A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that until recently,
3	Hawaii Medical Center's two hospitals in Ewa Beach and Liliha
4	provided comprehensive medical services to almost two-hundred
5	thousand residents. In addition, the two hospitals operated
6	some of the most-frequently used emergency rooms in the State.
7	However, in December 2011, the Hawaii Medical Center's hospitals
8	closed due to bankruptcy. Along with the closing of all of the
9	hospitals' programs including their emergency rooms and the
10	State's only organ transplant program, hundreds of patients were
11	either discharged or transferred to other health care facilities
12	in the State.
13	The legislature also finds that, with the closure of the
14	Hawaii Medical Center hospitals, access to emergency medical
15	care is in jeopardy. A greater burden is now placed on the city
16	and county of Honolulu emergency medical services division to
17	respond to emergency calls on the Leeward Coast and transport
18	patients to emergency rooms elsewhere on Oahu. This increased

- 2 acceptable levels of emergency medical services to communities
- 3 on the Leeward Coast.
- 4 The purpose of this part is to appropriate general funds to
- 5 the department of health to assist the city and county of
- 6 Honolulu emergency medical services division with expanding
- 7 emergency medical services and ambulance services in communities
- 8 in Leeward Oahu.
- 9 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the
- 12 purposes of:
- 13 (1) Increasing the on-call availability of emergency
- 14 medical services and ambulance services in Ewa Beach
- to sixteen hours per day; and
- 16 (2) Increasing the on-call availability of emergency
- 17 medical services and ambulance services in Nanakuli to
- 18 twenty-four hours per day.
- 19 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 20 health for the purposes of this part.

1	PART II
2	SECTION 3. The legislature finds that the recent closure
3	of the Hawaii Medical Center's two hospitals threatens to
4	overload emergency rooms elsewhere on Oahu. Emergency patients
5	who would have normally been treated at one of Hawaii Medical
6	Center's hospitals are now being re-routed to nearby hospitals'
7	emergency rooms. The legislature further finds that Wahiawa
8	General Hospital, being the remaining hospital closest to the
9	Leeward Coast, now accepts many of the patients who previously
10	would have visited the emergency room at one of Hawaii Medical
11	Center's hospitals.
12	The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds as a grant
13	pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to assist
14	Wahiawa General Hospital in providing additional emergency room
15	services that are required due to the closing of Hawaii Medical
16	Center's two hospitals.
17	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
18	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
19	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 as a grant
20	pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to Wahiawa
21	General Hospital to provide additional emergency room services.

- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 2 health for the purposes of this part.
- 3 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
