Chairman Takumi, and members of the Committee on Education.

My name is Jim Williams and I am testifying in full support of SB 8, SD 1. I note with dismay that this committee already has passed HB 338, with amendments (although the amendments have not been posted as this testimony is written). I urge you to pass SB 8, in order to expedite consideration by the House.

Senate Bill 8 provides for implementation of an appointed Board of Education without nomination by a board of education selection advisory council, but with direct appointment by the Governor and confirmation by the Senate.

During the period preceding the election, there was considerable effort by various groups to support the Constitutional amendment that passed overwhelmingly. The key theme of the support for the amendment was to make the Governor ultimately accountable for improvements in our education system. Diluting the Governor's appointing power will also dilute accountability. SB 8 implements the Constitutional amendment in a way consistent with the communications that resulted in its approval. The selection advisory council provided for in HB 338 is unnecessary and contrary to the public desire to have more accountability for the progress of our public education system.

The result of the election is that we have a "lame duck" board of education. To get on with the business of improving our public schools, it is imperative that this Legislature act quickly to give the Governor the authority to appoint the BOE. The best way to move forward is to move SB 8 forward, rather than putting forth a competing proposal that will delay final enactment possibly to the end of the session in May.

I urge you to respond to the current consensus among education, labor and business groups and join with the Senate in passing a straightforward measure providing for appointment of the Board of Education by the Governor with confirmation by the Senate. The best way to do this is to give quick approval to SB 8.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of SB 8 SD 1.

Thus, the voters opted for 'accountability' when they chose to have the governor nominate Board of Education members. We are pleased that the Senate has taken a stand that the public supports to create a governance structure outlined in SB8 SD1, and we urge you to approve this bill.

The League feels that the only acceptable route to accountability will be for the governor to make the nominations with the advice and consent of the senate, through confirmation of the nominees.
