- Department's Position: The Hawaii Department of Health (DOH) opposes SB1458 SD2 HD1
- 2 Fiscal Implications: Unfunded implementation and oversight costs
- 3 Purpose and Justification: The purpose of SB1458 SD2 is to establish a five year pilot program in
- 4 Maui County for the distribution of medical marijuana. The Department of Health's concerns with this
- 5 bill are based on 1) legal issues, and 2) lack of resources for implementation.

- 8 Marijuana cultivation, transportation, and distribution, not withstanding state law, remain illegal per
- 9 federal statute; the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. § 811) does not recognize the difference
- between medical and recreational use of marijuana. It remains a Schedule 1 substance due to high
- potential for abuse, no currently accepted medical use, and safety concerns. Recent US Supreme Court
- decisions (Gonzales v. Raich 2005) reasserted federal authority over marijuana as presently scheduled.
- SB1458 SD2 HD1 also eliminates Class 2 and Class 3 entities, which permitted cultivation and
- manufacture of medical marijuana and marijuana-infused products within state law. DOH is gravely

concerned about the potential legal exposure to DOH staff involved in regulating Compassion Centers

2 when marijuana cultivation, possession, and transportation appear to remain illegal for entities other

3 than Compassion Centers.

5 <u>Implementation Concerns</u>

- Whether one compassion center or ten, nearly identical time, effort, and resources are required to
- develop meaningful policies and procedures, consult with peers or contract with experts on best
- 8 practices, seek legal opinion, educate communities, the public, and government agencies, and develop
- 9 internal controls. This is especially relevant given the new responsibilities DOH assumes as a result of
- SB1459 SD2 HD1 for ensuring adequate physical security, coordinating and verifying out-of-state
- documentation, and controlling the portability and transportation of medical marijuana. Oversight and
- inspection will need to be more frequent than with established licensees (nursing homes, hospitals, etc.)
- due to the novelty of the program and the legal status of marijuana. This is all exacerbated by the lack
- of licensees to spread cost across, as well as the inability of DOH to retain any fees.

- Further, Compassion Centers appear to be retail dispensaries for medical marijuana given the absence
- therapeutic treatment service delivery. This function is similar to that of retail pharmacies regulated by
- the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Further consideration may be given to the
- appropriateness of DOH regulation given the current model of compassion centers, as at a minimum the
- 20 effort and administrative overhead may be duplicative.

I am writing today in support of the Senate version of this measure.

Patients need a consistent and reliable source of medicine now, they should not be forced to wait five more years. The most urgent need according to most patients and the Medical Cannabis Working Group is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine.

The pilot project does not help patients on the Big Islands, it also does not establish a long-term solution to the problem of obtaining medical marijuana from a legal source.

There is sufficient experience with compassion center models in other states to draft sensible regulations and implement a full program. A pilot program in not necessary.

Establishing compassion centers solves a gray area in the law that established the current medical marijuana program.

Although current law allows patients to grow their own plants, the law is silent as to where patients should acquire seeds or clones to start their supply.

Compassion centers are necessary because many patients want a legal, reliable and safe source for their marijuana. Many patients are unable to grow their own medicine because some live in apartments or condominiums; others live in areas where their plants are not secure and are subject to vandalism or theft; others are just too sick to provide the care needed for their plants to grow to maturity.

Patients are law-abiding citizens who want to remain law abiding and should not be forced to go to neighborhood drug pushers for their medicine.

Chair Keith-Agaran, Vice Chair Rhoads, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) does not support Senate Bill 1458 SD2 HD1 that proposes to amend Hawaii's Medical Use of Marijuana Program by establishing a five-year medical marijuana distribution pilot program under the Department of Health in the County of Maui to include new provisions for a dispensary (Compassion center for profit sales), that will cultivate and distribute marijuana for patients in Hawaii's Medical Use of Marijuana Program. Senate Bill 1458 SD2 HD1 also proposes to establish a special marijuana sales tax on sales of medical marijuana and to establish fees for the issuance and renewal of marijuana dispensary and manufacturing license.

PSD feels that the amendments being proposed by Senate Bill 1458 SD2 HD1 are premature and unwarranted due to the fact that Federal law has not

changed. Federal law enforcement agencies are still making arrest and conducting raids on these so-called state registered medical marijuana dispensaries in states like California and Oregon where there are established dispensaries. In August of 2009, Hawaii's Legislative Reference Bureau research Attorney Lance Ching in response to Act 29, First Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2009 wrote a White Paper on the "Access, distribution, and security components of state medical marijuana programs. His conclusion after researching the medical use of marijuana programs in all of the then 13 states was as follows:

"Clearly, policies and procedures are being developed to address the issues of access, distribution, and security with regard to the medical use of marijuana. However, these policies and procedures appear to be in a vary early stage of development and do not, as yet provide an established model with a proven ability to successfully address these issues—seeing how they develop, how they approach the obstacles they are likely to encounter, what methods are successful versus what methods prove problematic—will, no doubt, prove informative and valuable in determining how Hawaii chooses to address the issues of access, distribution, and security with regards to its own medical marijuana program."

A White Paper done in 2009 by the California Police Chiefs Association's Task Force on Marijuana Dispensaries on California's Medical use of marijuana program and marijuana dispensaries had the following conclusions:

"In light of the United States Supreme Court's decision and reasoning in

Gonzales v. Raich, the United States Supremacy Clause renders California's Compassionate Use Act of 1996 and Medical Marijuana Program Act of 2004 suspect. No state has the power to grant its citizens the right to violate federal law. People have been, and continue to be, federally prosecuted for marijuana crimes. The authors of this White Paper conclude that medical marijuana is not legal under federal law, despite the current California scheme, and wait for the United States Supreme Court to ultimately rule on this issue.

Furthermore, storefront marijuana businesses are prey for criminals and create easily identifiable victims. The people growing marijuana are employing illegal means to protect their valuable cash crops. Many distributing marijuana are hardened criminals. Several are members of stepped criminal street gangs and recognized organized crime syndicates, while others distributing marijuana to the businesses are perfect targets for thieves and robbers. They are being assaulted, robbed, and murdered. Those buying and using medical marijuana are also being victimized. Additionally, illegal so-called "medical marijuana dispensaries" have the potential for creating liability issues for counties and cities. All marijuana dispensaries should generally be considered illegal and should not be permitted to exist and engage in business within a county or city's borders. Their presence poses a clear violation of federal and state law; they invite more crime; and they compromise the health and welfare of law-abiding citizens."

The White Paper also discussed problems posed by Marijuana

Dispensaries. The report found that in California marijuana dispensaries are

commonly large moneymaking enterprises that will sell marijuana to most anyone who produces a physician's written recommendation for its medical use. These recommendations can be had by paying unscrupulous physicians a fee and claiming to have most any malady, even headaches. While the dispensaries will claim to receive only donations, no marijuana will change hands without an exchange of money. These operations have been tied to organized criminal gangs, foster large grow operations, and are often multi-million-dollar profit centers.

Because they are repositories of valuable marijuana crops and large amounts of cash, several operators of dispensaries have been attacked and murdered by armed robbers both at their storefronts and homes, and such places have been regularly burglarized. Drug dealing, sales to minors, loitering, heavy vehicle and foot traffic in retail areas, increased noise, and robberies of customers just outside dispensaries are also common ancillary byproducts of their operations. To repel store invasions, firearms are often kept on hand inside dispensaries, and firearms are used to hold up their proprietors. These dispensaries are either linked to large marijuana grow operations or encourage home grows by buying marijuana to dispense. And, just as destructive fires and unhealthful mold in residential neighborhoods are often the result of large indoor home grows designed to supply dispensaries, money laundering also naturally results from dispensaries' likely unlawful operations.

According to a paper put out by the Colorado Drug Investigators

Association "The majority of dispensaries are in business to make large profits

under the guise of compassion for the patients. Some have become marijuana recreational clubs. The prices they charge the patient for marijuana ("medicine") ranging from \$150 to \$480 an ounce is outrageous. Patient's Choice dispensary owner (Denver Post 10/30/09) estimates grossing \$8,000 to \$10,000 a day. Using an average of his own numbers, he is selling 25 ounces a day, the equivalent of 1,400 doses or close to 10,000 doses a week. That's just one dispensary. A dispensary owner in Colorado Springs claims to be a caregiver to 1,200 patients and grosses \$160,000 a month, personally netting between \$50,000 and \$60,000 a month. He further admitted he pays between \$70,000 and \$90,000 a month for product (marijuana) but didn't reveal what third party drug trafficker he buys from. That would equate to distributing between 20 to 50 pounds a month or 240 to 600 pounds of marijuana a year and that's just one dispensary. A question addressed by the White Paper was "What are the CO dispensaries' charging patients for their marijuana? Response: The answer varies depending on the dispensary but we have documented them selling marijuana from anywhere from \$150 to close to \$500 per ounce (one once equates to approximately 56 marijuana cigarettes). By comparison, a patient's production cost for the same amount of marijuana that they could provide for themselves would be less than \$25 per ounce or, through a legitimate primary caregiver, for approximately \$65 per ounce if the patient is paying for the supplies and caregiver's time. Is this compassion or profit? Question? Given the poor state of our economy, wouldn't taxing

marijuana dispensaries boost our government's Income? Response:

Taxing marijuana would create additional revenue. However, experience shows the additional revenue would not even come close to off setting additional costs associated with increased use. The two legal substances which are already highly taxed prove this point. Taxes on alcohol account for \$14.5 billion in revenue but alcohol abuse costs \$185 billion. In the case of tobacco, taxes account for \$25 billion but the cost to society is \$200 billion. That means taxes pay for 8% and 12% respectively for all the adverse effects of alcohol and tobacco use. It doesn't require a degree in economics to understand a poor investment. One can reasonably expect the same type of figures with marijuana taxation." An probably less due to the fact that most of the marijuana sales at dispensaries are cash transactions.

