Senator Gabbard,

I support SB 1363, especially as I have seen far too many paper bags being handed out here on Kaua'i since our own plastic bag ban has gone into effect here.

I would like to comment on a few of other organizations' testimony on this bill: http://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/session2011/Testimony/SB1363\_TESTIMONY\_ENE-EDT\_02-08-11.pdf

First, Sierra Club right off the bat recommends reducing the fee to 10 cents. I think you should hold that in reserve for later and not reduce the fee now, and if you do, consider 15 cents. Second, Sierra Club recommends the effective date be Jan. 2013, that is unnecessarily too far off, either leave it July 2012, or make it Jan. 2012, there's plenty of time to do so.

Lastly, I noticed most of the testimony was in favor of the bill, even from the merchants. The restaurants association appreciates that your bill seems to exempt them. I also noticed that some of the merchant associations are asking for pre-emption again, even though your bill was introduced without pre-emption. I want you to consider holding that pre-emption in reserve for now, but consider offering that later to get the bill passed. I am no longer against pre-emption on a bag fee bill now that I have seen how many lazy people will take a paper bag instead of bringing a reusable bag.
