The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2011, was called to order at 9:59 a.m. by the Honorable Calvin K.Y. Say, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Blake K. Oshiro and Gene Ward on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Brickwood Galuteria and Sam Slom on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

Senate Vice President Donna Mercado Kim and Representative Marilyn Lee presented Governor Abercrombie with lei.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twenty-Sixth Legislature and guests the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

Governor Abercrombie presented the State of the State Address as follows:

"Thank you. Mahalo nui. Thank you, so very much. Thank you, so very much. Mahalo nui. Aloha. Please forgive me for a moment or two; to be back in this Chamber is something of deep and profound meaning, here in paradise, in our democracy, our Hawai'i nei. I literally cannot greet everyone here that means so much to me, and I beg your indulgence a moment or two on that. My whole life has been...this building has been so much a part of my whole life. I can't help but notice the first person sitting there is Clayton Hee. My godson was born on the very, very night, 1986. Clayton's caused me all kinds of trouble all these years and—as Malama just indicated—more to come, no doubt.

"But the friendships, the loyalties, the aloha that's been expressed...Malama's smiling at me now. She and I used to arm-wrestle over on the other side before. And I look and see Gene Ward; we've been rivals for an office here and we're here today. Gene, I'm glad to see you and thank you for supporting me. Sam Slom—where's the lone ranger? There he is. Sam and I have...my hair was a heck of a lot longer and Sam's was dark when we first met one another.

"It was in this House is where I began to learn about what I needed to know in order to be here today. I need to tell you a story because I can't help but look over at Ben Cayetano there. You see him over there, that man with the big smile on his face. There he is. I was sitting out there—Denny, I think just about where you are, Scott, just about where you folks—when rookies Cayetano and Abercrombie came in to this body and...right there, Joe, where you're sitting, was Tony Kunimura and up here was Jimmy Wakatsuki. And we were freshmen and we were gonna get the legislation done; we knew what was going on. And we put out some legislation on land and we won. We won! It was only one vote; Ben said, 'I think we're gonna win, I think we're gonna win.' We won, one vote! Terrific!

"And just before the vote was announced, Tony Kunimura from Kaua'i gets up and says, 'Mr. Speaker, I'd like to change my vote.' He voted against us of course. And he said, 'I'd like to vote yes. I'd like to vote aye.' And so Wakatsuki recorded it, and Ben and I looked at one another and we're thinking, 'Hey! We are something! Even Tony Kunimura—because of the power of our arguments, the mastery of the legislative process that we had—he's changed his vote and going with us.'



“So they announced the vote and instantly Kunimura’s on his feet, ‘Mr. Speaker I move for reconsideration.’ Boom! The bang of the gavel comes down and the next thing...you can imagine the sounds of torment coming as the recess is called, right? And when they come back in, and immediately after Wakatsuki brings the gavel down, the session’s now back in order, and Kunimura’s on his feet instantly saying ‘Mr. Speaker, call the previous question.’ And they took the vote and we got smashed. And Cayetano and I were sitting there stunned and the second the vote was announced, Kunimura gets up, walks over to where we are—right there, Scott, Denny, Mark, you guys—comes over, puts his hands on the desk, he says, ‘Did you learn anything today, college boys?’

“We told him, ‘We learned you’re the professor.’ I called him Professor Kunimura for the rest of our days. But that’s what it was all about and he became our friend—our mentor— as did so many. The memories are here.

“So this is a new day. A new day for us. And this new day for me, begins with a greeting to all of you, all the distinguished folks that are here today that the Speaker’s introduced and a new day for me begins—I hope—with an honest account of the state of our government.

“Seven weeks ago when I began my term as Governor, I assembled a team of talented and dedicated public servants that are sitting right over here. I asked them to make an immediate assessment and today, I want to give you our report.

“What appears on paper as an \$844 million fiscal deficit through the next biennium—believe me—belies the fact that there is also a severe operational deficit in government. In other words, as difficult as it will be to balance the budget—and I give, by the way, credit to all the legislators here, past and present who have struggled with this—this has not been easy and the fact that we’re able to get here to today is a credit to you, and to those who served with you to this time. That effort to balance the budget will merely be life support for what has become a battered, under-resourced, and often dysfunctional democracy.

