A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that temporary exemptions
- 2 are necessary to expedite the construction and improvement of
- 3 public housing units and public infrastructure. Temporary
- 4 exemptions achieve the dual benefits of promoting jobs in the
- 5 local economy and developing valuable public assets. The repair
- 6 and maintenance of vacant public housing units should reduce the
- 7 turnaround time between vacating and incoming tenants, thereby
- 8 resulting in an increase in the affordable housing inventory.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to address economic
- 10 revitalization by temporarily exempting from the state civil
- 11 service, persons hired or contracted to repair and maintain
- 12 vacant public housing units.
- 13 SECTION 2. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 15 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
- 16 comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter

- (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii

 national guard as such, and positions in the Hawaii

 national guard that are required by state or federal

- (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where 10 the director of human resources development has 11 certified that the service is special or unique or is 12 essential to the public interest and that, because of 13 circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel 14 to perform the service cannot be obtained through 15 normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any such 16 contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
- 17 (3) Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
 18 with a court order or decree if the director
 19 determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
 20 civil service procedures would result in delay or

12	SECT	ION 3. (a) Upon the repeal of section 2 of this Act,
13	an employ	ee hired by the State pursuant to this Act may be:
14	(1)	Terminated; or
15	(2)	Retained by the respective public employer; provided
16		that the employee shall be subject to all civil
17		service employment requirements for the position for
18		which the employee seeks to be retained or transferred
19		and shall not receive any civil service experience
20		credit for work performed while employed pursuant to
21	•	this Act.

- 1 (b) The director of the public agency employing an
- 2 employee subject to subsection (a) shall determine whether to
- 3 terminate or retain an employee subject to this Act; provided
- 4 that if the employee is to be retained, all costs associated
- 5 with retaining the employee shall be covered by the public
- 6 agency's existing budget.
- 7 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 9 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012;
- 10 provided that section 2 of this Act shall be repealed on July 1,
- 11 2015, and section 76-16(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be
- 12 reenacted in the form in which it read on the day before the
- 13 effective date of this Act.