For these reasons, PSD does not support Senate Bill 1458 SD2 HD1 and ask that it be held.

Chair Keith-Agaran, Vice-Chair Rhoades, and members of the House Committee on Judiciary, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu submits the following testimony in opposition to S.B. 1458, S.D. 2, H.D. 1. The purpose of this bill is to establish a 5-year pilot program for the commercial cultivation and sale of medical marijuana, via a single licensed dispensary in Maui county.

At this time, State law permits the limited possession, use and cultivation of marijuana to individuals bearing certain exigent and closely monitored medical conditions (and their caregivers). State law does not permit or provide for the commercial production, processing, sale and/or distribution of marijuana, which continues to be categorized as a Schedule 1 controlled substance in both State and Federal drug schedules. Even with the security measures outlined in the current bill, there is enormous potential for abuse and negative impact on the public, and the Department is strongly opposed to opening the doorway for commercial production, processing, sale and/or distribution of marijuana in Hawaii.

According to S.B. 1458, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, the pilot program licensee would be allowed to carry up to seven marijuana plants <u>and</u> six ounces of usable medical marijuana <u>per</u> qualified patient and/or caregiver "per fourteen day period." The purpose and effect of the "fourteen day period" is unclear. In any case, allowing the licensee to carry such a large supply of marijuana plants and usable marijuana presents a very high risk that the licensee could be housing hundreds of pounds of marijuana at any given time, which not only poses a significant security and enforcement risk for the licensee, but also for law enforcement. Moreover, if it is contemplated that the pilot program may one day expand to allow more than one dispensary per county, this risk would likely grow exponentially.

The Department is also concerned about the proposed increase in the amount of medical marijuana permitted for a patient's "adequate supply." Under current statutes, qualifying patients and/or caregivers may have up to three mature plants, with one ounce of usable marijuana per plant, in addition to four immature plants. If the adequate amount on Maui is increased to seven plants total, with two ounces of usable marijuana per plant, that would be <u>nearly five times</u> the current allowable amount. Furthermore, given that one ounce is equivalent to over twenty-eight (28) grams, and that the average marijuana "joint" tends to be approximately ½ - ¾ grams, it would seem unnecessary for any qualifying patient and/or caregiver to possess up to fourteen ounces of marijuana at a time.

With regards to criminal background checks, SB 1458, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 would prohibit any license or license renewal being issued to persons with a felony drug conviction in the past ten years, but would not prohibit persons with prior misdemeanor drug convictions. Pursuant to Section 712-1248, Hawaii Revised Statutes, promoting a detrimental drug in the second degree is classified as a misdemeanor, and includes possession of up to one pound of marijuana. Given the seriousness and particular relevance of this type of crime, the Department believes that persons with prior misdemeanor drug convictions should also be prohibited from obtaining or renewing a license, if the proposed pilot program is initiated.

Should the pilot program contemplate future initiatives that would allow for more than one medical marijuana dispensary per county, this also raises the question of how and to what extent dispensaries would be permitted to advertise their businesses and merchandise. With regard to other states that currently allow medical marijuana dispensaries, prior testifiers have indicated that Denver, Colorado now hosts approximately 300-400 such dispensaries, which is reportedly greater than the number of Starbucks locations in the entire state of Colorado. Many of these dispensaries openly advertise their businesses in public mediums.

We also understand prior testifiers have stated that Colorado currently has about 150,000 people registered as medical marijuana patients. With a state population there of approximately 5 million, this indicates that 1 out of every 33 people—accounting for every man, woman and child living in the state of Colorado—is currently registered to use medical marijuana.

Given that S.B. 1458, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 would allow the proposed pilot program licensee to cultivate, process, stock and/or sell vast amounts of marijuana—which continues to be classified as a Schedule 1 controlled substance—and increases the permitted "adequate amount" of medical marijuana to alarming quantities, the Department strongly believes that this bill presents a high risk of abuse and negative impact on the residents of Maui county, and potentially on the public statewide. For these reasons, and based on all of the foregoing concerns, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney opposes S.B. 1458, S.D. 2, H.D. 1. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

Dear Representative Keith-Agaran and Members:

The Hawai'i Police Department strongly opposes the passage of Senate Bill 1458, SD 2, HD 1, Relating to Health, which seeks to establish a five-year medical marijuana distribution pilot program in the County of Maui and specifies requirements for the licensing of a compassion care center.

A common theme for the creation of marijuana compassion centers and/or dispensaries is to create a "legal" means for qualified medicinal marijuana patients to access a supply of medicinal marijuana which will eliminate the need for the "black market" and "organized crime".

The first misconception is that the "black market" will not always exist. The "black market" will always exist to fill the needs of those who are "restricted" from obtaining marijuana under the medicinal marijuana laws. In this case, compassion centers that will already have the marijuana available in quantities are subject to selling out the back door. This also applies to qualified medicinal marijuana patients who know they can sell their "adequate amount" as there is another "adequate amount" waiting for them at the compassion center.

Additionally, the proposed legislation seeks to impose taxes, as stated: "all sales of medical marijuana sold by the licensee pursuant to this Act shall be subject to a tax under chapter 237, Hawaii Revised Statutes; provided that in addition to the tax imposed under chapter 237, an additional amount of tax shall be assessed at a rate to be calculated by multiplying the gross proceeds of sales of medical marijuana by a rate of thirty per cent." This will in turn boost the price of legal medical marijuana and create a "black market" for the cheaper non taxed marijuana. It may also create a temptation for these compassion centers or patients to sell their medicine "under the table" for more profit.

The second misconception is that "organized crime" will disappear. As a matter of fact, there is minimal, if any, evidence of ties to "organized crime" and marijuana cultivation in our county at this time. Compassion centers will in fact draw organized crime to Hawai'i in the same way as they were drawn to British Columbia who is in the midst of a fierce rivalry between the Hell's Angels and Vietnamese gangs for control of the marijuana trade.

A white paper done in 2009 by the California Police Chiefs Association's Task Force on Marijuana Dispensaries on California's Medical use of marijuana program and marijuana dispensaries discussed problems posed by Marijuana Dispensaries. The report found that in California marijuana dispensaries are commonly large moneymaking enterprises that will sell marijuana to most anyone who produces a physician's written recommendation for its medical use. These recommendations can be had by paying unscrupulous physicians a fee and claiming to have most any malady, even headaches. While the dispensaries will claim to receive only donations, no marijuana will change hands without an exchange of money. These operations have been tied to organized criminal gangs, foster large grow operations, and are often multimillion-dollar profit centers. (1)

Furthermore, the report cites that because these dispensaries are repositories of valuable marijuana crops and large amounts of cash, several operators of dispensaries have been attacked and murdered by armed robbers both at their storefronts and homes, and such places have been regularly burglarized. As stated, the purpose of this proposed legislation is to establish a licensing system under the Department of Health for the distribution of medical marijuana. It is ironic this Act would propose the licensing system fall under the Department of Health's authority when according to the State of Hawai'i Department of Health's website, their mission is "to protect and improve the health and environment for all people in Hawai'i." (2)

This measure cites that one problem for medical marijuana patients and caregivers, is the impossibility of "most patients and caregivers to acquire the expertise, time, and intense

cultivation skills to produce an adequate supply of medical cannabis that is medically effective." According to a study conducted by the University of Mississippi, from 1980 until 2007, the THC potency of marijuana has increased 151%, with THC potency levels at approximately 1.5% in 1980 versus approximately 10% in 2007. (3) In 2010, a sample of recovered marijuana from the Big Island was analyzed by the University of Mississippi and determined to contain over 14% THC. It is apparent that with the current medical marijuana program, caregivers and patients are able to develop and refine their marijuana cultivation skills, in turn producing high-grade marijuana, which is a far cry from being "low quality and ineffective as medication" as described by the authors of this act.

Lastly, this proposed legislation ignores the fact that selling and distributing marijuana is illegal, therefore, to approve this act would require blatant disregard of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes. Furthermore, this act is also contrary to the mission of the State of Hawai'i Department of Health, the agency expected to oversee this proposed program.

For the reasons above, we strongly urge this committee to reject Senate Bill 1458, SD 2, HD 1, Relating to Health.

Thank you for allowing the Hawai'i Police Department to testify on this bill.

Dear Chair Agaran and Members of the Committee on Judiciary:

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawaii ("ACLU of Hawaii") writes in support of S.B. 1458, SD2, the Senate version, which creates a medical marijuana distribution system. The ACLU of Hawaii was a member of the Medical Cannabis Working Group, which found that the most urgent need according to most patients is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine. The Senate version of this measure, S.B. 1458, SD2, would go far to help Hawaii's medical cannabis patients legally obtain their medicine. We urge this Committee to amend S.B. 1458, SD2, HD1, to reflect the version passed by the Senate as S.B. 1458, SD2.

The mission of the ACLU of Hawaii is to protect the fundamental freedoms enshrined in the U.S. and State Constitutions. Distinguished members of the Committee, thank you very much for the opportunity to present the views of Law Enforcement Against Prohibition (LEAP) in favor of SB 1458 SD2 HD1 Relating to Health. I fought against the drug trade for 15 years, including time spent as an undercover narcotics officer. I am a speaker for LEAP, an organization of 35,000 current and former criminal justice professionals and civilian supporters. We are cops, sheriffs, prosecutors, judges, prison guards and others from nearly every level of law enforcement.