“A weakened government affects everyone: business owners waiting for permits that are piling up in offices with a fraction of the necessary personnel, school children without proper tools to learn, and public facilities in disgraceful disrepair.

“We cannot take full advantage of the rise in visitor arrivals because we are not able to maintain these public facilities or invest in the culture and arts programs that make our communities stronger and make those visitors want to return.

“Public employees steadfastly perform their duties in an increasingly demoralizing work environment. Furloughs and hiring freezes that supposedly saved money have sometimes resulted in more expensive private contracts and even excessive overtime pay.

“Basic operations of government are stymied by an information management system that hasn’t been upgraded in decades. And as our capacity to provide core services has diminished, our tax dollars have become vulnerable to lawsuits and even expensive court orders. Many of you in this legislature, particularly in the Education Committees, are only too familiar with what that means. As are those in the area of health.

“Meanwhile, we continue to send billions of dollars out of our islands to pay for food, for fuel, and other basic goods and services that we could and we should produce right here. Worst of all, we have put off making the sacrifices necessary to provide for the education, care, and financial security for our children and future generations.

“As we suffered through this erosion of capacity and public confidence—distracted occasionally by the question of who was to blame for all this—we are seen as protecting narrow interests to the detriment of all. We have been steadily losing our ability to work together and the trust of the public that we can reverse our course.

“This breakdown of our government is tearing our social fabric and undermining our economic recovery. I think we can all agree on that. This is not a Republican versus Democrat or an ideological situation. This is a crisis we all have to face.

“Now then, as Governor, I will take full responsibility for our current situation. But with that responsibility comes an obligation to tell the truth. The truth is that our canoe, which is our beloved Hawai’i, could capsize. We are in that unnerving moment when we could all huli (when we could turn over). All of us are at risk, and all of us have to face this.

“Our action now must be swift and unified as we right our vessel and pursue, I believe, a four-part economic recovery and reinvestment plan. We’ll get through this biennium. There will be better days ahead. We can make it happen, I promise you that. Working together we’re going to make it happen. I want to emphasize to everyone on this floor today, and most certainly to everyone who may be tuning in to what we’re saying and what our procedures are today: we are going to do this together. Of necessity and by custom and rite, I stand here, but I stand before you, not above you. And I stand with you. And I pledge to each and every one of you, each and every one, regardless of party, regardless of background: that our diversity indeed will define us and not divide us. And that this Executive and Legislative Branch of government that is the hallmark of our democracy, is something that I honor and treasure, as I honor and treasure every one of you.

“I speak to you as a former colleague. I speak to you as a friend. I speak to you as a fellow child of these islands. Someone who is reaching out to you with full heart in order to accomplish the things that I know we all want to get done on behalf of Hawai’i.

“We’ll start by restoring critical government services. Tax revenues will increase as the economy recovers. I think we all can agree on that, but that recovery will be stalled as long as there is a fiscal deficit and a government incapable of performing core duties.

“Therefore, I am putting forward a plan that will balance the budget, reallocate public resources to the most important government priorities, and restore the basic functions of government.

“Some of these proposals have been presented and discussed in the past in this legislature, and I want to pay particular credit to those of you who had the courage to put some of these bills forward. Some of you have been laughed at. Some of you have been mocked. Some of you have been criticized. Some of you have been put into a category, of why is he or she doing that? Some of you have been in the uncomfortable situation of having others say to you, ‘Why are you doing this? You’re putting us in a bad spot.’ The days of that kind of comfort zone for those who have to make decisions, who have been given the responsibility and given the opportunity to make those decisions. That situation can no longer be ignored, so I give you credit.

“In the present context—with the challenges facing our State, with long-term liabilities that can no longer be ignored, and with the new possibilities for collaboration with the Executive that I just outlined—we can look at these ideas, every one of your ideas, with fresh eyes. Proposals that may have been rejected in the past are not only possible, but likely necessary today in my view.

"As I indicated, I want to credit past legislatures for bringing us this far along the path in dealing with the fiscal crisis. What follows then for me are some of the measures I think we will now need to face and to address.

