Aloha Senator Nishihara,

Partners In Development Foundation (PIDF) strongly supports this measure.

PIDF programs have been actively involved in sustainable Natural Farming as a way to provide our families and children with a healthy nutritious diet, while at the same time encouraging the use of techniques that are environmentally sound.

Using vital traditional concepts such as the ahupua'a system of land and environmental stewardship, and ho'ona'auao, traditional mentorship in education, PIDF creates and implements programs to address the needs of at-risk groups within the Hawaiian community.

Our mentoring program in Kohala has been actively involved in the study and application of Natural Farming as part of their community driven "*Kohala Initiative of 50 % Food Sustainability by the year 2018*" in which the goal is to produce at least half of the food requirements of their area by the target year.

Homeless families and youth served by PIDF have also benefitted directly and indirectly, first through hands-on participation in Natural Farming at a small start-up plot at Mountain View Dairy in Wai'anae, and second by the generous offerings of harvested vegetables to displaced families.

Finally, PIDF operates a safe-house for adjudicated male youth. These young men spend part of their day working the field at Mountain View Dairy, and are learning entrepreneurial skills through the sales of their produce at open markets. In closing, Natural Farming provides our families and children with a healthy foodsource alternative, while at the same time teaching sustainable agri-business skills, and respect for the land.

In May, 2010 we started to test some of his programs. We were very conservative in our approach, because his program is counter to what we were taught in the Agricultural Institutions. Many of the programs are almost opposite of present accepted practices.

As we gain confidence in the programs, we slowing start to put additional programs in place. We have now a section of the farm where Natural Farming is 100% being utilized.

We are happy to report that the projected results that Master Cho presented at the work shops are achievable and are can be done at commercial size farm.

Natural Farming has the potential to rejuvenate Hawaii's Agriculture. As supported by others, it uses less water, no imported fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. It is a system of farming that is independent of ocean freight. The implementation of Natural Farming should be encouraged.

Because it is so counter intuitive, farmers will be reluctant to attempt this at a commercial level. SB 247 will provide a incentive to encourage the implementation of Natural Farming Practices.

Thank you very much for allowing me to comment on <u>SB 247</u> requiring Dept. of Agriculture to establish a grant program to implement Natural Farming in our State of Hawaii.

Natural farming is another alternative to Agriculture production in Hawaii. In my past experience as a High School Ag. Teacher. We spent lots of money : fertilizers, water, weed control, and insecticide. Our produce started nicely the first few crops and as time progressed, the plant became immune to the insecticides, fungicides etc. . So we added more or change it to a stronger insecticide. We wasted a lot of fertilizer assuming the more we added the bigger our vegetable and fruits would weigh. Little did I know that we were harming our environment from the mountain to the sea while creating stronger pest because it ability to cope with the chemicals.

Natural farming is highly technical system that instills producers to be conscious of applying nutritional home made inputs at critical growth stages. In our experience in Natural Farming at North Kohala, we are realizing higher yields and reduction of fertilizer cost by 60 %.

Thank you for allowing me to testify in behalf of myself as a commercial rancher and small producer. I believe Natural Farming is hopeful for our Agriculture sustainability program in the State of Hawaii and is healthy in perpetuating the life of our land. Please vote yes to SB247.

My apologies. I am sending this testimony for the second time. I failed to include the date and time of the hearing on my first send.

Thank you for receiving me via e-mail, Senator Chair, Nishihara, Vice Chair Kahele, and members of the Ag Committee. My name is Debra Welch. I am a board member of Dragon's Eye Learning Center (DELC), a 501 c 3 on the Big Island of Hawaii.

Incorporated in 2003, the mission of DELC is to provide educational experiences of cooperative and sustainable agricultural and economic systems. I would like to share with you some experiences that have moved me to write today in support of SB247.

In my past life, I worked in the budget department of the Ohio Department of Human Services office of Welfare Reform. I can appreciate a tight budget, and the tough choices to be made. So, I ask the question along with you, IS THIS REALLY THE BEST PLACE TO DIRECT FUNDS? My feeling is, YES! WITHOUT A DOUGHT, YES.

When I landed on this island 16 years ago and began raising my children, I became HORRIFIED by the state of children's teeth. (At our learning center, we have primarily served neighborhood children.) Then I became horrified by the state of adult's teeth. Then, unfortunately, I was faced with the reckoning of my own children's poor teeth. The dentists gave me plenty of story about what was at cause - lack of flouride, too much nursing, bad bacteria. Poppy cock! There must be more to it than that.