As a former officer, I know that the voice of police is crucial in the dialogue about drug policy. But in the case of medical marijuana, physicians, caregivers, and patients are the ones who should be making decisions about medical care. It is inappropriate for the police to substitute our judgment for that of physicians and those in need of the care of physicians.

When it comes to the message we are sending our children about marijuana, the message should be the same as for all other medicine: that medicine is to be used under a doctor's care and not to be abused.

As someone who is both a law enforcement officer and a patient, I can tell you that the only parties with authority on who requires what type of medicine and how it should be used are the doctor, the patient, and the caregiver.

One area where law enforcement *is* qualified to speak regarding medical marijuana is in the area of public safety. Patients need to have access to adequate amounts of medicine, however much that is deemed to be, so that they do not need to search for that medicine in the streets, risking their safety and benefiting illicit drug dealers. Patients need dispensaries as a secure and safe place to access medicine. Forcing patients to go into the streets to buy marijuana benefits the criminal element and threatens patient safety.

We urge you to take the opinions of doctors, caregivers, and patients into account and pass the improvements to the Hawai'i medical marijuana laws contained in SB 1458 SD2 HD1.

Please accept this testimony in opposition to SB 1458 SD2 HD1 – Relating to Health that establishes a five-year pilot program for medical marijuana distribution in Maui County. The program will be regulated by the Department of Health.

While the bill insures no prosecution to the licensed marijuana dispenser, it is in direct conflict with Federal law on the production, sale and distribution of marijuana. It is unclear how the federal authorities will react to this program.

Also of concern is the potential for inadequate supervision and oversight of the program given the provision this bill that allows for not only Hawaii residents, but out-of-state people to utilize the dispensary with temporary certification. Cities like Los Angeles, CA had significant problems regulating the proliferation of marijuana dispensaries and experienced the lack of controls, increased crime, and the lowered quality of life in the neighborhoods they established themselves in. DOH with limited resources due to state cutbacks and no experience with medical marijuana would have a difficult time ramping up its regulatory system to be effective overseeing the program. Certainly, Maui residents would have reason for concern why their island is being singled out.

SB 1458 SD2 HD1 also proposes to assess licensing fees and tax marijuana sales of the dispensary thereby increasing state revenues. However, from national experience with legal drugs of alcohol and tobacco, the social costs of increased law enforcement, state regulation, and health and welfare related costs will far exceed any tax revenues gained ten-fold.

Finally, this bill sends the wrong message to our youth. The liberalizing of medical marijuana laws will further erode community prevention efforts especially for our youth by decreasing the perception of harm and increasing access (by "shoulder tap"). Marijuana use will increase especially for our youth. This bill's introduction also comes at a bad time when millions of dollars of state funding for non-school hour program, cultural arts, and other positive youth development programs are being cut leaving our youth with more unsupervised and unstructured time on their hands and more opportunities for alcohol and drug use and other related negative behaviors. Please vote NO on SB 1458 SD2 HD1.

Aloha Chairs Keith-Agaran, Vice Chair Rhoads and Members of the Committees!

My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a community initiative working on prison reform and justice issues in Hawai'i for more than a decade. We respectfully offer our testimony always being mindful that Hawai'i has some 6,000 people behind bars with almost 1,800 individuals serving their sentences abroad, thousands of miles away from their loved ones, their homes and, for the disproportionate number of incarcerated Native Hawaiians, their ancestral lands.

Community Alliance on Prisons stands in strong support of this compassionate measure in the SD2 version.

Hawai'i's medical marijuana program was the first in the nation to be passed by a state legislature. At the time, our legislature passed this law as compassionate legislation, responding to the many requests of patents for relief from their suffering.

I was then and remain a strong supporter today, having served as a caregiver to several terminally ill individuals. I have seen, first hand, how medical cannabis relieved their nausea from chemotherapy and from the prescription medications and helped them to eat, since loss of appetite is quite common. I am absolutely convinced that my friend Adam lived years longer than his doctors predicted because his appetite was stimulated by cannabis.

On the other hand, I watched my mother suffer in excruciating pain, literally wasting away, and dying at 45 pounds.

Sadly, when we passed this progressive legislation, we left the patients to fend for themselves.

This bill will provide immediate access to those patients. It is the humane thing to do.

DOH testified that it will put them in conflict with federal law. Please remind this agency that the constitution provides for states' rights. The decision to have a medical marijuana program in Hawai`i and the other states that sought to relieve the suffering of their citizens was a state decision and constitutionally sound.

It was shocking and very disappointing to hear law enforcement arrogantly say that they will continue raiding patients in complete defiance of the law they swore to uphold. Don't we have 6,000 people incarcerated who defied the law? Please remind law enforcement that their role is not to make policy; it is to enforce the law made by you, Hawai'i's policymakers?

Please don't criminalize sick people by forcing them to go to the black market to relieve their pain. And don't give in to threats and intimidation. This bill is about compassion and access to relief.

We respectfully ask that you pass this bill.

The Drug Policy Forum of Hawai'i writes in strong support of the senate version of SB 1458 SD 2 HD1 Relating to Health which would establish medical marijuana compassion centers. HD1 creates a pilot project of a single dispensary in the county of Maui and certain other restrictions.

Federal Laws do not Preempt State Medical Marijuana Laws

In December 2008, the U.S. Supreme Court refused to review a landmark decision in which California state courts found that its medical marijuana law was not preempted by federal law. The state appellate court decision from November 28, 2007, ruled that "it is not the job of the local police to enforce the federal drug laws."

After the United States Supreme Court ruled on Gonzales v. Raich (125 S. Ct. 2195, 2005) Attorney General Mark Bennett made the following statement: "This ruling does not overturn Hawaii's law regarding medical use of marijuana. The State of Hawaii will continue its medical marijuana program." He also said, "An act that is criminalized under federal law is not necessarily a criminal act under state law, and vice versa. The federal government decides what acts are criminal in the federal system, and each state decides what acts are criminal in each state system."

Patients need a legal, safe, and reliable source of medicine now. The medical marijuana program is almost 11 years old. They should not be forced to wait five more years for a legal source of medicine.

There are programs in other states that Hawai'i can look to draft sensible regulations. Hawai'i has the opportunity to design a program to fit the needs of our patients based on the experiences in other states.

Comments on Pilot Project (HD1)

- The proposed pilot program is so restrictive that it will not assist in developing sensible regulations.
- The proposal also has provisions that will violate the health privacy rights of patients. A similar provision has been challenged in Colorado.
- The 30% excise tax is just bad policy. It is unconscionable to tax seriously ill people with such a high tax rate and it unintentionally supports illegal drug dealers by making the street market cheaper than the legal market. The intent of this legislation is to provide a legal source of medicine for patients, not create a supply that is so expensive that it drives business to street dealers.

Compassion Centers

The most urgent need according to most patients is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine. Establishing a system for compassion centers is certainly one way of fulfilling the need of patients and solving a gray area in the law that established the current medical marijuana program.

Although current law allows patients to grow their own plants, the law is silent as to where patients should acquire seeds or clones to start their supply. Even more confusing is that the Department of Public Safety has said that the only legal transfer of marijuana is between a registered patient and that patient's registered caregiver. Caregivers are difficult to find and they are currently limited to assisting only one patient.

Dispensaries are necessary because many patients want a legal, reliable and safe source for their marijuana. Many patients are unable to grow their own medicine because some live in apartments or condominiums; others live in areas where their plants are not secure and are subject to vandalism or theft; others are just too sick to provide the care needed for their plants to grow to maturity. Patients should not be forced to go to neighborhood drug pushers for their medicine.

We hope that Hawai'i will have a system with sufficient controls, but not so overly restricted as to make it difficult for patients to have reasonable access to the medical cannabis that they need. We believe that which system is instituted, the focus should be on the needs of the patients.

We urge the committee to pass this measure. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

Information on Medical Marijuana

Federal Policy:

In a memo from Attorney General Eric Holder to U.S. Attorneys, October 19, 2009, the Department of Justice will not pursue cases against patients and others in the medical marijuana states as long as they are acting in compliance with the relevant state law. The memo reads in part:

"The prosecution of significant traffickers of illegal drugs, including marijuana, and the disruption of illegal drug manufacturing and trafficking networks continues to be a core priority in the Department's efforts against narcotics and dangerous drugs, and the Department's investigative and prosecutorial resources should be directed towards these objectives. As a general matter, pursuit of these priorities should not focus federal resources in your States on individuals whose actions are in clear and unambiguous compliance with existing state laws providing for the medical use of marijuana. For example, prosecution of individuals with cancer or other serious illnesses who use marijuana as part of a recommended treatment regimen consistent with applicable state law, or those caregivers in clear and unambiguous compliance with existing state law who provide such individuals with marijuana, is unlikely to be an efficient use of limited federal resources." [emphasis added]

"ACP urges an evidence-based review of marijuana's status as a Schedule I controlled substance to determine whether it should be reclassified to a different schedule. ... ACP strongly supports exemption from federal criminal prosecution; civil liability; or professional sanctioning, such as loss of licensure or credentialing, for physicians who prescribe or dispense medical marijuana in accordance with state law. Similarly, ACP strongly urges protection from criminal or civil penalties for patients who use medical marijuana as permitted under state laws. ... Evidence not only supports the use of medical marijuana in certain conditions but also suggests numerous indications for cannabinoids."

— American College of Physicians, Supporting Research into the Therapeutic Role of Marijuana, 2008

Marinol is not the same as Marijuana

Marinol, available as a prescription pill, is 100% THC, the active ingredient of marijuana. Many patients cannot tolerate marinol and have better results by using the whole plant. Scientists believe that the whole

plant contains other ingredients that work with THC and thus is better tolerated and more effective for some patients.