"I will be filing a bill to modernize the terms of our Employees' Retirement System to reflect the economic and social realities of today, so that it can be sustained into the future. Absent action in that regard today, the Retirement System itself is in jeopardy. We all have to pull together.

"To this end, I am proposing that we end the current practice of state-funded reimbursement for federal Medicare Part B benefits for Hawai'i government employees. I am personally one of those recipients. I asked our tax folks and Budget and Finance to start this review with me; taking a look at me. I'm not going to ask anybody to do anything that I'm not willing to do myself. I am personally, as I said, one of those recipients on the basis of my previous service in State government, but it is a bonus paid for by taxpayers that can no longer be justified in light of our current fiscal and social crisis. I did not earn this benefit, and cannot justify asking taxpayers, public and private, to pay for it.

"I am proposing two fixes to the tax code that will increase revenues to the State. One is a repeal of the state deduction for paying your state taxes. It's an absurdity in the tax code, the elimination of which is long overdue. This change will affect all taxpayers who itemize, so we will phase in implementation for middle-income earners to lessen the immediate effect.

"The other fix is to implement the recommendation of the Tax Review Commission to treat pension income like all other income for tax purposes, as is done when preparing your federal taxes, as is done when preparing your federal taxes. My proposal includes a provision so that those who are most dependent on their pensions will not be taxed. But people like myself will have to step it up. We cannot ask people to do something for us that we're unwilling to do to them in terms of share sacrifice. Thank you. And believe me, this is no real sacrifice on my part in that regard. This is the least that I think we can do if we're all going to join together.

"I am proposing what is an overdue increase in the alcohol tax and will also propose a fee on soda and similar drinks. We can no longer ignore the fact that consumption of these and other such products contribute to rising public health costs. Revenues from these fees will be used to repair the public health infrastructure, and also to fund prevention and education programs. We have to come to grips with not only with childhood obesity, but we have to come to grips with the question of diabetes, the question of our healthcare costs screaming out of control because we can't control ourselves, because we have not disciplined ourselves, because we have not put ourselves in a pono way with regard to our own health. Here in paradise that should be a first priority for all of us.

"I expect collective bargaining negotiations to be conducted in good faith and with common goals in mind to achieve savings without disrupting service to the public, to keep State employees on the job with paychecks for their families. I am not going to take public servants who have put everything forward on behalf of the public interest. I am not going to ask fellow public employees to do something other than that which I am willing to come to grips with myself. We want people working. We want their paychecks out there. We want to exercise creativity and long-term thinking then in the bargaining process to improve the work experience and achieve a resolution of the crisis of unfunded liabilities in pension funds and runaway health costs. We cannot avoid it. We have to deal with the unfunded liabilities in terms of pension, and we have to deal with the question of runaway health costs.

"I was here in this legislature when in the wake of Jack Burns' initiative, Governor George Ariyoshi and subsequently John Waihe'e helped to bring about the implementation of the most advanced healthcare system in the United States. The Pre-paid Employer Healthcare Plan that we had started in 1974. When Ben and I came in 1975, that was the most advanced, and is still the most advanced in the country. But events have overtaken us. Events have overtaken us. Unfunded liabilities and the screaming advance of healthcare costs are something we can't avoid any longer.

"We need to ensure that our visitor industry is sustainable by bringing the impact fees paid by the increasing number of timeshare occupants into alignment with hotel room occupants who pay the Transient Accommodations Tax. This is not an easy problem to resolve. The timeshare industry as such, I think, is the wave of the future and we need to address ourselves to it. We need to support it, we need to support travel and tourism, and what I now call the hospitality industry in a way that is beneficial for everyone starting with us. Starting with Hawai'i.

"And in that context I will also reallocate funds from the Hawai'i Tourism Authority to basic government services such as environmental protection, improvements to public facilities, and advancing culture and the arts. The amount we are spending in the name of marketing Hawai'i has grown disproportionate to the amount we need to spend on Hawai'i's own infrastructure, social and physical. We need to reprioritize. We need to reprioritize and reinvest in our Hawai'i in the things that make us unique. This is not so much a criticism of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. That is not the object. I am not here to point fingers or to criticize. What I'm here to do today is to suggest to you that we need to have a serious discussion about our priorities and the things that make Hawai'i what it is, and make Hawai'i a place that people want to come to and enjoy and tell others about.