My family's looking into this problem led us to research done by a dentist from Cleveland, Weston Price, who traveled the world over in the early part of the 1900's looking to solve the riddle of why he had such a thriving practice. What he discovered became all the rage in Harvard's anthropology department, but not with the dentists. Published works of Weston Price show page after page of people's mouths, opened wide, offering a comparison of what a mouth looks like in a well nourished person versus a malnourished person. Weston Price tracked, pretty conclusively, that when people strayed from native diets to modern diets, physical degeneration set in at an alarming rate. It showed first in their mouths. Crowded teeth and decay quickly follow the introduction of cheap oils, high carb diets, processed foods, sugars, and loss of ferments in a diet. Weston Price predicted that a society that stayed the course of the modern diet would end up as a society of diabetics and that degenerative diseases would start to manifest in people at a younger and younger age. Unfortunately, taking on the modern diet was too big for the field of dentistry.

I read in the Tribune Herald last year several alarming statistics. No longer are children expected to live longer lives than their parents. And most alarmingly, of today's island youth, 1/3 to 1/2 are predicted to become diabetic.

If I can offer anything today, I would like to strongly encourage anyone and everyone to watch 2 documentaries. "Food Inc." shows the story of our modernized food system. "King Corn" tells the story of "you are what you eat." Most people are subsidized corn, by the way. It's as simple as that. Supposedly, our current food production system makes the most economic sense. I'm a trained economist, and it fails to make sense to me. Everything I was trained to write off as an "externality" is now at the fore of our consciousness. That little bit of pollution has taken on an economy of scale to the point that we tell our 4H kids, "don't go in that water", "don't taste that soil", don't breath that air, don't, don't. On the positive side, what I am able to say to our children is that, altogether, the adults are seeming to understand that we need to reshape life so that children can enjoy a future of hope and health. BUT WHERE IS THE TECHNOLOGY?

We truly believe that **Natural Farming is the technology**. Dragon's Eye Learning Center was honored to host Master Cho last year for a 7 day workshop series in Hilo. Nearly 400 attended. We have been using the methods at our farm and most notable we are nearing completion of a Natural Farming commercial scale egg laying operation. Center stage solving the issues of animal waste and feed. We are looking to demonstrate a system of growing most all of the chicken feed. Having recently returned from a tour of Natural Farming in Korea, we are confident that the methods are sound.

Our center became involved with Natural Farming after having met Dr. Park. Dr. Park, as you may know, is a retired pediatrian from the Big Island. He met Master Cho some years ago and subsequently has made it his life's work to bring Master's Cho's methods to Hawaii. Dr. Park tells the story that he has seen the predictions of Weston Price come true over the course of his lifetime. Each generation of children seems more and more distressed. Dr. Park will become emotional as he tells the story. Our family's Orthodontist, Dr. Yim of Kona, tells the same. He says that each generation is coming to him with greater and greater challenge. I accept Weston Price's viewpoint that basically we are a malnourished culture.

OUR FOOD MUST NOT ONLY BE PLENTIFUL, IT MUST ALSO BE NUTRITIOUS! Natural Farming focuses on all the elements needed in todays agriculture - low cost, restorative capabilities, locally available inputs, systems for small and large scale agriculture, understanding of plant and animal needs, AND HIGH NUTRITION. Of course, improving the quality of our food will not fix everything. But is it a piece of the puzzle that SEEMS UNDENIABLY before us.

I strongly urge you to vote for SB 247. Again, I thank you very much for staying present to my testimony.

I am writing in support of SB 247. I am a retired professor of agriculture from Hawaii Community College with over 39 years teaching agriculture and presently a part-time farmer.

I have attended many of Master Cho's workshops, discussed, through an interpreter, the principles and practices of Natural Farming, observed commercial natural farming techniques in Korea, and practiced, on a small scale, many of the ideas Master Cho expounds. The results are much better than I expected. I believe the results would have been impressive if I knew what I was doing. Therefore, the need for support of Natural Farming is critical. We are on the bottom of the learning curve, and we need to learn quickly.

The benefits of Natural Farming are numerous, and I am sure others will allude to them so. I will, instead, refer to only one.

The one benefit which people often overlook is economic. At least two farmers in Korea stated that they switched to Natural Farming practices only because they were about to go bankrupt. Fertilizers and pesticides were getting too expensive. Natural Farming techniques utilize many of the materials we presently throw away for plant nutrients. The farmers believe that natural farming saved their farms. Hawaii is on the brink or in the same economic situation.

A reply to skeptics is one that I made to my administrator when he asked about the Natural Farming workshop I had attended. I replied that "It is so regressive that it is progressive."