Prescription Drugs

Available prescription drugs often come with far more serious side effects than marijuana, and many patients who find relief from marijuana simply do not respond to prescription medications. Smoking or vaporizing marijuana are much more effective delivery methods than pills for many patients: The drug works instantly, the dosage may be controlled by the patient, and there is no problem "keeping it down" since it cannot be vomited back up.

Cocaine, morphine, and methamphetamine may all be legally administered to patients — so why not marijuana, which has a far lower rate of dependency and on which no one has ever overdosed?

Marijuana is NOT a Gateway Drug

Marijuana is not now, nor has ever been a "gateway drug." The National Academy of Sciences found, "there is no conclusive evidence that the drug effects of marijuana are causally linked to the subsequent abuse of other illicit drugs."

Potency of Marijuana

There have been claims that today's marijuana is "not your grandfather's marijuana." According to the University of Mississippi's Potency Monitoring Project's 2009 report, the average THC (the psychoactive ingredient) in domestically grown marijuana, which comprises the bulk of the U.S. market—is less than 5%, a figure that has been unchanged for the last decade.

Medical Marijuana States have lower Adolescent Use

"Thus the data are very reassuring that in almost all cases medical marijuana legalized for adults does not lead to an increase in recreational use of marijuana by adolescents." "In Hawaii overall adolescent marijuana use is down but is within the margin of error." (California Pediatrician, Winter 2011, pg 12.)

In 1988, thirty-four states had legalized Medical Marijuana, including Hawaii. Today, there are only 14, due to the Drug War that failed drastically. The same year, law enforcement and health experts warned of a new drug called 'ICE' which was replacing Marijuana at an alarming rate.

Medical Marijuana dispensaries are the fastest growing business in America, with over 2000 dispensaries in the U.S. while the "Pakalolo State' has none. I do not support Senate Bill 1458. Marijuana is a Schedule I drug on the Federal Control Controlled Substance list. Schedule I drugs cannot be prescribed as medicine. The proper way to have controls and to provide a supply for patients would have been to reschedule marijuana to Schedule II. All efforts to reschedule marijuana in federal court failed. Hawaii then legislated marijuana as medicine, other states had voters allow marijuana to be used as medicine. Every medicine passes Food and Drug (FDA) criteria before they can be used by humans. Medicine is not determined by legislative process or voter referendums. There would be no need for this bill if marijuana was rescheduled to a Schedule II drug.

Los Angeles County and Denver have more marijuana dispensaries than Starbucks Coffee shops. The crime in and around these dispensaries exploded. Organized crime and criminal gangs saw profits to be made and muscled their way into dispensaries and grow operations. We definitely do not need more crime and organized crime activities in Hawaii.

Allowing even one dispensary, on a pilot program basis, will have negative consequences for the families and communities who live in Maui County. Legitimate prescription drugs are considered Controlled Substances and doctors, pharmacists, hospitals, and patients are covered by many laws that are designed to prevent misuse and abuse. Despite all of government's efforts to control and regulate prescription drugs, it is the second largest drug problem facing America today. Ironically, marijuana is the number one drug problem in the United States. There are currently very little controls for patients who have a permit to use marijuana for medical ailments in Hawaii. Do not add to the problem by allowing even a single dispensary.

Aloha Chair Keith-Agaran, Vice Chair Rhoads, and members of the Committee. My name is Pam Lichty and I'm testifying in qualified support of this measure on behalf of the Drug Policy Action Group. I also served as Co-Chair of the Medical Cannabis Working Group (MCWG) which was convened by Senator Espero last year. The Executive Summary of the report we issued one year ago is included at the end of my testimony.

We are in strong support of the establishment of medical cannabis dispensaries in Hawai'i. This was in fact the top priority for the Working Group. All of the stakeholders from patients to caregivers to physicians to the many people who were surveyed believed that it was imperative to address this glaring omission in Hawaii's medical marijuana program.

Having said this, we strongly prefer the Senate drafts of this measure. Having only one dispensary on Maui, as a five year pilot project, is simply unworkable and will not meet the needs of the more than 8,000 patients now registered with the state.

The program, as you are aware, has been in place since 2000, but has never been updated. In the meantime there are now fifteen other states plus the District of Columbia with programs in place, and there are now seven states (plus D.C.) which have dispensaries in place or in formation. Some of those jurisdictions have excellent systems in place.

Hawai'i is starting from scratch on the dispensary issue and has the opportunity to do this right. We are looking to states such as New Mexico, Rhode Island, and Colorado for well-designed and tightly regulated models. In these states, the dispensaries protect public safety while meeting the needs of the many patients they serve with attention to confidentiality, safe medicine, and high standards of care.

Here are some specific comments on this draft:

- With all these tested, regulated models in place here is no need to have a 5 year pilot project. We regard this as a delaying tactic which would leave patients on the other islands left dealing with the black market which is the situation dispensaries are supposed to address.
- The House draft does not allow cannabis to be taken out of Maui County. So even if patients from elsewhere had the wherewithal to get to Maui, it would do them no good since they could not bring it back to their home island.
- We support the provision for out of state visitors, with cards from their home states, to obtain temporary certificates to use the Compassion Centers (p.5). This makes a great deal of sense for a tourist destination like Hawai'i. But we believe the \$100 fee is too high since the average visitor is likely to be here for only 1-2 weeks.
- We are pleased to see that the measure would increase the definition of "adequate supply" and permit each patient to have seven plants (omitting the "mature/immature" definition which has proved problematic) and two ounces of useable marijuana per plant (p.6). While the intent needs to be clearer and the language is ambiguous, this was another recommendation of the Working Group and is a move in the right direction.
- We are very concerned with the privacy and constitutional implications of 24/7 video feed of patient transactions to law enforcement. There is contradictory language throughout subsections (m) and (n) on pages 10 and 11 as to under what circumstances records can be viewed and by whom and when they are "confidential."
- The requirement that photocopies of all "filled prescriptions" be maintained in a database available to law enforcement raises similar concerns (pp.10-11). Moreover the forms are not "prescriptions," since those are subject to FDA regulation; the correct term would be "recommendations."
- The change to "unannounced inspections" strikes us as overkill since there are other stringent security provisions in place. Similarly the criminal background check appears to be too wide-ranging; we believe the original five years check should be adequate (p.9).

- In terms of public safety concerns, the 600 yards restriction on placement from schools etc. is unnecessary (pp12-13). Dispensaries in other states have limits of 300-1000 feet, but none requires this much distance. In rural settings this may be workable, but in urban areas like Honolulu this is difficult to achieve and burdensome.
- The 30% sales tax on sales of medical marijuana is far too high (p.11). It would likely be passed on the patients and might make the dispensed cannabis more expensive than black market marijuana which defeats the purpose of the dispensaries.
- We believe that it is very important to maintain the current system of caregivers and growing your own supply in parallel with any dispensaries which may be established. Many patients live in remote areas or may be disabled or too ill to travel to a Compassion Center. The language on p. 6, lines 8-11, is unclear as to whether this would still be permitted.

In sum, while we strongly support the establishment of medical cannabis dispensaries, we respectfully ask the Committee to substitute the Senate Draft or the original bill in lieu of House Draft 1 as you pass the bill on to Finance. This would meet both the spirit and the letter of the recommendations of the Medical Cannabis Working Group and address the needs of the 8,000 patients who have been waiting for more than a decade for safe and legal access to their medicine.

We anticipate your favorable consideration and we thank you for the opportunity to testify.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY MEDICAL CANNABIS WORKING GROUP* February 2010

The Medical Cannabis Working Group ("MCWG") convened in October 2009 to conduct a study and make recommendations to the 2010 Hawai'i State Legislature to improve the state's ten-year-old medical marijuana program.

The MCWG, tasked with completing the mission of Act 29, establishing the Medical Cannabis Task Force, which was enacted over a veto by Governor Lingle but never convened, examined current state statutes, state administrative rules, and all county policies and procedures relating to the medical marijuana program. Further, it examined issues and obstacles that qualifying patients, physicians, caregivers, and law enforcement officials have encountered with the medical marijuana program. MCWG also compared and contrasted Hawaii's medical marijuana program with all other states' medical marijuana programs.

Based on the results of its study and a public survey, MCWG recommends that the following immediate actions be taken by the Legislature to improve Hawaii's medical cannabis program:

- 1. Create a distribution system so that patients do not need to resort to the black market to obtain their medicine [emphasis added];
- 2. Increase the allowable number of plants and the amount of usable cannabis to ensure that patients have an adequate supply of their medicine;
- 3. Allow caregivers to care for at least five patients to ensure that patients are assured of an adequate supply and a competent caregiver; and
- 4. Transfer medical marijuana program oversight from the Department of Public Safety a law enforcement agency -- to the Department of Health.

Additionally, MCWG recommends that the Legislature take action to ensure that the program addresses patient needs such as enhanced confidentiality, presumptive eligibility, faster certification, and access to forms and other necessary documents on the program website.

MCWG also urges the Legislature to facilitate the development and implementation of policies and procedures to facilitate inter-island transport of medical cannabis, and direct the counties and relevant administrative agencies to educate law enforcement and public safety officers on the medical cannabis law as a whole.

Other recommendations address healthcare matters such as creating a protocol for adding new covered medical conditions; expediting coverage for hospice patients; and extending the validity of program certification for more than one year for patients with chronic conditions.