"Now, I must address perhaps the most emotionally trying subject that I'm going to discuss with you. We will have to scale back on those social services for which funding no longer exists. There are some contracts, for example, entered into by the previous administration that assumed the existence of additional federal funds for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. I am saying that not that this was done with anything other than the best of intentions. I was part of the Congress at that time that help put those funds forward. I wish that the Congress would continue to aid and assist the states. But every appearance is, and I have to act on the realities in front of me. You have to act on the realities as a legislature, that are in front of you. It is every likelihood that those funds will not be any longer available. So therefore these unfunded contracts, while they are for very worthy programs, make no mistake about it, even though they're for these worthy programs we're going to have to take a hard look at it. We must now find new ways to support our neighbors.

"We must acknowledge, without flinching, the fact that the rising cost of healthcare also requires that we cut back on benefits provided to Medicaid patients in the coming years in order to sustain health coverage of any kind for eligible individuals and families. We are the ones on the state level that have to provide the Medicaid side in conjunction with the federal government. Medicare is on the federal side. Medicaid is what we have to take into account, and we're going to have to take a hard look at what those benefits are. That's why we have to get together on the question of obesity, on the question of how we live, on the question of good nutrition for our children in the schools. Good nutrition for our folks in the hospitals and living a pono life. This is one of the most difficult things I had to come to grips with as Governor, but we cannot and will not avoid it or evade the necessity of confronting the issue. I am

calling on community organizations, private foundations, and all of us to work together with us on the state agency side to help absorb the blows that these changes will bring. And there will be blows.

“All told, this plan will allow us to reduce, and in time, eliminate our fiscal deficit, and to turn around our operating deficiencies in government. This plan will speed up our recovery, result in increased revenues and create a healthy, functioning government that can serve the public good and restore confidence in ourselves.

“This proposal is presented as a package for consideration. I am wide open to other ideas from the legislature and from the community. I tell you that. You folks know me. You know that I mean it. I’m wide open. This is not presented from on high as a fait accompli, that it’s already been thought through and all you have to do is put your rubber stamp on it. That’s not the condition at all. That’s not the way I work. That’s not the relationship I want to have. But make no mistake, we cannot and will not entertain ideas that are designed simply to shift responsibility to someone else or to some future time. In the end, we must come to an agreement now that is balanced in its impact, that is adequate to restore the functions of government, and that does not create counterproductive barriers to economic recovery.

“The challenge before us then is not to balance the budget. Our challenge is to ensure that our values and priorities are reflected in the decisions we make and the actions we take. And boy, do I mean what I’m going to say now. The time for debate, debate which merely goes through the motions, or rhetoric for the sake of a safe harbor political agenda, has expired. Everyone must be prepared to contribute.

“For my part as Governor, I propose the New Day Work Projects. In the time I have been in office, our team has been preparing to launch the central part of our economic strategy, a broad-ranged series of capital improvement actions to be called the New Day Work Projects.

“The New Day Work Projects will directly attack unemployment and jumpstart business activity. I’m looking at you, Gene. I’m looking at you, Sam. I got your message. I heard what you said. It will provide an economic boost that will reverberate throughout the State. We will utilize the bonding power of the State, partner with willing private parties, streamline processes, provide work that will result in paychecks for families across all the islands. We’re going to take a systematic and integrated approach to New Day Work Projects to ensure broad economic distribution of economic benefits, and we’re going to be thoughtful about these projects we’re going to select to make sure they match our long-term priorities. You can count on it.

“The folks here on this Floor have been elected to represent individual constituents, yes. But we’re going to integrate with your suggestions what needs to be done in order to make this happen. I’m looking forward to that. I want to see it happen. We want smiles on people’s faces. We want to see people feeling that sense of prosperity again. That there’s a future for them. And we want to put smiles on their faces, especially with the election after reapportionment coming up in 2012. Oh yes, now you see the heads nodding up and down.

