A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE IMMERSION PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Hawaiian language, the native language of 2 the Native Hawaiian people, was once a thriving language used by 3 Native Hawaiians and foreigners alike. However, by the late twentieth century, the Hawaiian language was pushed to the brink 4 5 of extinction due to a number of factors, including an 1896 law that functioned to ban the speaking of the Hawaiian language in 6 Hawaii schools. 7 8 Fortunately, the Hawaiian language was saved by several historic initiatives, including the department of education's 9 10 Hawaiian language immersion program, which was launched in the 11 Today, the Hawaiian language immersion program is 12 offered at twenty-one public schools and educates more than tow 13 thousand students in kindergarten through the twelfth grade. 14 The assessment requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act 15 of 2001 present a major problem for the Hawaiian language 16 immersion program. As English is not formally introduced in 17 Hawaiian language immersion program classrooms until the fifth

grade, third and fourth grade students take assessments in the

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- 1 Hawaiian language to comply with the requirements of the No
- 2 Child Left Behind Act. Since the 2005-2006 school year, these
- 3 students took the Hawaiian aligned portfolio assessment, which
- 4 was developed in the Hawaiian language specifically for the
- 5 Hawaiian language immersion program. However, the department of
- 6 education has decided to stop using the Hawaiian aligned
- 7 portfolio assessment and is instead administering a Hawaiian
- 8 translation of the Hawaii state assessment this school year.
- 9 A number of problems arise when a test is translated from
- 10 one language to another. One problem is that, in many cases,
- 11 the construct of the test will have changed because of the
- 12 translation. For example, an English reading test, once
- 13 translated into Hawaiian, does not necessarily measure reading
- 14 proficiency in either English or Hawaiian. These translation
- 15 problems can be mitigated through the development of a parallel
- 16 test written originally in the Hawaiian language.
- 17 The legislature finds that the Hawaiian language is a
- 18 critical component of the heritage of the State of Hawaii, and
- 19 the State has a solemn obligation to perpetuate the Hawaiian
- 20 language. For example, the Hawaii constitution recognizes the
- 21 Hawaiian language as one of the two official languages of the
- 22 State. Moreover, the board of education has adopted a policy



- 1 (Board of Education Policy 2105) acknowledging that its Hawaiian
- 2 language immersion program is "an essential component to the
- 3 revitalization and continuation of the Hawaiian language and
- 4 culture."
- 5 Furthermore, the federal Native American Languages Act of
- 6 1990 recognizes the United States' responsibility to ensure the
- 7 survival of Native American languages and establishes the
- 8 nation's policy of encouraging and supporting the use of Native
- 9 American languages as a medium of instruction to help preserve
- 10 those languages.
- In light of this, the legislature further finds that to
- 12 uphold its obligation to perpetuate the Hawaiian language, the
- 13 department of education must provide the students of the
- 14 Hawaiian language immersion program with an assessment system
- 15 that most accurately measures their academic achievement.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of
- 17 education to develop reading, math, and science assessments in
- 18 the Hawaiian language for grades three and four Hawaiian
- 19 language immersion program students.
- 20 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 21 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
- 22 as follows:

7	language	and include accommodations regularly provided to these								
8	students	in their classrooms.								
9	(b)	The assessments shall not be Hawaiian translations of								
10	the gener	al state assessments and shall be:								
11	(1)	Aligned with the vision, mission, and programmatic								
12		goals of the Hawaiian language immersion program;								
13	(2)	Aligned with state academic content and achievement								
14		standards;								
15	(3)	Valid, reliable, and consistent with relevant,								
16		nationally recognized professional and technical								
17		standards; and								
18	(4)	Compliant with federal requirements.								
19	(c)	All ancillary assessment materials and tools that are								
20	made avai	lable to students taking the general state assessment								
21	shall als	o be made available in the Hawaiian language to								
22	students	in the Hawaiian language immersion program.

1	(d)	The	board	of	education	shall	adopt	rules	establishing
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- 2 procedures for the development of these assessments, including
- 3 the requirement that the Hawaiian language community, including
- 4 the department's Hawaiian education program section, the Aha
- 5 Kauleo Kaiapuni Hawaii, members of Hawaiian language immersion
- 6 program schools and the Hawaiian language programs at the
- 7 University of Hawaii at Hilo and the University of Hawaii at
- 8 Manoa, be consulted and collaborated with in good faith
- 9 throughout the drafting and review of the assessments."

10 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