Finally, since not all of the problems with the program need to be addressed by legislative action, MCWG recommends that the Medical Cannabis Working Group be permanently convened to identify and help implement strategies, both legislative and administrative, to improve Hawaii's program.

Aloha Senators:

I am writing today in support of the Senate version of this measure.

As a supporter of Medical Marijuana and the many patients who need it, this is just too important an issue for us to wait five more years for this program to be tested. The most urgent need according to most patients and the *Medical Cannabis Working Group* is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medication.

The pilot project, as proposed here, will not help patients on the other islands and it does not establish a long-term solution to the problem of obtaining medical marijuana from a legal source. There is enough experience with compassion center models in other states to draft the needed regulations to indeed implement a <u>full</u> program in Hawai'i. A pilot program is not necessary.

Establishing such compassion centers indeed solves a gray area in the law that established the current Medical Marijuana program as passed in 2000 -- eleven years ago. Although current law allows patients to grow their own plants, the law is silent as to where patients should acquire seeds or clones to start their supply. Even more confusing is that the Department of Public Safety has said that the only legal transfer of marijuana is between a registered patient and that patient's registered caregiver. This is an impossible set of hurdles for most patients, many with debilitating diseases and conditions, to overcome. Caregivers are difficult to find and they are currently limited to assisting only one patient, many patients are unable to grow their own medicine because some live in apartments or condominiums, others live in areas where their plants are not secure and are subject to vandalism or theft, and others are just too sick to provide the care needed for their plants to grow to maturity. In short, patients using Medical Marijuana are law-abiding citizens who want to remain law abiding and should not be forced to go to neighborhood drug pushers for their medicine.

Please revisit the Senate version of this measure and make the needed adjustments that would see this needed program implemented state-wide and as soon as is humanly possible. Thank you for your kind consideration of my testimony.

I am testifying today in support of the Senate version to SB 1458 SD2 HD1 Relating to Health. The changes that the House version makes to the original Senate version are not in the best interests of the medical cannabis patient community in Hawaii or the state as a whole. The original Senate version is well written and should be passed as is.

The most outrageous change in the House version was to set up a five year pilot program to establish a compassion center on only one island (Maui) while prohibiting transport of medicine (cannabis) off that island.

First off, why Maui? In terms of sheer numbers of registered patients, Big Island has a far greater need for a compassion center. In terms of sheer number of potential patients (with limited means/locations to grow medical cannabis), Oahu has a far greater need. I can certainly attest that a great interest/demand exists amongst my patients on Kauai who are medical cannabis users. Clearly, a need exists to have at least one compassion center in each county, if not more, as the original Senate version allowed.

I am also concerned about the so-called "pilot program" study. If elected officials truly wish to study how such a program might work throughout the islands, the study needs to take place throughout the islands. Each island is different, and while the operations of one compassion center could be easily undermined by unsupportive police authorities (as reportedly found on Maui), it would be much harder to undermine this pilot program if multiple centers (in multiple counties) were in operation. I am especially concerned that the proposed length of this pilot program – five years – might prevent better bills (like the original Senate version) from passing in the meantime.

When the original medical cannabis law passed both houses of the Hawaii legislature back in 2000, the law applied to all Hawaiians, not just those on one island. Why? Because a need exists throughout the Hawaiian community for safe and legal access to medical cannabis. The establishment of compassion centers throughout the state would further help meet this need and enable the state to regulate the provision of this need.

I understand that certain law enforcement authorities are concerned that they will have difficulty regulating and enforcing the legal sale of cannabis. But do they have difficulty regulating and enforcing the legal sale of tobacco and alcohol? Are they arguing for tobacco and alcohol prohibition? Besides being a safer, less addicting alternative, how would regulating cannabis sales be different? Honestly, the only reason I can see any police officer opposing such a thing is that they somehow personally benefit from the illegal sale of cannabis in the state. The underground cannabis market exists largely because the government (state and federal) have made a substance which is in high demand (cannabis) illegal. While the scope of this bill is limited to medical cannabis patients, those are the people who need the cannabis most! The original Senate version of this bill would do much to bring the underground cannabis market into the light. It would provide an outlet for individuals to apply their cannabis growing skills legally. And it could generate revenue for all counties.

I must also take issue with the proposed 30% tax on medical marijuana products. This is just another example of the double standard that exists between medical cannabis and all other medicines. Does the state impose a 30% tax on prescription medicines for high blood pressure or diabetes? How about over the counter medicines like Tylenol or cough syrup? Why not? Because it would be an outrage (especially to "health" insurance companies)! Many many more people would be unable to pay for their needed medicine. The general welfare of our state would be greatly worsened. So why is this double standard being applied to cannabis? Now I could understand taxing cannabis sales if it was fully legalized and was being purchased for recreational use. But unfairly taxing the sale of cannabis for medicinal use is really despicable.

One last concern I have about the House version of this bill is the inclusion of the federal Food and Drug Administration in the regulation of cannabis containing consumables. That seems like a Trojan Horse to the entire bill. The DEA doesn't recognize state law concerning medical cannabis. Having such an organization involved would intimidate potential customers to say the very least and perhaps sabotage the entire pilot program. This is a state law and should remain so.

Please do NOT allow SB1458 to pass as amended by the House. It would be a disservice to medical cannabis users throughout the state (including Maui). The fact that medical cannabis patients can (as able) legally cultivate and use their medicine is an important first step in putting a compassionate end to an inhumane drug war that undermines the general welfare of the state. The establishment of compassion centers throughout all counties in Hawaii is the logical and much needed next step. As such, SB1458 needs to remain as originally passed by the Senate.

- * The experience of New Mexico and Colorado have proven that states can adequately regulate medical marijuana dispensaries negating the need for a pilot project.
- * A 30% tax is an exorbitant rate to charge on a medicine that insurance will not pay for. If medical marijuana is taxed at all in Hawaii, it should be taxed at the standard excise tax rate for most goods and services.
- * The most urgent need according to most patients and the Medical Cannabis Working Group is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine.*
 - * Patients should not be forced to go to the criminal market for their medicine.*
- * A state-regulated system of medical marijuana distribution should be safe from federal interference since Attorney General Eric Holder advised U.S. Attorneys in states with medical marijuana laws against investigating and prosecuting federal marijuana violations if individuals are acting in clear compliance with state law. This bill would provide the law with which to act in compliance.
- * Hawaii's law requires patients to grow their own medicine or have a caregiver grow for them. Many patients do not have the horticultural expertise necessary to grow their own medicine and do not know anyone who could grow it for them.
- * For patients suddenly stricken with a serious ailment, the months it takes to cultivate and harvest medical marijuana is prohibitive. Dispensaries will allow immediate access and prevent patients from having to go to drug dealers for their medicine.
- * According to an October 2010 CNBC article, tax revenue from medical marijuana dispensaries are bringing in about \$50,000 a month for the city of Colorado Springs, Colorado.

I am a medical marijuana patient living on the Hawaii Island.

I am also a cancer patient, currently undergoing chemotherapy on Oahu every two weeks.

The police have been arresting patients at the airports, and a judge found a patient guilty in Kona recently, so I must smuggle medicine to Oahu (or take a risk buying it on the black market in Honolulu...or not have any medicine at all). Having only one compassion center on Maui for a test period of five years does not help me, or most other patients, at all. At least there should be one location on each island for the pilot program. If there is only a compassion center on Maui, then you must fix the wording of the law so that patients can travel inter-island safely with medicine (just like with Oxycontin or any prescription), and so that they can travel in their car with it. (Actually, the wording must be fixed in any case. No patient should be arrested for travelling with their medicine.)

The medical marijuana program has been unchanged for 10 years, don't make us wait 5 more years (unless we all move to Maui).

Support with revisions

I am a medical cannabis patient residing on the Big Island.

I do support the intent of compassion centers, but the Senate version of this bill is better (but it needs revisions too).

Having safe access to good quality medicine was one of the main needs expressed by patients in the Medical Cannabis Working Group. But this current version only gives patients in Maui a pilot program, which is very unfair to patients on other islands (in fact the Big Island has 60% of all patients). At least each island should have one compassion center during any trial period. Five years seems very long to run a test program, why make patients on other islands wait so long?

For some, a compassion center will be the best choice to access their medicine, but for others, they will prefer to grow their own, or have a caregiver do it. So, do not take away the right of a patient or caregiver to grow their medicine.

Having a 30% excise tax is excessive, and eventually the patient will have to pay higher prices for medicine. This is very unfair to tax one form of medicine, while other prescription drugs are not taxed.

Not allowing patients to take medicine from Maui makes no sense...what are they supposed to do when the travel? Have no medicine? The legislation needs to clarify the transportation issue (at the airport and in a motor vehicle) as too many patients are being arrested and/or prosecuted for having medicine with them.

Charging out of state visitors \$100 for a temporary license is too high. There should be no extra charge to a tourist, they pay a lot of money to get to Hawaii in the first place. Reciprocity should be allowed at no charge (the same as in Maine, Montana, Michigan and Rhode Island). A patient with valid ID should be allowed into the compassion center. They will pay a sales tax on anything they buy, and that should be sufficient revenue for the state.

If there is only one compassion center on each island, a patient may have to travel a long distance before getting home, so they should be allowed to medicate on the premises. Since using medicine in public is not allowed, a patient needs a safe, secure location in private...which should be the compassion center.

Having a five year pilot program that will cease to exist also has the problem of finding someone to actually open the compassion center. What business person would start a business knowing that it will get shut down after 5 years? What provisions are there to allow the existing compassion center to continue to operate after the pilot program is finished?