“But this is what it’s all about. That’s what democracy is for and I’m looking forward to working with you. I’m looking forward to being able to implement your suggestions the New Day Work Projects that you think are best for your people.

“For example, we have ambitious capital improvement plans for the University of Hawai‘i System, including the West O‘ahu Campus and the Pālanui Campus in Kona. These are just examples. I could cite many more. These will provide obviously

new educational opportunities for students. The Department of Transportation is freeing a backlog of work to improve our roads, airports and harbors—a transformation of our infrastructure that will have widespread positive effects on our visitor industry and local families for decades to come.

“The New Day Work Projects will look for long-range cost savings. Right now, for lack of action, we have state buildings that have been vacant for years, such as the Līhu‘e Courthouse. Right, Bernard? You folks showed me that when I was over visiting, and the Kamāmalu Building right down here on Richards Street. We can walk right out and see it. We’re going to get these buildings back into working condition so that we aren’t wasting taxpayer money to lease additional properties. We’re going to take cost effective measures to make State buildings energy efficient. This will result in long-term savings for taxpayers and lessen our dependence on foreign oil. We’re going to move on the question of energy.

“I’m also going to convene a group of experts and University officials to consider the future of sports and the future of development on O‘ahu to make a definitive decision on Aloha Stadium and any future stadium that might be built. Other than maintenance related to health and safety, I will divert all other capital improvement dollars for Aloha Stadium to other projects. Right now, multimillion dollar plans to extend the life of Aloha Stadium by 20 years could take 40 years to implement. It is time to reprioritize.

“The New Day Work Projects will look to the future and what our community and economy will look like decades from now. For example, as Honolulu moves on its transit plans, the State will actively encourage and support attractive, sustainable transit-oriented development. The legislature has proposals on these concepts, including looking at density rights and other zoning initiatives. I will look forward to participating in the discussion and moving quickly.

“The people of Hawai‘i are going to get to work and build our future.

“In meetings with other governors across the country, I have met some who have an ideological problem with utilizing resources from the federal government and collaborating with the President. We, of course, have no such problem. After all, federal dollars are our tax dollars, and we should pursue our fair share vigorously and strategically. Barack Obama is our President, and his vision is well aligned with ours.

“So the Hawai‘i Fair Share Initiative led by Lieutenant Governor Schatz, Brian stand up. Where are you? There he is. Thank you. I get to do that because he’s as short as I am. But Brian represents an unprecedented effort to bring in additional dollars to Hawai‘i. Here are two examples of what’s already been accomplished:

“First, we’ve positioned Hawai‘i to receive nearly, and I hope this is good news for some of you who haven’t heard it in the legislature I think it will be. We repositioned Hawai‘i to receive nearly \$100 million new federal dollars in 2012 and 2013 to be used for military facility upgrades and veteran cemetery improvements across the State; \$100 million. I want to thank General Wong and our Department of Defense, our Adjutant General and others in the Guard for taking a leadership role in helping us in this regard. By coming up with a little over \$12 million in State funds, we’ll get an 8 to 1 return investment for our critical capital improvement projects across the State.

“Another example, the Lieutenant Governor’s Office and the Department of Human Services are partnering with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs led by our own General Eric Shinseki and Tammy Duckworth of McKinley High School. This partnership will help community-based organizations secure funds to address homeless veterans as part of our

homelessness program. There will be additional federal resources available to make sure that we are working in a strategic and humane fashion to solve this problem of homelessness, and veterans homelessness in particular.

“Lieutenant Governor Schatz is providing leadership and forming partnerships that will yield both short and long-term economic benefits for Hawai‘i, and is driving real change in my judgment about how we do business with each other.

“This will call for reinvesting in our future.

“As we right our canoe, our top priority must be education. This past Saturday at Washington Place, both the Superintendent of Schools and the President of the University of Hawai‘i participated in our first cabinet retreat. We’re going to integrate the entire Executive decision making process across the State.

