A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The legislature finds that the Hawaii detector 1 SECTION 1. 2 dog program, which began its operation in November 1989, was terminated at the end of June 2009. The remaining personnel 3 4 were transferred to other inspector positions within the Hawaii department of agriculture, and the remaining detector dogs were 5 The retired and placed in appropriate homes within the State. 6 program was terminated partly because of a twenty-seven per cent 7 funding reduction due to the State's economic recession in 2009. 8 9 The legislature finds that there are regularly scheduled commercial and military flights that arrive in Hawaii at all 10 hours; therefore, the re-instatement of a dog detection and 11 prevention program is needed to address the anticipated military 12 build-up in the Marianas. In fiscal year 2009, commercial and 13 private flights averaged to 1,137 aircrafts inspected upon 14 15 arrival, resulting in the clearance of about twenty-five 16 thousand items that were only visually inspected. As a result of the future increase of military in Guam, 17

- 1 department of agriculture to re-establish a dog detection and
- 2 prevention program to effectively screen arriving aircraft,
- 3 ships, and associated cargos for the presence of brown tree
- 4 snakes from high-risk areas. Additionally, any remaining
- 5 funding will also be needed for the department of agriculture to
- 6 further augment the rapid response team to prevent brown tree
- 7 snakes and other invasive snake species from establishing a
- 8 population in the State.
- 9 The legislature finds that invasive species can wreak havoc
- 10 on Hawaii's fragile ecosystem, environment, and agricultural
- 11 lands. Invasive species, such as the brown tree snake can
- 12 damage the balance of the State's ecosystem, threaten native
- 13 forest vertebrate species, precipitate power outages affecting
- 14 private, commercial, and military activities, cause widespread
- 15 loss of domestic birds and pets, and provoke considerable
- 16 emotional trauma to residents and visitors alike when venomous
- 17 snakes invade human habitats.
- 18 In Guam, the brown tree snake was responsible for
- 19 devastating the majority of the native bird population, and due
- 20 to the availability of prey and lack of predators in introduced
- 21 habitats, they have been known to grow to sizes larger than
- 22 their normal one to two meters (3.3 to 6.6 feet) in length. To

- 1 minimize the incidents of accidental migration of invasive
- 2 animal species, trained dogs have been used successfully to
- 3 search, locate, and assist in the removal of migratory invasive
- 4 species prior to the departures of outbound military and
- 5 commercial cargo and transportation vessels from the State.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to establish an invasive species
- 7 detection and prevention program within the department of
- 8 agriculture, using dogs that are cross-trained to detect and
- 9 prevent the entry of invasive species, including the brown tree
- 10 snake.
- 11 SECTION 2. There is established within the department of
- 12 agriculture, an invasive species detection and prevention
- 13 program that uses trained dogs to detect migratory invasive
- 14 species harbored in cargo carried by military and commercial
- 15 transportation vessels before the cargo is released.
- 16 The invasive species detection and prevention program shall
- 17 contract with private dog handlers within the State to provide
- 18 and cross-train dogs to detect various migratory invasive
- 19 species.
- 20 SECTION 3. The department of agriculture shall submit to
- 21 the legislature not later than twenty days prior to the
- 22 convening of the 2013 regular session a report on the efficacy

- 1 of the invasive species detection and prevention program
- 2 established by this Act.
- 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for
- 6 the funding for the Hawaii invasive species detection and
- 7 prevention program within the department of agriculture.
- 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 9 agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.