Don't make the program about making money for the state. Getting affordable medicine with safe access to patients should be goal #1.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair & Committee Members,

I testify today in SUPPORT the Senate Version of SB1458 and a legal dispensary system but OPPOSED to SB1458 as it is currently amended.

I have had Multiple Sclerosis (MS) for 20 years and counting...because there is no cure for MS. MS is an immune system disorder and that means that my body thinks there is something inside that has to be destroyed...only it happens to be the myelin sheath that surrounds the nerves. Think of it like an electrical cord like the ones in your home, and imagine that the cover on the electrical cord just starts to dissolve, leaving the copper inside exposed. That is MS. The destruction creates lesions in the brain and on the spinal column and eventually the lesions on the brain become black holes. There is no cure and my symptoms include (but are by no means limited to) vision problems (chronic optical neuritis), mobility issues and incontinence.

I usually start my day sitting on the toilet with a bucket in front of me. That is not because of MS though, that is because my gastrointestinal system has been destroyed by prescribed pharmaceuticals. I have permanently damaged my stomach, bowels, liver and esophagus from medication that was approved by the appropriate drug approval processes, distributed legally by drug companies that required a legal prescription by a licensed physician.

None of those drugs helped me and many caused allergic reactions and drug interactions. For example: codeine gave me "suicide" and "cluster" headaches, NSAIDs eat through my stomach and interferon (an injectable drug that I was taught to inject into myself) caused chronic hepatitis. Clearly this approach is worthy of its own FAIL blog but not because the physicians and health care professionals were intentionally being failures. They just didn't have all the information or tools they needed to help me. You can change things today to make sure this doesn't happen to somebody else.

This legislation before you today was written with a clear intent to provide a mechanism to give a patient a safe, legal way to obtain their medication. The problem now is that the bill's original intent has become one business man with one dispensary in Maui for 5 years. That displays a

complete disregard for the needs of the majority of patients and clearly this solution is compounded by the intention to eliminate rather then augment our caregiver system.

This amended bill puts one business in place that responds to one aspect of the requirement to give patients a legal, safe mechanism to obtain cannabis.

I strongly support having compassion centers, but the pilot program should provide one center on each island. Five years is far too long to test it exclusively on one island and shows a complete lack of compassion for Hawai'i ill and dying.

Patients still require and want to retain the right to grow their own medicine or have a caregiver do it. The dispensary should not be the only option because for some patients, it is cost prohibitive. The dispensary is a business and not a non-profit. They won't be giving this stuff away and they don't want you to grow it because you have to come to them with your \$\$ and get whatever they have. The dispensary should be the option for the patient to obtain or exchange specific live plant strains and seeds but not the only place to obtain your medicine. I personally CANNOT afford to pay for all the meds I need and insurance will not cover it. I also require specific strains to treat MS. We need to expand our caregiver program and increase patient to caregiver ratio rather than eliminate it and tie a patient to one specific dispensary.

That brings up transportation issues that need to be addressed. Can I fly from Maui to here with my meds? Can I drive to my house from another location with my meds without fear of prosecution? We need to clear up transportation issues for patients traveling to and from Oahu for medical tests/procedures and doctor's visits.

Last thing I want to mention is that I really am surprised about the tax. I have never heard of such a thing on medication, especially 30%. If you are going to decriminalize marijuana and then impose this or some outrageously BIG tax on recreational use, Bless You. That would be fine and ultimately lead to the balancing of the state budget but, I don't think you should tax medication.

I support the Senate version for the following reasons and mainly because of the traumatized experience with the law I had to experience when I voluntarily disclosed my marijuana residue in my bag when I got pulled over for expired safety check. I was humiliated in front of my apartment, arrested by the whole watch, taser gun pointed at me, used procedural scare tactics to try and find other drugs on me, confiscated my vehicle, and went through a lengthy frustrating court process. Lets not forget to mention that my name was advertised in the police blog like a criminal. I was being honest and all I wanted was to take and have my medical marijuana for my chronic back pain that the VA have neglected in providing proper care for disabled veterans like myself. Enough is enough. Let me have my medicine in peace.

- The amended House version of SB 1458, or the "pilot project" would not help patients on all islands. It would only provide safe access to medical marijuana for patients living on Maui.
- The experience of New Mexico and Colorado have proven that states can adequately regulate medical marijuana dispensaries negating the need for a pilot project.
- A 30% tax is an exorbitant rate to charge on a medicine that insurance will not pay for. If medical marijuana is taxed at all in Hawaii, it should be taxed at the standard excise tax rate for most goods and services.
- The most urgent need according to most patients and the Medical Cannabis Working Group is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine.*
- Patients should not be forced to go to the criminal market for their medicine.*
- A state-regulated system of medical marijuana distribution should be safe from federal interference since Attorney General Eric Holder advised U.S. Attorneys in states with medical marijuana laws against investigating and prosecuting federal marijuana violations if individuals are acting in clear compliance with state law. This bill would provide the law with which to act in compliance.

- Hawaii's law requires patients to grow their own medicine or have a caregiver grow for them. Many patients do not have the horticultural expertise necessary to grow their own medicine and do not know anyone who could grow it for them.
- For patients suddenly stricken with a serious ailment, the months it takes to cultivate and harvest medical marijuana is prohibitive. Dispensaries will allow immediate access and prevent patients from having to go to drug dealers for their medicine.
- According to an October 2010 CNBC article, tax revenue from medical marijuana dispensaries are bringing in about \$50,000 a month for the city of Colorado Springs, Colorado.
- The Senate version of SB 1458 provides adequate state oversight to ensure that medicine is not diverted into the criminal market.

Having compassion centers and safe access to good medicine (in a variety of forms) at a fair price is important for many patients who cannot grow their own medicine. Limiting the pilot program to Maui means the vast majority of patients are shut out for five years.

Having a 30% tax on products sold will translate into higher prices for patients. Where is the "compassion" in that? And, if the price is too expensive it will probably keep them from signing up in the first place.

Oakland, CA and Berkeley, CA seem to have very good working models for dispensaries, why not use their example instead of creating a new pilot program?

The current law has not changed since the beginning 10 years ago, if this version passes, what happens to all the people who don't live on Maui? No change at all? No change in patient-caregiver ratio? No change in the language to define "concentrate" or the quantity required to make it? No change in how to acquire clones or seeds?

And don't even think of taking away my right to grow my own medicine (a plant). Some people may prefer a compassion center, and that's fine and we need to help those who can't grow.

I am writing only in support of the Senate Version of this bill.

It is inhumane to create a medical marijuana bill and then force citizens with debilitating conditions to break the law in order to secure sufficient marijuana to deal with their condition. We need a place where legal marijuana can be purchased ON ALL ISLANDS!

The pilot project in the House version discriminates against patients on islands other than Maui!

The Senate version recognizes the difficulties in the current law and corrects them. The current House version only corrects the problem on Maui.

Compassion centers are needed because most marijuana patients are law abiding citizens who want a legal, reliable, and safe source for their marijuana. Many of them cannot grow their own, often because they live in apartment buildings or in areas where their plants are not protected from theft or vandalism. Others are too sick to grow their own and may not be able to find a caregiver.

I have recently published an Island Voices piece in which I point out that treating our marijuana users like criminals is a terrible discrimination against them because marijuana is a far safer substance than tobacco or alcohol. It is shameful that this discrimination exists and that making marijuana available in dispensaries is not widely adopted and a source of considerable income for the State of Hawaii.

The Big Island Chapter of Americans for Safe Access strongly supports passage of the Senate Version of SB 1458. In no way can we support the five year pilot program in Maui if the other islands are not be included. We have more than 4000 patients on the Big Island which represents more than half of the entire state's registered patients. Our situation is dire and the need crucial. More than ever we need safe access to medical cannabis and a reliable and consistent supply. We cannot achieve that without compassion centers and we don't have the time to wait. We are law abiding citizens that do not to break the law every time we buy a seed or product.

It is unfortunate that the law passed in 2000 did not include language about how a patient may legally obtain their medicine. However, SB1458 is a way to solve this flaw and clear up a gray area in the current law. This is the perfect time to do the right thing following nearly 11 years of no change.

In addition to our previously submitted testimony in support of SB 1458 we would like to suggest the following amendments to the bill which will make cannabis more accessible to Big Island patients and make it fairer to all.

- 1. First of all delete the five year pilot program on Maui. None of the groups, patients and physicians agree to that. It will not work and defeats the extreme urgency and need for the creation of compassion centers. All the islands need compassion centers, not just Maui.
- 2. Returning to the original version of SB 1458, proportion the number of compassion centers on each island to the number of patients in the state rather than to the general population. There is no reason why Oahu should have 10 centers with far fewer cannabis patients and the Big Island should only have 6. The number of centers could be reapportioned every five years.

The Big Island's population is spread over 4000 square miles making it difficult to drive to a compassion center conveniently. Many patients are too ill to travel long distances. For convenience and safety reasons a greater number of centers should be located in the small communities shattered throughout the Big Island which are additional reasons why the Big Island needs a greater number of compassion centers.

3. Delete the \$100 fee for a visitor to register for a temporary permit to buy medicine at a compassion center. This unfairly penalizes a tourist who is, also, a patient. The tourist/patient cannot legally carry cannabis on board a plane. They need to be able to purchase their medicine when they get to their

Hawai'i destination. Replace this with reciprocity recognizing registered patients arriving from states that have medical cannabis laws.

- 4. Delete that each patient designate only one compassion center. Not all compassion centers will be the same on offering competitive prices, a variety of strains or in providing excellent quality and a medicinal grade product. Patients' comparison shop different pharmacies now for the best prices why should it be any different for medical cannabis patients?
- 5. Delete that the patient registry stays with the Dept. of Public Safety. The entire program belongs within the Dept. of Health.

