#### TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORATION

#### SENATE BILL NO. 1416

#### COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Department of Transportation supports the intent S.B. 1416 which would extend the period in which an owner of a new car is exempted from obtaining a certificate of inspection from two years to three years from the date of purchase.

However, it is a fact that not every new car that is sold complies with the inspection requirements that exist. Complaints have been made to MVSO that something as simple as a burned out brake lamp was not detected when a new car was inspected and certified by the dealer. Invariably, the inspector claims that the lamp burned out after the inspection was completed. If a lamp burns out that fast, then it is possible that a few lamps will burn out or other things go wrong in the current two year interval of new car inspections. It is not uncommon for motorists to neglect checking lamps and other equipment that is inspected during a periodic inspection.

Other reasons for concern are is the \$150,000 cost to implement this bill and that it will exacerbate an administrative problem for the DOT. Currently inspection stickers are purchased two years in advance of their use. The number of stickers ordered is based on past experience and estimates. The further away the purchase date is from the use date, the greater is the degree of inaccuracy of the estimates. The advanced purchase is necessitated by the two year inspection interval for new cars, which make up a relatively small portion of the vehicle population. This means that in addition to storing the stickers that are being used for the current year, the bulk of the stickers ordered for the out-year must also be stored. This almost doubles the storage requirements. Adding a second out-year supply of stickers will worsen our storage problem.

I am Christine Ogawa Karamatsu, testifying on behalf of EAN Holdings, LLC, operating Enterprise Rent-A-Car, Alamo Rent-A-Car and National Car Rental in Hawaii (collectively referred to as "Enterprise").

Enterprise **supports** S.B. 1416, which extends the period in which an owner of a new car is exempted from obtaining a certificate of inspection from two years to three years from the date of purchase.

Cars in Enterprise's Hawaii fleet are generally used for only 16-18 months and average less than 36,000 miles before they are replaced. This ensures that only the newest and safest cars are made available to our customers. For those cars in our fleet older than two years, extending the certificate of inspection renewal period would reduce the administrative and financial burden of inspecting these vehicles.

We believe this measure achieves a good balance of streamlining government without compromising the safety of all drivers on Hawaii's roads.
