. Included with this testimony is a petition of health care professionals who share my concern that loss of funding will negatively impact important brain and spinal cord injury prevention efforts, with particular impact to children.

The Neurotrauma Special Fund was established in 2002 by Act 160 for funding and contracting for services relating to neurotrauma. Funds are acquired through surcharges on traffic citations related to causes of neurotrauma injuries (speeding, drunk driving, not wearing seat belts, leaving the scene of an accident involving bodily injury). The Department of Health has worked with neurotrauma survivors and their families to identify priorities for expenditure of monies in the special fund and established a Neurotrauma Advisory Board "to develop, lead, administer, coordinate, monitor, evaluate, and set direction for a comprehensive system to support and provide services for survivors of neurotrauma injuries."

HB 774 intends to divert funds to the Emergency Medical Services (who also oppose this bill). Most importantly, loss of neurotrauma funds will hamper efforts to reduce the incidence of brain injury in our State. We have three specific areas of concern:

1) Loss of a proposed contract with ThinkFirst Hawaii who provides brain and spinal cord injury prevention education to low-income children and youth across the state through school-based and public education efforts. ThinkFirst is a national program with local chapters that educate young people about their personal vulnerability and the importance of making safe choices about seat belt safety, helmet education and water safety. At Queen's, we care for children who have suffered traumatic brain injuries, and the impact on the victim and the family can be devastating. It is even more heart-wrenching when they are preventable injuries. A ThinkFirst project to reach out to areas such as Waianae and Kapaiania that have the highest prevalence of traumatic injuries in school aged children (2000 Queen's Medical Center Trauma Registry) would be impacted. The goal is to



prevent the injury before it occurs. This bill would jeopardize valuable prevention education.

- 2) The bill would also divert funds from the Hawaii Department of Education's Concussion Management Program, which works with the DOE and private high school athletic departments to conduct baseline assessments of athletes using the ImPACT concussion software. This program educates athletic directors, coaches, school personnel, and parents on the importance of ImPACT results for monitoring concussions and develops a protocol to assess the athlete after concussion, putting into place "Return to Play" guidelines for schools. This program will also go a step further and connect with neuropsychologists and primary care physicians on the importance of the concussion results and interpreting the ImPACT post test for student athletes. Diversion of funds will jeopardize this project.
- 3) Other important projects that this bill would jeopardize funding for include:
  - The Hawaiian Islands Regional Stroke Network, which would increase public education about the recognition of stroke symptoms and the need to call 911. This project would also increase patient access to expert stroke consultation through the establishment of a telemedicine-based regional stroke network.
  - The Ho'oikaika Peer Mentoring Project which helps individuals with traumatic brain injury find and use support services.
  - The Brain Injury Association of Hawaii which sponsors education and support groups for traumatic brain injury survivors.

These neurotratima funds are important and necessary to prevent injury in our State. The best health care starts with prevention. We urge you to defer this measure and thank you for the opportunity to testify.

The Hawaii High School Athletic Association is opposed to HB 774. Funding from the neurotrauma special fund has provided a grant to the University of Hawaii (UH). Through this grant, graduate students from the UH Kinesiology program are assisting the Department of Education athletic health care trainers (AHCT) program in conducting a concussion management study. This school year is the first of a possible five year study. This grant enables the DOE AHCT program to purchase laptop computers to conduct baseline and post concussion neurocognitive tests on student athletes (more than 7,000 annually) participating in contact sports. It also provides for the UH graduate assistants to conduct baseline postural stability test on these same student athletes. Without this grant the AHCTs would not have the time and resources to impliment the type of comprehensive concussion mangement program it currently is using. Ultimately, Hawaii's student athletes would be denied the care they are currently receiving from their AHCTs.

Written Testimony on behalf of the Hawaii Association of Athletic Trainers (HATA) H. B. No. 774

My name is Cindy Clivio and I am providing written testimony for the members of the Hawaii Association of Athletic Trainers (HATA) on SB 774. HATA does not take a position on this measure but would like to offer comments.

The Hawaii Athletic Trainers Association (HATA) is the professional membership association for Certified Athletic Trainers in our state. Certified Athletic Trainers are health care providers who specialize in the prevention, assessment, treatment and rehabilitation of injuries and illnesses of athletes participating in various athletic events in Hawaii. The University of Hawaii-Manoa offers a graduate entry level degree in Athletic Training. Athletic Trainers are employed in most of Hawaii's public schools, some private schools, colleges, Universities, hospitals, physician offices, clinics, and by the military. Hawaii is considered a leader in providing healthcare at the Secondary School level as the legislature provided funds to place a certified athletic trainer in all of Hawaii's public schools.

The Department of Education has begun the first of a three year grant program for the education, prevention, assessment, and determination of return to play criteria for concussion management in high school athletics. This is program has a critical role in athlete safety. The funding is provided from the Nuerotrauma special funds. HATA would like to ask that those funds which have been allocated from the Nuerotrauma fund to the DOE concussion grant continue to be given to the DOE to continue this program in each of the next three years.