Most of the other amendments we believe we can live with. At this point what is very urgent is that this bill with workable amendments needs to be passed by both houses and signed into law. It will be extremely beneficial to the patients to be able to access a reliable and consistent source of medicine in a totally safe environment. Mahalo Nui Loa.

Double standards don't work when it comes to public safety and the health and well being of our community.

Personally, Maui is a special place to me. Although I am not a resident of Maui, I have strong family ties to the Valley Isle. Kaupo is the birthplace of my grandmother, and my parents reside on Homestead land in Kula. To utilize any location in the great state of Hawai'i as "testing grounds" for medical marijuana is a travesty. I submit that we reserve valuable tax dollars by evaluating the hard lessons being learned from states repealing their medical marijuana laws as a result of increased violent crimes in compassion care center neighborhoods.

A key element to successful leadership is the practice of forward thinking. Please consider the negative impact that Bill SB1458, SD2, HD1 will have on the people and lifestyle of Hawai'i, now and fifty years from now.

I am testifying today in support of establishing compassion centers for seriously ill patients who qualify to use medical cannabis.

Although I have objections to several aspects of this bill as follows:

In regards to Section 2 Page 3 Lines 21, 22 Page 4 Lines 1-2

"Provides a safe and accessible distribution system for qualifying patients to designate a Compassion Center as their supplier of medical marijuana"

In my opinion this translates to; You are only allowed to go to one place and you have to tell us who you get your medicine from. I personally do not understand the need for this restriction, which clearly restricts my choices. What happens if the grower looses the crop? This will cause a trickle down effect that will clearly impact everyone from literally the ground up. As a patient I feel this imposes undue stress on choosing only one dispensary. It would be the same as telling me I was only allowed to purchase my cinnamon or sugar at a specific "Safeway Store" or risk loosing my access.

In regards to Section 2 Page 4 Lines 10-19

<u>Establishes a class 3 medical marijuana-infused products manufacturing license for creating medical marijuana-infused products to be distributed to class 1 licensees for sale to qualifying patients;</u>

Myself being a patient and the fact this is the best route, for myself of administering a medicinal dosage of medical cannabis, I must object to the idea that the manufacturer can not have a store front. This is also clearly an attempt to implement limits on choice. This license requires infused products to be manufactured in a commercial building; but considering the legal ramifications it is utterly impossible to find rental property that will allow such businesses at a reasonable cost and the idea of purchasing property is simply not realistic.

Page 6 line 10-14 S329-B Definitions

"Compassion center" means a class 1 medical marijuana compassion center licensee, other than the qualifying patient and the qualifying patient's physician, who has agreed to be the primary caregiver of the qualifying patient.

Clearly another attempt to restrict ownership of compassion center's from the very patients who need and use them. This is simply unrealistic to expect someone who is not a patient nor a caregiver to be knowledgeable or to be "compassionate" on the aspects of using medical marijuana.

Page 7 Lines 9 -21

"Collects from all licensees an initial licensing fee of \$20,000 for a class 1 medical marijuana compassion center license; \$10,000 for a class 2 medical marijuana cultivation license; and \$10,000 for a class 3 medical marijuana-infused products manufacturing license"

I do not understand the need for such exorbitant licensing fees for medical marijuana when the highest fee for an Consumer Cooperative with capitol stock is \$50.00; without is \$25, Agricultural Cooperative without capitol stock is \$25 and with is \$50 presently. What are the reasons behind charging such high fees?

In my opinion this is also a form of limiting access to those who may not have such cash on hand and gives me the feeling that this encourages "buying your way in" and an annual fee echo's extortion when the highest cost of a business license in Hawaii is around \$200.

Page 11 Lines 7-9

<u>The business premises of a class 2 licensee may not be contiguous to a licensed class 1 medical marijuana compassion center;</u>

This is contradictory to the plant limit already established under adequate supply on Page 22 Lines 14-22 Page 23 Line 1-6 Of 7 plants and 6 ounces per patient per fourteen day period

How can a compassion center not have grow facilities yet house plants for patients use or purchase? This simply goes back to attempts to limit access to a single grower or dispensary. This is simply not acceptable.

Page 11 Lines 10-13

A class 2 licensee shall designate a class 1 licensee or a class 3 licensee as the business or nonprofit entity to which the class 2 licensee provides medical marijuana

This is clearly an attempt to restrict sales, Why should a dispensary be committed to one grower? Again, What happens if the grower looses his crop? Or doesn't have adequate supply? Where is the option to "shop around" for the best grower with the best product, this is only possible if you are able to sample the medicine for quality and not all growers will have specific strains to alleviate particular symptoms. This is no different than a grocer choosing multiple distributors for the best products for a reasonable price.

Page 12 Lines 19-22

Medical marijuana-infused products shall be prepared on the business premises that are used exclusively for the manufacture and preparation of medical marijuana-infused products

Again this restricts the option of the manufacture of medical cannabis products to a single grower. This is not feasible nor realistic. Again what happens if the crop isn't sufficient or is lost? Not all growers can grow every strain of cannabis. Specific strains help specific problems.

Page 23 line 22 page 24 line 1

Every qualifying patient shall only have one primary caregiver or one dispensary at a time Again this is unrealistic when the variety of strains is immeasurable.

Page 24 Lines 5-7, 13-18

(c) Primary caregivers shall register with the department of public safety. Every primary caregiver shall be responsible for the care of only one qualifying patient at any given time.

This needs to be moved to the Department of Health this is not a "safety issue" it is a issue of a persons health and wellbeing.

Again, this limit's the patients freedom of choice and could severely affect a patients health if the grower is unable to supply the dispensary with adequate supply or a variety of strains. This is unreasonable to limit a caregiver to a single patient, even a pharmacist has thousands of patients they dispense too with the written recommendation of a physician.

(e) For purposes of subpart B, the department shall allow out-of-state visitors who are qualifying patients or primary caregivers in their home state to obtain a temporary registration certificate; provided that there shall be assessed and collected an administrative fee of \$100 for the length of time of the visit.

This fee is outrageous, coupled with the 15% tax and the basic cost per gram this could equate to upwards of \$500 for a Visitor to our state to acquire adequate medication while visiting. With so many patients on disability this is simply unrealistic to imagine that someone on a limited income could afford such outrageous fees associated with traveling to another state and acquiring medication. I see this as no different that transferring a prescription to another pharmacy or refilling a prescription in the event medications are lost while traveling. I could not imagine going on vacation and having to pay \$100 just to walk into a pharmacy and pray they have what I need because the state limits my choice and I have one shot at picking the right dispensary.

I am a patient, not a criminal. I need this in order to live. The past few months it has become increasing more difficult to find decent medication for a reasonable cost. We need to have a resource for obtaining medication that is both safe and cost worthy.

I have tried to grow / cultivate, in fact I still am attempting; it is not as easy as tossing a few seeds into the ground. There is time, care and supplies involved so it is reasonable to expect to pay for those services if one is unable to grow for ones self and unable to find a reputable caregiver / grower. Which brings me to the question of where do you get seeds or plants? We need a resource for this as well.

There are instances where a patient would want to explore alternate means of ingestion of cannabis, such as infused products. Ie; tinctures, baked goods, candies. I get much better relief from this form myself personally.

At the age of 17 I was involved in a major motor vehicle accident. I suffered a fractured pelvis and multiple other injuries. My parents were even told I would never walk again. This started me on a crash course of addiction for the last 30 years.

I have suffered from Chronic pain, Fibromyalgia, Cyclic Vomiting syndrome, Thoracic Outlet Syndrome and a laundry list of other equally horrific maladies that have left me dependant upon opiates and at one time even a terrible methadone addiction directly caused by my "pain management doctor" who every time I said the medicine was killing me, he insisted "it the cheapest most effective medicine I can give you" Well, it almost cost me my life.

It took me over a year to get my life back. I struggle daily with severe pain and muscle spasms. Medical marijuana has been my saving grace. Without it I would be dead. My weight has plummeted from a healthy 125 lbs to a staggering 98 lbs at my worst. I struggle daily with intense nausea that is exacerbated by stress. It is not unreasonable for me to hope that my right to freedom of choice and the right to an informed decision would include the option to use whatever means necessary to have a quality life verses quantity. I want to live my life free of narcotics and free to medicate with the most natural form of pain relief possible. Which for me and millions like me is Medicinal Cannabis.

I respectfully ask for your support of these bills and thank you for your time.

Aloha and thank you for this opportunity to submit testimony on Senate Bill 1458, SD2, HD1 which amends Hawaii's medical marijuana laws to create three classes of medical marijuana licenses to include new provisions for dispensaries or "compassion centers".

Through my research as the Anti-Drug Coordinator for the County of Kaua'i, I have found that marijuana is not the safe and harmless drug many people want you to believe.

The most recent study through the Archives of General Psychiatry shows that using marijuana may cause psychosis to develop in patients already predisposed to developing it, and in other patients, the drug may even cause psychosis. The study also states that it is increasingly clear that marijuana is a cause of schizophrenia, and that schizophrenia caused by cannabis starts earlier than schizophrenia from other causes.

In researching other state laws on marijuana, our Law Enforcement Committee has found that many of the dispensaries throughout the United States have become the target of violent crime. Many of the surrounding businesses where dispensaries are located have suffered as a result of the kinds of people that are frequenting these facilities.

I have recently read numerous articles on other states that are in the process of repealing their medical marijuana laws.

This bill will have a negative impact on the quality of life of our residents. For these reasons, I do not support Senate Bill 1458, SD2, HD 1 and ask that it be held.

