Thank you for the opportunity to testify on SB26 which would establishes a Medicaid buy-in program for working people with disabilities; allows for the formation of a Medicaid shortfall joint legislative task force to examine issues relating to Medicaid shortfalls; and makes a matching fund appropriation for employment training and placement.

AlohaCare **supports** the formation of a Joint Legislative Task Force on Medicaid. We are not testifying on other portions of this bill.

The establishment of a Joint Legislative Task Force on Medicaid will formalize the Medicaid Task Force initiated during the 2010 session by Sen. Suzanne Chun Oakland to address the State's Medicaid budget shortfall. Meetings of the informal task force have occurred regularly through the year and have been well attended. The informal task force has been a productive forum for sharing information and discussing plans for the Medicaid program and we support its formalization.

AlohaCare is a non-profit, Hawaii based health plan founded in 1994 by Hawaii's community health centers to serve low-income families and medically vulnerable members of our community through government sponsored health insurance programs. We serve beneficiaries of Medicaid and Medicare on all islands.

AlohaCare has been contracted by the Hawaii Department of Human Services since the QUEST program started in 1994 to provide insurance coverage for Medicaid eligible beneficiaries through the QUEST program. We serve approximately 75,000 QUEST enrollees statewide.

Dear Rep. John M. Mizuno:

I am writing to summarize my thoughts on SB126 regarding Medicaid for working persons with disabilities. Medicaid Buy-ins are in place throughout the country, with Hawaii as one of seven remaining states not to have one. Each our 43 sister states that have implemented Medicaid Buy-ins have done so by tailoring their programs to match their respective Medicaid programs. In general, they have been created in a manner that, over time, reduces the long-term need for working people with disabilities to be on an extensive array of benefits and requires them to pay a portion of their Medicaid in premiums and co-pays.

I have served as the Principal Investigator for the Medicaid Infrastructure Grant since its inception in 2005. My team and I have reviewed this possibility for Hawaii over these many years. I am writing to express my general support of the concept, but we provide our opinion from an academic point of view, looking at pros and cons, and as such we understand that there are both costs and benefits to such a program. We worked extensively with Hawaii's Medicaid actuary, Milliman, to conduct a study that provides the theoretical pluses and minuses of the policy option. That study has been submitted electronically as testimony for your consideration.

Chair Chun -Oakland, Chair Green and Members of the Committees:

I am Louis Erteschik, Staff Attorney at the Hawaii Disability Rights Center, and am testifying in support of this bill.

The purpose of the bill is to establish a medicaid buy in program for working people with disabilities. The goal would be that these individuals can purchase the necessary medical premiums that they might otherwise not qualify for or be eligible for if they were to obtain gainful employment.

Currently, many people who have some disability want competitive employment – yet they cannot afford to lose their health care which they obtain via their status as a Medicaid recipient. This bill, for that reason, allows them to purchase the health care and enables these individuals to achieve a greater sense of fulfillment and satisfaction. It also allows them to pull themselves up from poverty as a result of acquiring greater income. For that reason, most of the states in the country have adopted some form of program along the lines specified in this bill. It results frequently in "win – win" situation, where the individual maintains their health care and achieves a higher income and ends up being a more productive, less dependent, member of society.

Dear members of the Senate,

I am in support of bill SB126 Medicaid Buy In. This bill would allow many people who have been either not eligible for Medicaid or are afraid of losing Medicaid the option to pay and be covered.

I work with individuals who have disabilities and are trying to get back in the work force. Many individuals who are trying to work not only need the extra money but also want to feel like a "productive" citizen by working. Not having the option to purchase Medicaid has been a barrier to employment in many of the cases I have worked with. One example of these barriers is if an individual qualifies for SSDI before their retirement age, he or she has to wait 2 years to be covered by Medicare. Most of the time someone who qualifies for SSDI makes "too much" to qualify for Medicaid coverage. These beneficiaries usually do not have private insurance because they have not been working due to their disability. So their choices are: go back to work full time to maybe get private insurance through their employer or wait 2 years to get medical then try and work. It seems to make much more sense to have an option to purchase Medicaid until Medicare kicks in so that the person can go back to work at their own pace. Going back to work is good mentally for the beneficiary and also benefits everyone else because they are paying into the system.

Another section of people I have worked with have SSDI and qualify for Medicaid only because they have a spend down. This option makes no sense to anyone who is able and willing to work if all of their money is going to have to go towards their medical costs, what's the point of working at all?

The other section of people I have seen get affected are those who were receiving SSI and were working and made enough to be switched over to the SSDI program. Once switched to SSDI, they no longer qualified for Medicaid and had to wait the two years for Medicare. This affects their medications, co-pays, and which doctors they see which can be very disruptive to anyone.

Another group of people I have worked with get booted off Medicaid once they make a certain amount. This has been detrimental to some individuals in particular because they now have to pay \$200 for a certain medication or they go without it and have to stop working completely and be hospitalized. If they had the option to buy in, they would not need to stop work due to medication expenses.

I realize my examples are all anecdotal but we all know how important health insurance is to everyone. It is really sad that Hawaii is one of 7 states without the Medicaid buy in option. I feel like more people with disabilities would feel more confident in going back and trying to work if they have the peace of mind knowing that they have health insurance. So many people I have worked with have stopped working due to this issue and I see the Medicaid Buy in as a way to get a lot more people back in the work force.

Aloha to the Committee,

My name is Robert Scott Wall and I am writing in support of SB126. I serve on the Governors Commission on Rehabilitation, Mental Health America's Board of Directors, and am on the standing committee creating the Consumer, Family, & Youth Alliance with the aid of the Mental Health Transformation State Incentive Grant.

In 2004 the State of Hawai'i committed itself to creating a Medicaid Buy-In and I have been working for over four years to help that happen. In the end this would only affect around one thousand of our State's population who have a serious and persistent mental illness and receive S.S.D.I. from Social Security.

Because of a flaw in the writing of the Ticket to Work Legislation in Hawai'i it only applies to persons receiving S.S.I. If a person receives S.S.D.I. they are stuck because income in that category is considered at a dollar for dollar rate by the Department of Human Services whereas if the person received S.S.I. that would be assessed at a \$2.00 for \$1.00 rate.

For myself that means that I can only earn \$14.00 a month under Ticket to Work without loosing my Medicaid coverage. You must understand that this isn't truly about the money. The \$800 that we could earn from Ticket to Work won't change our lives but it would make it fundamentally better.

Not only that but it will get us to start paying taxes! It will take us off Food Stamps! It will improve our view of ourselves and our place in the world.

According to the Medicaid Infrastructure Grant this will only effect about 1,000 of the 56,000 Hawaiians who suffer from a serious and persistent mental illness, not the entire disabled population. It will in the end be revenue neutral. It will improve the

quality of life of a group of people that should not have to fight for this benefit in the first place since they should have been included from the beginning.