“The Department of Education is on the cusp of transformative change as a result of winning President Obama’s Race to the Top. I am totally committed to that effort. But to move this forward, we need an immediate resolution to the appointed School Board issue. In the coming weeks, the legislature needs to give me the enabling legislation allowing the Governor to appoint the School Board. The Senate Education Committee is meeting this afternoon—if I get through this speech in time—to consider a bill that will create a clear line of accountability and direct appointment by the Governor. I am already receiving applications and recommendations through the Governor’s website that will allow me to move quickly. This is the clear will of Hawai‘i’s people. I’m prepared to act now.

“As for the University of Hawai‘i, I have high expectations for how it will transform our state under President Greenwood’s leadership. Through its Hawai‘i Graduation Initiative, UH will increase the number of college graduates by 25 percent by 2015—25 percent by 2015. We can achieve this goal by keeping education affordable and reaching out to students across the state who have not been traditionally well-served at UH, including Native Hawaiians and neighbor island students. Native Hawaiians and neighbor island students are going to be a top priority.

“The University is also the State’s think tank. The Thirty Meter Telescope on Mauna Kea, and the Beacon health information grant at UH-Hilo are two examples of the kind of practical research and innovation that will provide jobs for our people and revenue for the State. Research programs at the University will play a big part in our economic recovery by bringing external dollars into our state and building innovative industries. The University’s current research activity brings \$450 million into the state, and I will strongly support any measure that will increase that capacity.

“I also want to take a moment to note a unique element in our education system that is often overlooked, but is vitally important to the future of our Hawai‘i. It brings me back to some of the moments that I’ve shared with some of you in these Chambers over these past decades. In 1896, it was made illegal to teach the Hawaiian language. In 1986, a group of legislators and community leaders removed that ban. I was part of that group. Today, I would like to introduce a founding member of Pūnana Leo and the first student of Native Hawaiian ancestry to receive a PhD in Hawaiian and Indigenous Language and Culture Revitalization: Dr. Kauanoe Kamanā. Please stand and be recognized.

“There stands a treasure of Hawai‘i. Today, we have the opportunity to organize a Hawaiian language university-within-a-university as a next step. Language is a key element in ensuring that Hawaiian culture remains strong and perseveres into the future for the benefit of all. When our young children,

when they master language, they master themselves. And when they master themselves, they can achieve anything. That’s what the mastery of language is all about. That’s the glory of Hawai‘i and all of the backgrounds. Everything that is brought to Hawai‘i. And on the basis and foundation of our Polynesian ancestors and the Hawaiian culture that is spread through Aloha, language is the key to all of that. That is the success that’s been achieved.

“For those children, for those youngest children, my office has been working with private and public agencies and will be utilizing federal, state, and private resources to develop a leadership position in my office for early education. Go ahead, you can clap for that. This person will coordinate efforts across departments and in the private sector as we lay the groundwork for the future establishment of a Department of Early Childhood.

“We will also move to ensure energy and food security for Hawai‘i. I have spoken of and sustained my interest in an independent Hawai‘i Energy Authority to move the clean energy agenda forward. However, I am encouraged by the ideas put forward by legislators and the energy community that propose a significant restructuring of the Public Utilities Commission to move energy projects and better connect our islands with the information and transportation infrastructure that we need to make us more self-sufficient. I look forward to working with the legislature to come up with a solution so we can take action on energy. I’m wide open on how we do this. I’m ready to go. We will move these matters on energy security, energy independence, and we’ll do it with dispatch.

“Jobs in energy, agriculture, and environmental protection will be a cornerstone of a new sustainable economy in Hawai‘i. I think we all agree on that. The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations is ready to deploy now, a \$6 million federal grant to implement a plan to do the necessary workforce development activities needed to increase green jobs throughout Hawai‘i. We’re moving now.

“Another element of our economic security is increasing our broadband capacity. Simply put, our information highway is essential to the future of our islands. We have an outstanding plan produced by the Hawai‘i Broadband Task Force. Now we will implement it. The potential for Hawai‘i to be a model state and access outside funding is before us. Our broadband initiative will parallel what we will accomplish in clean energy, and it will be the key to all our economic development plans I assure you.

