HOUSE BILL NO. SB249 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chair Nishihara and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Senate Bill No. 249. The Department of Agriculture supports the overall intent of the bill provided that its passage does not impact the priorities set forth in the executive biennium budget.

The purpose of this bill is to appropriate moneys to the Department of Agriculture to purchase the slaughterhouse in Campbell Industrial Park and to make necessary capital improvements to the facility. The slaughterhouse is an essential component of the State's livestock industry. It is the largest slaughterhouse on Oahu and one of the most modern in the State. In order for Hawaii to increase food self-sufficiency it will need a centrally located USDA inspected slaughterhouses to ensure a safe food supply for its citizens, provide hog producers and ranchers access to retail markets and to ensure that local hogs and cattle are humanely processed.

Since the Department already owns the facility and leases it to the Hawaii Livestock
Cooperative who operates the slaughterhouse and owns the equipment, we would respectfully offer
the following comment. It may be more appropriate to provide a grant to the Cooperative to reduce
debt, make the necessary capital improvements and purchase equipment that they deem appropriate.
This would allow the Cooperative to reduce slaughter fees to reasonable levels providing better
returns to local ranchers and hog producers and make operation more efficient.

Dear Senator Nishihare, Senator Kahele, and members of the Committee:

My name is Susan Matsushima, owner of Alluvion, Inc., a diversified agricultural operation on the North Shore of Oahu. I would like to testify in support of Senate Bill 249.

Working with members of the cattle industry in the development of a Statewide plan for the Cattle Industry, we are finding that the Campbell slaughter facility plays a vital role in our Island State's need of slaughtering on each island.

The Campbell facility is the newest in the state and currently services mainly the hog industry. However the facility was built to service both hogs and cattle. Due to the loss of milk production on Oahu, the cattle stream that was planned on for slaughter of cull cows each month also stopped.

The demand of grass fed animals is increasing and Oahu ranchers are looking to increase production and a certified slaughter facility is needed to provide safe beef for our consumers. Zippy's currently uses all local grassfed animals for all of their hamburgers. Although the beef is currently coming from the Big Island, if demand increases and Oahu ranchers have product available, the need for Oahu slaughter can be met by this facility.



Please support Senate Bill 249 so that legal and safe slaughter can occur on Oahu.

Our consumers are mainly on Oahu and with increased beef production within our state, keeping the newest and best slaughter facility open will insure that sustainable production can also increase the food security that we have been striving for.

Aloha Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Kahele, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation supports the intent of this bill for the following reasons:

- We understand that the Oahu facility is in financial distress.
- For island food sustainability and food security reasons, the Oahu facility should remain open to supply meat to the population.
- Most of the population of the islands reside on Oahu and most of these people and our island visitors are not vegetarians; they do eat meat.
- Even if meat shipments from the mainland are available to the islands, this facility supports local livestock farmers/ranchers.
- Many in the community prefer fresh meat to that coming in from the mainland.
- Our understanding is that at the present time, the facility is used mainly for pork processing but that it may also be useful for beef processing in the future.

We hope that this bill will at least further discussion on the situation and its potential resolution.

I am writing in opposition to SB 249, which seeks to appropriate \$1 million to purchase and renovate a slaughterhouse in Campbell Industrial Park.

The State of Hawaii should not be spending money, especially such a significant sum of money, to acquire a facility that is primarily for the use of private industry. The bill is silent on further expenditures by the State that might be needed to actually maintain and run the slaughterhouse. This is an especially egregious waste of taxpayer money in light of Governor Neil Abercrombie's State of the State Address on January 24, 2011, in which he stated that the State of Hawaii not only has "an \$844 million fiscal deficit through the next biennium", but "that there is also a severe operational deficit in government". He further stated, "The truth is that the canoe, which is our beloved Hawaii, could capsize." During such a crisis, it is appalling to think that the State, which is in such a perilous crisis, and may not be able to find enough funds for many of its own critical functions, should be asked to take on yet another burden, particularly one which properly belongs with the private sector.

The above reasons alone should be more than enough to have this bill rejected.

If any other reasons are required, please consider that the State of Hawaii should not be subsidizing either the slaughter of animals, or the businesses that depend on this slaughter. I object to my taxes being spent on contributing to systematic suffering caused to both animals and people. If private industry were to pass on the true cost of raising, transporting and slaughtering meat to its customers, then people would be more likely to reduce their consumption of unhealthy levels of cholesterol-laden meat, and turn to plant-based foods, instead. This, in turn, would help to reduce rates of heart disease, strokes, type 2 diabetes and cancer. The people of Hawaii would be healthier and less in need of expensive medical intervention if meat consumption could be cut, so how would it be in their best interest for the State to subsidize any part of the meat industry?

Please vote to reject SB 249.



Testimony on SB 249 Position: oppose

Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Kahele:

I am Cathy Goeggel, President of Animal Rights Hawai'i and I wish to express our opposition to SB 249 and any other attempts to provide financial defibrillation to the moribund livestock industry in Hawai'i.

Remember the taxpayers' monies that built Moloka'i slaughterhouse, the sweetheart lease deal given Hamakua slaughterhouse, the attempt by the legislature to spend \$65,000 of taxpayer monies for cowtainers, the \$million bond to Palama Meat and the Hawai'i Livestock Cooperative (HLC) abattoir in Campbell Industrial Park (CIP), the state support of feed and shipping for pigs and chickens from just two years ago, and the scandal surrounding the land swap with Hawai'i Raceway Park some years earlier.

Well, Palama Meat went bankrupt and the HLC is \$100,000 in arrears in paying back two loans totalling \$600,000 from the State Dept. of Agriculture. In fact, it was only immediately after our inquiry in November of last year, that HLC made any payments since 2008. I have not been able to ascertain if HLC has been paying lease rent to the State either.

I remember well hearing that the HLC killing plant would provide many new jobs and provide "hot" pork for the local markets as well as provide killing for spent dairy cows. O'ahu has only one tiny boutique dairy left whose market is limited; the numbers of pigs imported for slaughter has decreased significantly; Local meat remains more expensive and is found only at a few stores—and is totally missing from Costco, Safeway and other large purveyors of meat. So now that the reasons for building the plant in the first place have disintegrated, the State now wants to enlarge and embellish the Kalaeloa property and then hope

that they will have been right. If the cattlemen want to gamble (if you build it, they will come?), let it be with their own money, not ours.

When I read the introduction to this bill, I thought it might be a bit of an inside joke- as I am sure you know, there is only one slaughterhouse in CIP--so why not name it?

The majority of Hawai'i cattle are on the Big Island, where there already are slaughterhouses. There are killing plants on Maui and Kaua'i as well. If the State is determined to squander money on cattle, why not do it where the cows are, and build a rendering plant there. If the idea is to finish the cows on O'ahu, allow me to remind you of the rusting fences of the defunct feed lot on state land, abutting the HLC.

The gorgeous green pastures that are currently home to cows could be used for biofuel production or other agricultural enterprises, and can remain green, whilst actually helping Hawai'i to self sufficiency.

It is obvious that livestock agriculture in Hawai'i cannot contribute to our economy—rather it is a drain on our already dwindling coffers. I do not want any more money spent to provide a rural lifestyle for a very few large landowners.

Please do not vote for SB 249