I am writing you today very hopefully in strong support of SB 1458, which would finally allow Act 228 of June 14th, 2000 to begin to function for the patients and caregivers. For over 10 years now, patients, doctors, nurses, and other curious citizens have been trying to figure out a way to help each other without exposing themselves to potentially very serious legal liabilities. This bill will begin to help Act 228 function, give patients and police alike some guidelines to follow, and also generate much needed tax revenue for the general fund.

Ten years ago, after graduating high school in New York, I wanted to learn more about Cannabis and hoped to come out to Hawaii and work in a dispensary. Doctors I asked, had no idea what a blue card was and had no interest in getting involved with the Narcotics Enforcement Division. In the past ten years, the police have " politely robbed" me and arrested me 4 times for trying to provide safe access. Each time, approximately a dozen to 2 dozen officers and a few detectives ruined my day, took my vehicles, inventory, and other property. I have been very blessed and fortunate to have kept my freedom except for a few (about 9) days in jail total, but each time it has been financially devastating and personally depressing to be processed and treated as a criminal. As somebody who has been helping patients all along, I would be greatly relieved to be given an opportunity to be a respected AND productive citizen and the opportunity to make a living and pay taxes without fear. I like to think I'm unique, but the truth is that there are many people like me, who have been waiting to be taken seriously, not taken to jail! As frustration mounts, patience is replaced with anger at being seemingly entrapped in an admittedly large gray area between legality and criminal conduct. Both myself and the police would really appreciate your help and guidance. In the mean time, we're all wasting each other's time and resources in a time when there's nothing left to waste. Please give us a legal avenue to walk.

I may not have the means to open a "Compassionate Care Club" or Cooperative or Collective immediately, but I am still very excited about all of the ancillary, or support, businesses that wait to open. Legitimate businesses in this emerging industry include, but are not limited to; Clinical Analysis Laboratories, marketing, packaging, consulting, bakeries and delivery, nutrient companies, soil companies, lighting, and security (hello off duty police officers!). And also my latest attempt at trying something else, Real Estate. There is currently a tremendous amount of vacant commercial real estate that would enjoy the added demand and slow restaurants that would love complimentary neighbors.

Of course, all this is possible if this bill passes in a form closer the original form. Patients on all islands deserve safe access, and having a choice of providers (like going to Long's or Walmart) is necessary to ensure a good variety of edibles and strains and services. I would think from a judicial standpoint your committee would understand that it would be bad for everybody to allow a monopoly to occur. This bill should help all islands in terms of patients, public safety, business, economic recovery and employment. I also hope that your committee's perspective also understands that both resident patients and visiting patients are willing to pay sales tax or compassionate care centers would gladly incorporate similar to the earlier proposed \$30 per ounce tax. Like any other goods, if you impose excessive (sin) taxes, especially when only applying it to patients, won't go over well or effective in raising tax revenue, because it would most likely result in significantly higher prices, and therefore many patients may still have to rely on the black market.

As U.H. Economist, Lawrence W. Boyd, Ph.D. recently wrote The Budget Implications for Marijuana Decriminalization and Legalization report, and in his very conservative estimation, " Economic analysis of current public policies on marijuana reveals that Hawaii state and county governments could reap up to \$33 million annually in new revenues and cost savings if tax and regulatory policies were to replace law enforcement to control marijuana distribution. Furthermore, research indicates that enforcement expenditures of up to \$10 million each year statewide have failed to reduce the amount of marijuana available in Hawaii."

As Harvard Professor of Economics Jeffrey A. Miron wrote in his report, The Budgetary Implications of Marijuana Prohibition, "One issue in this debate is the effect of marijuana prohibition on government budgets. Prohibition entails direct enforcement costs and prevents taxation of marijuana production and sale."

If a well regulated, but fair and free market with healthy competition were to occur, and it was fairly taxed maybe at 8% an estimated \$4-23 million dollars at least annually added to the general fund and taken away from fueling the black market.

Thank you very much for your careful consideration of rationalizing policies regarding Medical Cannabis and helping patients finally get safe access.

No Patient should be forced to sign up to have one dispensary to obtain their medical needs from. I use Kmart and Longs to obtain my other medical needs from as do millions here in Hawaii. Patients must have the right to grow and produce their own medicine. Patients must have the right to choose their Caregiver without being forced not to have one except a dispensary.

Amended & change to read, any Medical Marijuana Patient from another State seeking to obtain Medicine while in Hawaii vacationing or staying over 2 weeks, will need to register and pay a \$25.00 fee. The \$100.00 is out of line.

If a dispensary is to have 7 plants and 6 ounces for each patient in a 2 week period, legally having a patient base of over 14 patients would be breaking any Federal Law as that would be over 99 plants. Separate Class 2 Cultivar Licenses for up to 99 plants would be a maximum allowed for any Grower not to exceed Federal Law. An existing Farmer Based allotment such as the "Tobacco Tax Allotment" currently is, would be more in line and benefit the Hawaii Based Farmers in a much better way.

Instead of having only one class 2 licenses to produce enough for a dispensary, a "CULTIVAR" class license would be more appropriate if allowing a Class 2 licensee to have only up to 99 plants thus ensuring no Federal Prosecution for any Class 1 Dispensary or Class 2 Production license. The State of Hawaii, if not would be justifying breaking all Federal Laws. It does state that all Class 1, 2 & 3 license holders would not be prosecuted under Hawaii State Law, but you have encouraged one to break Federal Laws based upon this latest version.

24/7 live feed to the Police would entail the following, 5 full time officers to monitor the live feeds per location at a cost to the taxpayers of over \$500, 000.00 per year. This is ludicrous and unjust. Having a secured premise with 24/7 Security Videos and alarms would suffice along with 72 hour back up on tape.

Unannounced visits should be changed to be 24 hour notice of inspection.

How dare the House of Representatives impose a 30% tax be levied amongst Medical Marijuana Patients. The State of Hawaii would be allowing and condoning "Discrimination" of all Medical Marijuana Patients and Caregivers. There is no other tax like this for any Medicines in Hawaii or any

other State. How dare the House of Representatives only allow an initial 5 year Pilot Program for Maui County only and not for O'ahu, Kauai, or Hawaii?

It is not a hard thing to grow at all, there have been many times that I watched as young kids would be tending their plants and saw how they would share it with their friends, then start selling it, I witnessed their anger would we community members would call the police or go and destroy their plants or watch their parents bulldoze the plants. These people who live in condominums lie, cause I know people who have grown them with no problem at all, a few who were caught and spent time in jail. It is not a bill that should even be considered. My own mother who did not have medical marijuana would use her neighbors joint to feel better, only to feel worse, and it ended up destroying her being able to make good choices, along with other vices. I personally am against this bill, but I speak on behalf of our community where drugs can be rampant. Just today a youth who was probably high on marijuana may have started a fire that endangered the lives of children attending our Boys and Girls club. I have witnessed too much physical harm in my own neighborhood and ask that all of you who sit on this panel really, really weigh the benefits and the negative effects of this bill. My own daughter has a rare form of cancer but does not even use pain pills because she wants to keep her mind and wits about her. All I and our community ask is for help in stopping the use of this and other drugs. Come into our Hawaiian homestead and you will see about 5 to 8 yards with legally grown marijuana which is something we as an association is not happy with. It is teaching our children that it is available, just go hang out at that persons house, or see what you can do if you want to feel good, or get a " buzz. " My daughters neighbor has a medical card, but almost every week he has a bunch of cars parked in front of his house and they enjoy themselves, people come and go, and all because he grows his marijuana and has never been checked on to see if he is in compliance. The use of it should not be so available to anyone, no matter the situation. My nephew started with marijuana, not harmful people said, then he turned to ice, and now he is in prison for live cause he shot someone. The people who have testified from the police and the public safety know what they are talking about. I know what I am talking about, please do not pass this bill. I am writing today in support of the Senate version of this measure.

The Program needs to be (more) responsive to patient needs.

- * The pilot project does not help patients on the other islands, it also does not establish a long-term solution to the problem of obtaining medical marijuana from a legal source.
- * There is sufficient experience with compassion center models in other states to draft sensible regulations and implement a full program. A pilot program in not necessary.
- * Establishing compassion centers solves a gray area in the law that established the current medical marijuana program.
- * Patients still want to retain the right to grow their own medicine or have a caregiver do it. The dispensary should not be the only option.
- * Inter-island transportation needs to be clarified (as does transportation in a motor vehicle).
- * 30% excise tax is unreasonably high, and will eventually means patients will pay higher prices for their medicine, while other prescription medicines are not taxed at all.

- * Patients need a consistent and reliable source of medicine now, they should not be forced to wait five more years. The most urgent need according to most patients and the Medical Cannabis Working Group is the establishment of a legal, safe, and reliable source for their medicine.
- * Although current law allows patients to grow their own plants, the law is silent as to where patients should acquire seeds or clones to start their supply. Even more confusing is that the Department of Public Safety has said that the only legal transfer of marijuana is between a registered patient and that patient's registered caregiver. Caregivers are difficult to find and they are currently limited to assisting only one patient.
- * Compassion centers are necessary because many patients want a legal, reliable and safe source for their marijuana. Many patients are unable to grow their own medicine because some live in apartments or condominiums; others live in areas where their plants are not secure and are subject to vandalism or theft; others are just too sick to provide the care needed for their plants to grow to maturity.
- * Patients are law-abiding citizens who want to remain law abiding and should not be forced to go to neighborhood drug pushers for their medicine.
- * Compassion centers would also fill a need for patients who may not know how to use vaporizers or make infused-products on their own.