“The Department of Economic Development and Tourism will take the lead on these energy and broadband initiatives. We will also refocus our efforts in creative industries such as film and television, a \$400 million industry that we can grow many times with smart investments and strong leadership. Help for small business is also on the way from Department working in collaboration with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to support small business activity. We will not have anybody held up because we failed to be able to move expeditiously on their legitimate request for anything by way of permitting or anything else to move along these projects. That’s going to change and change now.

“By far one of the biggest factors hampering this and our government, and costing the taxpayers is our outdated information technology. The Department of Accounting and General Services and my office are preparing to launch an unprecedented public-private partnership to accomplish an unprecedented goal. We are going to transform our government and make Hawai‘i the envy of the nation in its use of technology.

“All departments, including Health, Human Services, Public Safety, Hawaiian Home Lands, Land and Natural Resources—all departments—are working collaboratively to restructure these processes, bring pride back to public service work, rebuild our safety net for our most vulnerable people, and develop partnerships so that we can do a better job of taking care of our own people.

“My administration will continue to provide messages and proposals regarding the Executive budget and new initiatives. Our goal is to present ideas that are well considered and developed; products of conversations with lawmakers, academics, private businesses, workers, nonprofits, and community leaders. I believe this is the prudent way to govern in a new spirit of cooperation, deliberation, and steady determination to bring to fruition a New Day in Hawai‘i.

“I believe in Hawai‘i. I believe that you believe in Hawai‘i. This is the reason I ran for Governor: to have the opportunity to express every day, my confidence in all of us, no matter what our background or opinion. We are Hawai‘i, an impossible convergence in the spirit of aloha of discovery, perseverance, unity and humanity. There is no doubt in my mind that we will overcome every one of these challenges.

“On January 8 my friend and colleague, a member of my Armed Services Committee when I was serving in Congress, Representative Gabrielle Giffords, was shot through the head and six others were killed in Arizona. An hour after I heard the news, I found myself sitting in my office with Marc Alexander, who had been the Vicar General, I think many of you know, of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Hawai‘i. Marc was discussing with me the journey that led him to submit his name and resume through the New Day Hawai‘i website to the Abercrombie Administration. I think that’s important for you to know. His resume came in like everybody else’s, just a citizen hoping perhaps to participate and put forward what he had to offer. When it first came in, people thought someone’s playing a joke. You know, somebody’s taking advantage of Marc. But no, that’s what he had done so we were talking about that.

“On that day, still in the grip of the emotions in the wake of those events, I found inspiration. Marc and I come from very, very different backgrounds. We’ve been on opposite sides of very emotional issues and debates. We talked about how we justify ourselves to ourselves. We talked about homelessness in Hawai‘i and our responsibilities. We found so much in common. So, joined by common purpose, I asked him to serve and he accepted the job to help lead the charge on homelessness in Hawai‘i, and, more importantly, to help heal our communities—to reach out to all our brothers and sisters in the spirit of aloha as I reach out to you today.

“Because in Hawai‘i, we understand that it is our good actions that make us human beings. Our diversity, and beliefs, and background do not divide us, they define us.

“Government is and should be the literal representation of ourselves of the people of Hawai‘i. My expectations I know are high. My expectations of myself, I can tell you, are high. I am asking every person, each legislator, each administrator, each business person, each worker, each community volunteer, each citizen to help restore our government, restore our sense of community, restore our Hawai‘i.

“Let us right our canoe. Let us act in a pono way and begin our journey back to the heart of our island home with humble hearts and above all, with aloha for each other. I mua Hawai‘i.”

Senate President Shan S. Tsutsui then rose and stated:

“Thank you, Governor Abercrombie. On behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, we would like to thank you for sharing your vision and ideas with us this morning. We

would like to emphasize our willingness to work with you to find solutions to the many challenges which you just mentioned.

“While we know that we will have disagreements along the way, let us be an example of how an executive and legislative branch can work together to overcome adversity.

“So on that note, Governor, again on behalf of all of us, we would like to thank you, and we look forward to working collaboratively with you to implement your new beginnings initiatives. With that, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned.”

At 10:55 a.m., President Tsutsui declared the Joint Session adjourned.