I ask you to support SB 247. It may save many of the small farms today who are only marginally profitable. Thank you.

I'm writing in support of SB-247 on Natural Farming Grants. I grow organic vegetables for the Hilo market and have been practicing the natural farming methods taught by Master Cho and have found it to be a step beyond organic growing methods.

Natural farming does not require great expenditures of capital for input because the natural fertilizers can be made from readily available local materials. This would not only reduce costs for growers, but also for consumers.

Facilities for producing the natural farming inputs should be constructed by local government on each island using naturally occuring indigenous microorganisms, waste materials such as beef bones, egg shells, green waste, special varieties of plants for growth formulas. These facilities can distribute the products at a low cost to growers.

Due to the recycling of natural and waste materials, natural farming is highly beneficial to the local environments, can be operated on a large scale at low cost, and is non-toxic. I urge you to pass this bill to move Hawaii successfully into a future without oil.

Aloha Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Kahele, and members of the Senate Ag Committee. My name is Dennis Matsuda, life long resident of North Kohala and second-generation son to Okinawan immigrants who worked on the plantation in Kohala.

Growing up, my parents were pretty much self-sustaining at first, but as time went by they began to get more dependent on purchasing most of what we ate. This was due to us moving into a new place where you couldn't raise pigs and chickens, and the soil was too poor to raise vegetables.

For the past year or so I have been working with Natural Farming with the Ka Hana Noe'au Program in Kohala. What a great revelation this has been as it opened up my cycs to seeing how true farming should be, and how we all can learn to grow better crops and produce and enrich our environment in the process.

Although Natural Farming seems so simple, our culture and our efforts to grow more has led many farmers to use synthetic fertilizers and harmful pesticide and herbicides to try to meet new demands. I feel that we all should step back and take a good look at what MOTHER NATURE has to teach us. She has been forming our world since it's birth, and we often try to see how we can speed up her process, which has left us with poor or harmful produce and products.

It is not often that a really significant event crosses our lives. Today we all have a chance to help develop such an event, let Hawaii lead they way for our nation. Let us all get behind Master Cho's dream of feeding the world the natural and healthy way.

Thank you for letting me testify today. I believe we will all remember this day as a milestone in History, that we all participated in. Please support Senate Bill 247.

Good afternoon Senator Chair, Nishihara, Vice Chair Kahele, and members of the Ag Committee. My name is Alika Atay a Full-time commercial farmer of Maui Sweet Potatoes, eggplants, sweet basil, and dryland kalo. Thank you very much for allowing me to comment on <u>SB 247</u> requiring Dept. of Agriculture to establish a grant program to implement Natural Farming in our State of Hawaii. I'm currently farming on a 12 acre lot along Baldwin Ave. in Paia, Maui for the Laakea Foundation; and am currently in negotiation to acquire more lease land to farm from the Maui Land & Pineapple Co. I'm writing in support of this Senate Bill 247.

In addressing our island's sustainability needs, I decided to participate in the process by growing food for our people; and to cut back on the importing of food from afar. In this attempt to grow food, the production cost and growing methods were strongly considered. We looked at the conventional farming methods of just focusing on N-P-K and it's high cost in the use of fertilizer, chemical pesticides and insecticides. We determined that we could not participate in this method of farming because of the high cost; but most especially because it was "not PONO" for our land and the sustainability of it's future. We then looked and compared the alternative method of what most call "organic" and although that method was good for the aina, the cost of it's imported fertilizers and amendments from the mainland was still a little bit expensive (not as much as the conventional method). Thus, I found Master Cho and Dr. Hoon Park's prescribed method of "Natural Farming". I flew from Maui and attended their two-day workshop in Hilo. In participating and reviewing their methods, I realized that there were a lot of similarities with my Tutu's past farming methods also. Just like what my Tutu would prescribe to "malama the aina", the natural farming method starts with "taking care of the soil"; and then it focus' on the plants needs in its particular nutritive cycle.

In my farming, I've given an oath to never use toxic chemical fertilizers and pesticides on any of our plants to grow food for our people. Our people deserve the best and the most healthiest food for themselves. Since instilling this natural farming method we are realizing higher yields from the fields and lowers costs in the use of fertilizers and pesticides because our method utilizes items from the natural environment to assist in the growing production. I would estimate that we have experienced a reduction of fertilizer cost by two-thirds or more than 60%; and we have cut our irrigation water consumption by more than half. My last water bill went from \$750 down to \$250.

In closing, I urge you to vote "YES" for the Senate Bill SB247. It's the pono thing to do for our island's future.
