Subject: Senate Bill No. 263 Relating to Procurement, Bid Requirements

The City & County of Honolulu opposes this bill because it imposes additional, mandatory requirements that the bid opening be delayed for an extra two-day period after bids have already been submitted to await the separate submittal of the listing of subcontractors. This would delay the procurement award by two-days and further complicate the bid process by requiring two separate submittals by the bidders. As a result, administrative processing requirements would be increased.

Furthermore, there is no apparent benefit to a contracting government agency or to the taxpaying public from the proposed two-day delay. Should an agency have reason and desire to provide for this proposed delay, the existing statute does not prohibit a delay or related action. We believe that this bill is unnecessary.

Accordingly, we stand opposed to S.B. 263. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
